Measles Increase in Summer

With the incidence of measles usually being somewhat high in summer time, the State Health officer has issued a statement concerning the use of immune globulin for protecting very young or frail children from an attack of this perennial childhood disease and its often serious complications.

If you have a child less than five years old who has been exposed to measles, your family doctor may recommend giving him immune globulin. Thru city, county or state health departments, doctors can obtain immune globulin free to be used as they think advisable. Infants and children, whose health makes it inadvisable for them to suffer an attack of measles, may avoid the disease if immune globulin is administered within 8 days from the time of exposure.

The State Health officer emphasized the fact that immune globulin cannot give a child permanent protection against measles but explained that the protection is ordinarily of about three weeks duration. However, there is no limit to the number of times it can be used, and a child who is protected by it once can be protected by it again if exposed later. Immune globulin can go on shielding him against measles until he is old enough and strong enough to stand an attack without risking serious consequences.

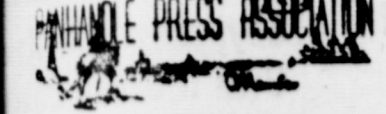

**Proper Fly Control  
 Eliminates Disease**  
**Proper Equipment and  
 Application Important**

Many diseases and cases of con-  
 tamination are traceable to flies.  
 Spraying with DDT and other new  
 chemicals presents the first truly ef-  
 fective means of controlling flies.  
 DDT is amazingly effective for  
 several weeks. Flies landing on  
 treated surfaces die in a few min-  
 utes from a condition similar to de-  
 lirium tremens. The main steps to  
 a good fly control program are:  
 First: Clean up the breeding  
 places where flies lay their eggs.  
 Second: Spray DDT on all sur-  
 faces where flies gather. For this  
 work a sprayer developing some  
 pressure is needed. A garden type  
 compressed air or larger sprayer  
 will do the job efficiently. Around  
 the home, spray the doors, windows,  
 the back porch, out buildings, et  
 cetera. On the farm, the ceilings

and walls of barns, poultry houses  
 and hog houses should be sprayed.  
 Two or three sprayings a year  
 will provide excellent control.

DDT is positive but slow in its  
 action. Dairymen still are using  
 hand sprayers for a quick knock-  
 down of visiting flies at milking time.  
 The hand sprayers also are con-  
 venient for spraying again those areas  
 exposed to rain, where DDT may be  
 washed off.

The types of sprayers for fly con-  
 trol include: (1) hand atomizers; (2)  
 hand pump action — knapsack,  
 wheelbarrow, and bucket pump  
 sprayers; (3) compressed air—usu-  
 ally 2 to 4 gallons in size; (4) engine-  
 operated sprayers from 1/2 to 1 1/2  
 H.P. up in size. At least one of  
 each type should be available.

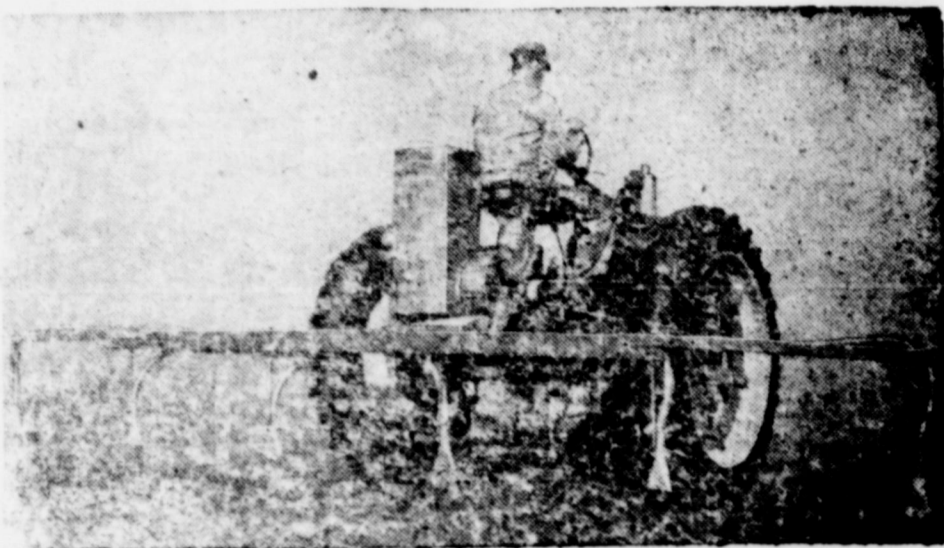

### New Type Spray Oil For Fruit Trees

A new superior type oil for use in dormant sprays for fruit trees has been developed by Geneva experiment station. The new type oils are said to be more effective and to be safer to use on fruit trees. It is estimated that 25 million gallons of oil are used annually throughout the world for horticultural sprays, sufficient to make about a billion gallons of dilute spray.

### New Machine Aids Deep Fertilization

A machine capable of placing fertilizers at plow-sole depth and covering as high as 30 acres a day has been developed by an Illinois farmer. Fertilizer placed at root depth in the soil or in the bottom of the plow furrow has been gaining advocates at a rapid pace. The present slow method of application has delayed its general application. It allows late season application after weather has become settled.

During the month of May, almost 13,000 farm workers were placed by the Texas A. and M. College Extension service for labor program

### Baby Chick Need of Riboflavin Is Great

#### Curled Toe Paralysis Caused by Deficiency

Riboflavin, a crystalline yellow vitamin containing nitrogen and ribose, has proven necessary for growth of poultry. It is also important in connection with the formation of an enzyme responsible for

utilization of feed within the cells of the body.

Riboflavin is widely distributed in feeding materials. It is present in greatest amounts in milk products, yeast, live meal, alfalfa, cereal grasses and byproducts of the fermenting and distilling industry. Only a few grams are required per ton of mixed feeds.

Many poultry authorities have stated there is an advantage in using natural riboflavin concentrates in preference to synthetic riboflavin. The natural concentrate generally supplies other important nutrients aside from riboflavin.

When chicks are fed a ration low in riboflavin, they start squatting and develop a condition known as curled toe paralysis.

In the past the lack of riboflavin in feed ingredients has caused considerable economic loss. Baby chicks require greater quantities than older birds. Deficiency in laying flocks lowers egg production and results in inferior eggs or poor hatchability.

### BURNING DESTROYS SOIL

When you burn straw, cornstalks and other crop residues on the field you lose valuable nitrogen and destroy organic matter vital to soil rebuilding and crop production. If the stalks of a 100-bushel corn crop go up in smoke 6,500 pounds of organic matter and 55 pounds of nitrogen



are lost. When you light a match to a mature sweet clover crop, you lose about 150 pounds of nitrogen and three to four tons of organic matter. It takes more effort to plow these materials under than it does to burn them, but an extra 10 to 20 bushels of corn per acre and a more fertile soil should be worth the extra trouble.

Supplies of oilseed cake and meal available for feed from now thru September are expected to be about the same as a year ago.

### Soybeans Will Hold Own if Given Chance

Industry Making Demands for Big Crop

Since America's pioneer soybean processing plant began operation in 1922, soybeans have become a word in agriculture and industry ranking as the nation's fourth largest cash farm crop.

Soybeans, when processed, largely into three fields of farm, home and industry.

#### A Present Threat

America today needs thinkers if any nation ever did. We not only have the responsibility of the world, but we have a debt of \$2,000 for every man, woman, and child. This means a debt of \$8,000 for a family of four. Just to pay the interest on that debt takes more federal income than the nation ever raised from taxes in any year before the war. We have, also, the added costs of war pensions and expenditures for veterans.

Moreover, we must keep strong armed forces as a hope of not soon being in another war. Again and again we shall be called upon for relief and assistance to foreign countries. The \$400,000,000 for Greece and Turkey is only a beginning. The total demand over the next two years may run as much as \$3,000,000,000 above all present obligations. Demand is everywhere, at home and abroad.

#### Essentials to Health.

To meet all of these heavy demands we must have a healthy economy. This is not optional. It is a must. President Truman, Mr. Bernard Baruch, and others are calling for some of the essentials to a healthy economy. They have recently stressed longer hours, and higher productivity on the part of labor; lower profits and lower prices on the part of industry; and maximum production on the part of agriculture. These are good. They are essential, and I endorse all of them.

But one equally important item is being overlooked. It is so important, that I believe unless corrected properly it will act as a brake on our economy and prevent the very prosperity we all crave. I refer to taxes on income in the high brackets. The contention that we can keep the present high tax rate on big incomes and maintain a healthy economy is in my opinion fallacious.

#### Desire to Venture

A dynamic economy like ours requires that a lot of men each year must not only dream dreams of achievement, but that they actually must venture into business in an effort to satisfy American consumers. This is an obligation upon men who have large amounts of capital. But men in the high brackets now are being taxed up to 85 per cent of their net income. The take from income is so great as to threaten their willingness to risk. A man who could keep only 15 per cent of any additional income would not likely find it advisable to undergo the required risk necessary to increase his income.

At present prices of cotton and cottonseed, no grower can afford to lose one bale out of seven which cotton insects normally steal.

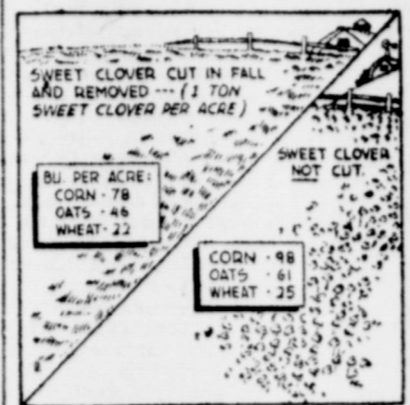

#### SHORTCHANGE THE SOIL

The benefits of clover depend on how much nitrogen and organic matter it produces, and how much of those materials is returned to the soil as clover or as manure. When sweet clover is out in the fall and removed from the field the resulting loss in nitrogen and organic matter reduces the yields of crops following in the rotation. When clover is not cut, those yields increase. The



above chart illustrates results of crop rotation tests at the Carthage soil experiment field by University of Illinois agronomists. In a three-year rotation of corn, oats and wheat, sweet clover was seeded in the wheat and plowed under for corn the next spring. On one plot the stubble sweet clover was cut in the fall and removed. On another plot the sweet clover was left uncut. Both plots were plowed the following spring. The effect on yields of corn, oats and wheat following on each plot is summarized above.

#### Business Tells a Story

Time was when it was fashionable for everyone to talk about big business and count over the gross and net sins of corporations. Of course, there were mighty good stories even then about our steadily rising standards of living. But the busybodies didn't bother with those success stories, big or little.

I have said that America is now beginning to assume her task in public relations, that of selling her ways and her freedoms and her institutions to people everywhere. I should like to say that some of our groups and institutions have special responsibilities in this job. I think that labor does, as well as business. The task is important to agriculture, to tradesmen, to education, to the professions, and to civic minded folks in every walk. Certainly, labor and industry are each so important in our economic system, that they must be interested in re-awakening the people to an appreciation of America.

#### A Report to Workers

I should like to tell you about a company that is doing its part, thereby shouldering its responsibility for this kind of public re-education. Somebody sent me a copy of a report this company makes to its employees. The report answers questions employees want to know. The answers are frank, fair, and simply stated. And that is the reason why we, as a people, have the highest standard of living of any nation in the world. No other system in any country, at any time, by any other means has ever produced so much for so many at such little cost as our 'capitalist' business does in America."

The company says frankly that it made money in 1946—about seven and one-half cents on every dollar's worth of products sold. While this record is termed a narrow margin that calls for economy all along the line, the report makes it plain that the company expects to keep on making money. All this, amidst healthy competition that cause them to keep putting out better products for less money. Tribute is paid to the keen competition they meet as an effective price regulator.

"A company that can't make money is like a ship that can't float. Neither is safe for you and your family. #### New Disease of Sweet Potatoes in the South

A new and distinctive disease of sweet potatoes known as "internal cork" has been the subject of intensive studies by Dr. C. J. Nussbaum, South Carolina experiment station. Sweet potatoes affected with the disease are characterized by the occurrence of dark brown, corky spots of irregular shape and size. There are indications that it may be possible to develop resistant strains. The disease is caused by a virus but little else is known about it.

#### Farmers' Money Not All Increased Earnings

"What farmers do now with their liquid assets and credit will determine their financial position for the next two decades. It is imperative for farmers to recognize that much of their present money in fact is not increased profits. It represents the soil fertility sold off the farm, depreciation of buildings, fences and equipment. The money farmers now have, in large part, belongs back on their land—to restore soil—to modernize—" The Land.

#### Trapping Is Good Way To Control Moles

In the spring the activities of the common mole appear to be more noticeable. Unlike rodents, such as rats and mice, moles live chiefly on earthworms and insects. The mole is unpopular with farmers because his tell tale ridges and mounds disfigure the fields, ruin new seedbeds and damage gardens and lawns. 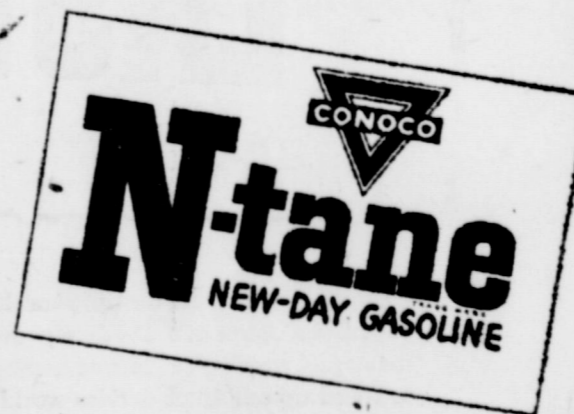

**Hitler Hope for Red Peace Told**

Planned to Keep 1943 Pact From Allies; Continue Lend-Lease.

WASHINGTON.—Hope for a Nazi armistice with Russia in 1943, which would have been kept secret from the western Allies and in which the Soviets would have continued to draw lend-lease from the United States, came to light in captured German naval documents.

Bombing of the United States with a new high-speed, long-range six-engine plane also was considered but was abandoned in July, 1943, "because the few airplanes which could get there would be of no significance but would only arouse the will to resist in the population."

**Sought Rocket Use.**  
Adm. Karl Doenitz, as commander in chief of the navy, wanted to use the V-1 robot bomb or the V-2 rocket, to attack Allied shipping at Gibraltar in the summer of 1943. But Hitler vetoed the plan because of "the risk that some of the new weapons might fall on land at Gibraltar and that the British will find out what they are."

**Eye Japan Aid.**  
"The Japanese Kwangtung army stands ready with a million men, Japan herself evidently realizes that intervention in Siberia may become necessary."

"Russia is getting considerable supplies via the Far East. Therefore the question arises whether a threat by Japan that she will enter the war against Russia will help to make the latter accept the German offer of an unannounced armistice on the eastern front, to be kept secret from the Anglo-Saxons. Russia would continue to accept lend-lease materials. This political goal is worth every sacrifice."

"If this fails, the east wall must be built as quickly as possible."  
Germany's defeat was beginning to appear likely that summer, although none of the high army and navy leaders around Hitler wanted to be the first to say so.

Hitler himself was looking for "an unexpected way out" to present itself, as he declared wistfully, it had many times in history.

The situation was "perilous," he admitted, but he hoped that the Allies would fall out among themselves the nearer they got to success.

**Yugoslav Refugees Going To Dominican Republic**

CUADRU TRUJILLO, DOMINICAN REPUBLIC.—The foreign office announced that between 5,000 and 10,000 Yugoslav refugees would be brought from Italy to colonize a new industrial development area along the Haitian border. No date has been set for the departure.

Constantin Fotitch, former Yugoslav ambassador to the United States who recently was sentenced in absentia to 20 years' imprisonment by Premier Marshal Tito's Yugoslav regime, is head of the committee planning the migration.

The foreign office said that modern cities to house the colonists would be built in Cibao, near the Haitian border, and also at Constanza. A smaller Jewish colony was established in 1940 at Sosua, on the north coast.

**Electronic Device Used to Grade Eggs**

New Method Gives Promise of Revolution.

ITHACA, N. Y. — An electronic method of grading and sorting eggs that is said to hold promise of revolutionizing egg grading, has been invented at Cornell university agricultural experiment station by Prof. Alexis L. Romanoff.

It sorts eggs for internal quality and potential perishability better than present procedures, telling about internal conditions that cannot be seen.

Ordinarily eggs are graded by candling. An egg is held before a light, and the candler observes size of air cell, color and movement of yolk, and clearness of albumen, all of which help to determine the grade.

In the new Romanoff method, the egg is placed into a coil lying in an electromagnetic field of radio frequency. In this field the current passes through the egg, which absorbs the electric power. The power is measured and shows up on a meter.

Good eggs absorb the least power and poor eggs the most. The electronic method does not reveal blood spots if present, making one candling necessary, but it does eliminate several subsequent candling operations, and this would be an immense saving on the billions of market eggs.

In the experimental laboratory equipment the meter shows fine distinctions in egg quality, but for wide use the dial could simply be labeled, "Good, medium, poor," Romanoff said.

The new method is considered close to 100 per cent accurate as compared with the 75 per cent accuracy of the candling system. Cornell Research foundation has received the gift of the patent on the invention. The device is not yet made in a commercial form.

Romanoff came upon the electronic method through research on egg fertility extending back to 1938. In the process of studying thousands of eggs, certain peculiarities were observed, due to quality. Some of the differences between fertile and infertile eggs, for example, were so small that a new method had to be devised to determine them. And thus electronics came to his poultry laboratory.

**Divorced 27 Years Ago, Elderly Couple Rewed**

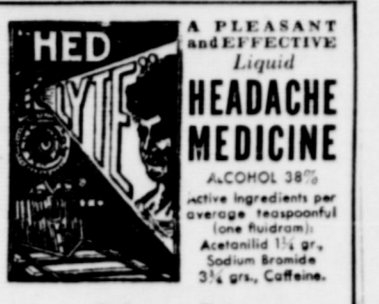
