## Katy will Likely Tap O'Donnell Country

The rapid development of the Southplains calls for more railroads and the next few years will witness great rivalry between the trunk lines for the business of this territory. The revival of the proposed extension of the Katy from Rotan westward through Snyder, Gail, Lamesa and Seminole to Roswell, New Mexico, is of considerable interest to the people of this section. According to information given out by the railroad commission, the Katy has made application for a permit to extend the line along the route mentioned.

A preliminary survey made by the Katy several years ago placed the line through O'Donnell, running on west by way of Seagraves. The engineers at that time made the statement that the long draw cutting the cap rock near Tredway afforded an easy grade for the big climb, and, in fact, was regarded as the only feasible route to the top. It is likely that the old line will be considered when a new survey is made, and with the proper inducement O'Donnell will stand splendid chance of getting this road.

O'Donnell is the center of the finest farming district on the Southplains and last year shipped out above 14,000 bales of cotton and many hundred cars of feed. This season will see this amount of tonnage doubled and when the many thousand acres of raw lands are put in cultivation, it will be doubled again, making the town a prize that any railroad would be glad to have.

O'Donnell is the natural gateway for the proposed extension of the Katy and there is a splendid chance for the town to secure it if we will offer the proper inducement.

## American Legion to Raise Endowment Fund

While O'Donnell has no organized American Legion Post, yet a quota of \$50 has been set as our share of the \$5,000,000 Endowment Campaign Fund for disabled veterans and World's War widows and orphans. According to C. A. Baldwin who has the matter in charge, the town will not fail to respond in the undertaking of raising this money when the needs and purposes of the fund is made known. A drive to raising the \$50 will be started at once.

The endowment fund means above everything else a permanent square deal for two classes in America who suffer most by the war. Those two classes are the men for whom the war has had no armistice and the children who were deprived of paternal care by the deaths of their fathers in and since the war. It means the guarantee of rehabilitation to disabled men as long as there are disabled veterans of the war. It means homes for orphans, homes for every destitute waif of the 35,000 who survive dead ex-service men.

The cause is worthy and O'Donnell should respond.

### Sanderson Building Nearing Completion

The Sanderson building is nearing completion and has reached the stage where J. G. McGarroll, who will occupy the store room fronting Doak street moved in this week. It will be near September 1st before he will have his stock of dry goods opened for business.

J. E. Baker has added a Chevrolet truck to his fleet of oil and gas trucks.

Work on the foundation of another brick on the west side of Block A on Doak street is now under way and it is planned to complete the building in sixty days. The building is being constructed by C. O. Lawler for T. A. Carlisle of Blackwell and will be the home of the Carlisle & Company's dry goods and grocery store.

The building will be 26x90 feet in dimensions and will be of tile faced with brick. The front will be of ornamental brick and plate glass with recessed double doors. The recessed flooring will be of ornamental mosaic tile. The building will set back eight feet allowing a twenty-foot concrete walk in front. Besides the light coming from the front and back windows, a large skylight will flood the interior with all the light necessary.

Mr. Lawler is under contract to complete the building by the first of September, the cost to be \$6,000.

The family moved to Tahoka several weeks ago, and it is said that they have lately been in

very straightened financial circumstances. Neighbors and friends have assisted them with some of the necessities of life.

Roberts had a severe attack of appendicitis recently while in jail but the affection seemed to have disappeared entirely before his release. His case will probably be tried at the first term of the new court, which we understand, convenes in August.—Lynn County News.

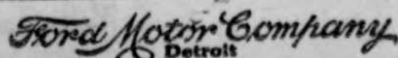
