## PLANS WELL UNDER WAY FOR BIG CELEBRATION

### INTEREST IN DAWSON CO. TOURNAMENT GROWS DAILY

More entries were received last week for the annual Dawson County Tournament, and more are expected before the date. Morton, Tex., Hobbs N. and Roperville are the two new clubs, bringing the possible entry up to seventeen of the fastest West Texas ball clubs. Entries are listed as tentative, and are: Stamford, Haskell, Lamesa, O'Donnell, Tahoka, Wilson, Sheffield, Flower Grove, Ackerly, Midway, Lubbock, Lamesa, New Moore.

With over \$200 offered in prize money it is expected that several clubs will be entered before the date. As no entry fee for the tournament will be charged, making the expense to the teams their personal expenses, they are everything but a loss.

According to Bill White, Lamesa, who is in charge of the tournament, the clubs listed is strengthening their teams, preparing to play first baseball during this tournament.

O'Donnell, with the popular Shorty right as manager has added Juan, who is in charge of the tournament, and the Reeves brothers and others as a formidable entry.

Several local boys are playing on the Hobbs team, notably George and A. V. Williams.

The Ackerly team is always a good one and has always been one of the best drawing cards of the tournament.

Both Haskell and Stamford are members of the fast Wichita Valley league, and although their teams are as yet tentative, managers of the two teams state that if possible they will be present.

Harvey Munn was known in this section as the pitcher of the Lamesa club and his presence on that team assures them of being a strong leader.

Several home town players that are playing elsewhere at the present time are expected back to strengthen the Lamesa team. The most noted of these are probably the White boys, and Bailey, who was one of the outstanding players of the tournament last year in the present playing at Jamestown, North Dakota.

While information concerning the clubs of the other teams is not so complete, it is assumed that they have the same amount of interest in the tournament, and that the winners will be determined by good judgment.

In fact, it is our opinion that the person who would endeavor to win the tournament will be the one who has the most money to spend on the tournament.

As stated last week, all managers of entering teams will meet in Lamesa at 8:30 P. M. Saturday, August 3rd, to arrange the schedule and otherwise take care of matters pertaining to the tournament.

Play is to start August 15th with the winners to be played daily until the winner is decided. First place winner will receive \$150 with second place to receive \$50.

A small admission fee will be charged fans each day to pay for the expenses incidental to putting on the tournament.

### Hubbers Lose To Morton To Be Eliminated at Lubbock

In a ten-inning game which was as hard on spectators as it was on the players, the O'Donnell Hubbers lost their second game in the annual Lubbock Invitation tournament Friday afternoon when Morton trotted in with seven runs to the Hubbers' six.

Several carloads of local fans accompanied the boys to Lubbock, and some of them haven't yet succeeded in swallowing their hearts after they got up in their throats.

The boys played airtight baseball throughout the game, and only a fumble at second in the tenth inning prevented them from bringing home the bacon. And to the satisfaction of homefolks, the boys looked and acted like gentlemen, taking the breaks of the game in the best of spirits. So, even if they didn't place for the money, the whole South Plains baseball fraternity knows that the O'Donnell club is made up of clean, fair-playing boys.

Pearce pitched one of his best games of the season, holding the Morton batsmen beautifully until the last of the fifth, when they began hitting him. Costello, lanky Maxcat, led from North Texas, took charge of the mound then, and proceeded to do some plain and fancy tossing that had the opposition guessing.

Held scoreless for three innings, Morton landed on him for three successive singles in the tenth. With the bases loaded and nobody out, Costello settled down to some real work, and struck out two men. Two were out and two strikes had been called on the third man up, when the apple catch was upset. Ward, sent in as a pinch hitter, hit the grounder straight to second. Little Lemmons anxious to make the right play, got in too big a hurry, and did just what any player might have done in the same situation—fumbled the ball just long enough to let in a run, making the score 7-0.

The Hubbers had taken the lead in leading off with a beautiful double, the third inning, Stewart (Alabama) and scoring on Melton's single. Paul Reeves, scrappy little right fielder, socked the ball for a home run, scoring Melton ahead of him.

Ward sacrificed between second and first, and Burke tripped after two were out, coming in on Berry's single. They added another counter in the fifth when their pitcher, Jack Burke, hit a four-bagger.

Jimmy Britt slugged out another home run for the Hubbers in the sixth scoring the fourth run for his team. Morton scored four runs in the same inning, and O'Donnell tied the score in the seventh when Harris and Costello came home on an infield fumble.

According to local experts, the Hubbers lost three good chances to win the game; first, when Harris muffed the ball at home plate, allowing a run; second, when Melton fumbled to come home from third as Melton sacrificed between second and first, and third when Lemmons fumbled at second. But no criticisms are in order, for the boys played real baseball throughout the tournament.


