"It is a little easier now to qualify for disability benefits under social security", John G. Hutton, social security", John G. Hutton, Manager of the Lubbock social se-curity office, said recently.

As a result of changes made by Congress in 1958, the work requirements were liberalized so that some people who were previously turned down may now be eligible. The manager emphasized, however, that there was no change in the requirement that the disability must be very severe and of indefinite duration.

Hutton explained that people who gradually became disabled found it hard to meet the requirement of 1 1-2 years of work in the 3 years before disability, and their applications had to be denied. They may now reapply under the recent change in the law. Those who are 50 years of age or over should re-apply promptly to avoid losing any back payments due them.

"Anyone whose application was

denied because the disability was found not severe enough". Hutton add, "is not helped by this change in the law and a new application would serve no purpose."



Glass School Reward For Not Tossing Rocks

DARIEN, Conn.-Because junior high children in this town can be trusted not to throw stones, educators have rewarded them with a modernly daylighted building that contains entire walls of glass.

The new structure, designed by Ketchum, Gina and Sharp, New York architectural firm, not only has floor-to-ceiling windows which might tempt ordinary kids, but also corridors that are lined with glass walls.

It was decided to use this treatment, which assures extraordinarily fine daylighting in all classroom and general areas, after Darien schoolmen reported they never were bothered with the kind of vandalism that makes it necessary to have 100 per cent replacement of window glass every two years in some metropolitan cen-

As an added feature, the classroom windows have fixed metal louvers to cut out sky glare. The result is one of the most perfectly daylighted schools in the nation
