

MAIN POINTS OF MR. WHITE'S TALK GIVEN

Following are excerpts from a speech delivered by Agriculture Commissioner John White at the annual O'Donnell Rotary Club Rural-Urban Day banquet last Tuesday night.

"Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson's insistence on holding down cotton allotments this year is going to force us to import cotton from foreign countries. At a time when our farmers must plant to prosper, the current allotments will not produce enough top quality cotton to meet our domestic demand.

As a result, we will find ourselves in the absurd position of bringing cotton into this country from Mexico, Brazil and possibly even countries friendly to communism such as Egypt.

Obviously, some of our government planners are suffering from a bad case of statistical astigmatism. Their current allotments are based on an estimated production of 11 1-2 million bales. They disregard the fact that much of this went into the soil bank and will not produce any cotton.

Our textile industries are facing a serious shortage of better quality cotton. Last year our upland cotton was lower in grade than at any time in the past 12 years. Middling and higher grade production was the smallest since 1949.

Why should we let other countries produce cotton for us when we are capable of doing it ourselves? The weather is promising the soil is ripe and the farmers are ready—but the present farm policy is too restrictive.

School Tax Election Set Feb. 22

Senate Bill 116 Is Subject

Following a community meeting Friday night held in the high school auditorium, members of the school board of the O'Donnell Consolidated Independent School District met in special session and ordered a tax election to be voted on Feb. 22nd at School's Tax Office here.

In the community meeting the superintendent of schools, W. A. Skinner, told of the rising costs of operating the school and pointed out several areas in which he believed the school to be deficient due largely to the lack of funds. Additional teachers are needed badly in all three levels of the white schools. A new teacher is being added to the Negro school starting this week.

Ransom Galloway of Municipal Securities explained the advantages of voting Senate Bill 116 as a measure of putting more money in the school budget from local tax sources. Briefly explained the bill works as follows—

The Bond Tax Rate and the Maintenance tax rate are separate under provisions of Senate Bill 116. Sufficient funds will be appropriated to service the bonds each year. Under present bonded indebtedness it takes about 40 cents per \$100 valuation to service these bonds. Unless additional bonds are voted this portion of the taxing will remain much the same.

Under provisions of Senate Bill 116 the Maintenance tax rate will be set at a maximum of \$1.50 per \$100 valuation. Each year after the budget has been figured the School Board will determine the necessary tax rate for the current school year.

The Superintendent of Schools will be glad to explain in more detail the workings of Senate Bill 116 to those interested in contacting him.

This community can have schools only as good as they are willing to pay for. Mr. Skinner said that he does not believe that we have wasteful practices but that every dollar of the taxpayers money is being put to good use.

School Board Meets Into Wee Hours

The regular February meeting of the School Board of the local school district was held last Thursday night continuing until 1:30 in the morning.

The regular trustee election was called for Saturday April 5th. Under a new state law, deadline for filing as a trustee candidate is 30 days before the election which is March 6th. Terms of Wayland Taylor and O. G. Smith, Jr. are expiring. Persons interested in filing may do so by filing personally or by petition at school tax office.

In other business the Board received the audit from Watson Wilson who explained the summary of the school's finances. Mr. Wilson was complimented on his efficient audit.

Because more and more Negro students are residing in the extreme corners of this district, it was decided by the Board to bring in the one or two Negro students living to the east on the white students' bus. Rural Negroes living to the west of town are transported under a private contract. Savings in the above transportation costs will go away on buying more books, supplies, etc.

Coming up for a major and prolonged discussion was a more strict discipline in the school system especially on a high school level. O'Donnell, we can proudly say, has no major problem as do many schools but your Board feels that an ounce of prevention is rather to be desired than a pound of "cure".

V. A. Quiz

Q — I have a World War 11 GI term insurance policy. Do I have the right to borrow on this policy?
A — No. GI term insurance has no loan value. However, you may convert to a permanent plan of GI insurance, if you wish. Permanent insurance does build up a loan value, after it has been in force for one year.

Q — I am getting VA compensation for service-connected condition. Recently my condition got worse. What steps must I take to get an increase in compensation?
A — You must submit new medical evidence, such as an adequate statement from your physician or a medical report of a recent period of hospitalization.

Q — I plan to take flight training under the Korean GI Bill. At what rate will I use up my GI entitlement?
A — Your entitlement will be used up at the rate of one day for each \$1.25 paid as a GI training allowance.

Q — The television station in my town, in cooperation with a local college, is conducting a college course for which credit will be given. I am eligible for War Orphanas schooling. Could I take this TV course under the program?
A — No. The law does not permit courses given over radio or television.

Q — I am a disabled Korea veteran eligible for vocational rehabilitation training. I also am eligible for educational benefits under the War Orphanas program. Would it be possible to receive training under both programs?
A — No. You must choose one program or the other. You cannot train under both. Further, once you have made an election, you may not switch to the other training program.

Q — I have a service-connected dental condition for which I am drawing a disability compensation. Is there any time limit for outpatient dental treatment for my condition?
A — There is no time limit for compensable dental disabilities. You may apply for outpatient dental treatment at any time and as often as you need it for the compensable dental disabilities involved.

Q — I understand the Korean GI Bill prohibits courses in dancing. I am majoring in physical education in college and one of my required courses is in group dancing. Does the prohibition apply to this course?
A — No. The prohibition will not apply so long as the dancing course is an integral part of your physical education studies and so long as it will give you college credits.

Q — I have just added the total disability income provisions to my World War 2 GI insurance policy. If I become disabled and receive the monthly income benefits, will they decrease the face amount of my policy?
A — No. The disability payments will in no way decrease the face value of your type of policy.

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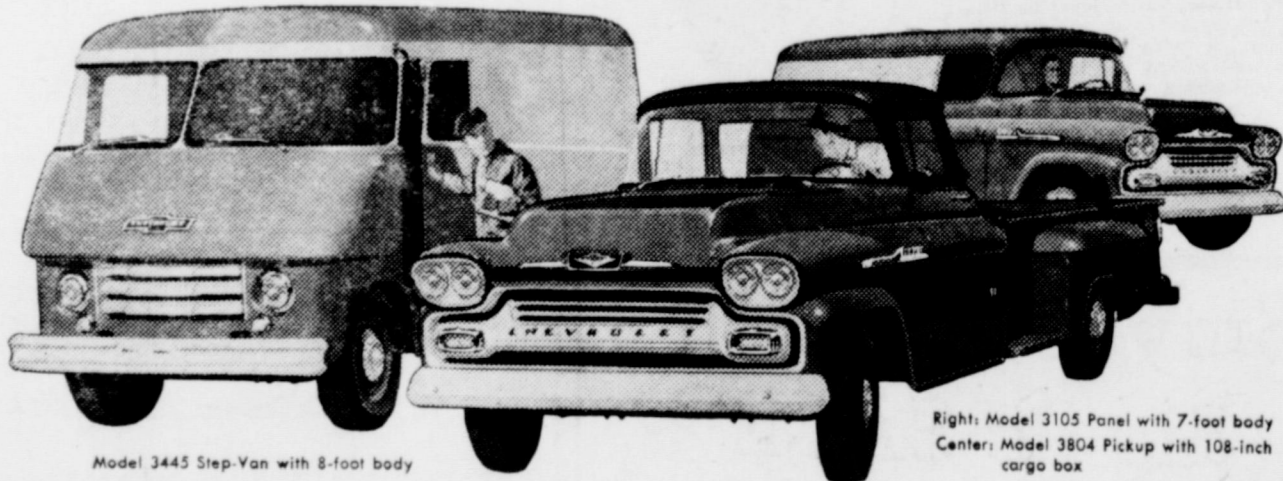

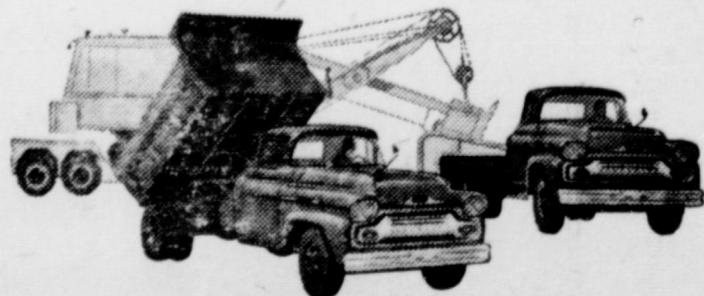

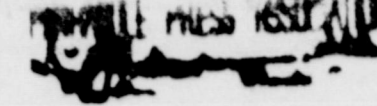

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FIRST AID IS IMPORTANT

Every three seconds someone in the nation needs prompt first aid for an accident or illness. Often the right kind of aid makes the difference between life and death.

Being prepared to give effective first aid takes time and study — before emergencies arise. It is too late to learn and dangerous to guess afterward. You and your family can meet most emergencies by enrolling now in a first aid class, learning how to follow thru on these ten aids to give first.

1. Act promptly. Examine victim carefully from head to toe. Look for breathing obstructions, bleeding, and broken bones.

2. Send for help. First aid "holds the line" until a physician takes over. Call him at once.

3. Stop bleeding. A snug bandage or pressure dressing usually checks bleeding. If not, press firmly at the point which cuts off blood flow to the injured area. Use a tourniquet only when other methods fail.

4. Look for shock — face drained of color, cold moist skin, rapid weak pulse, fainting. Wrap the victim in blankets, make him lie down, unless doing so will make other injuries worse, and try to calm him. If he can swallow, has no abdominal injury, and is not vomiting, have him drink as much "shock solution" as possible. Make the solution by adding one teaspoon of table salt to a half teaspoon of baking soda into a quart of water.

5. In poisonings, follow antidote instructions on the poison container, if it is at hand. Otherwise give egg whites beaten in water, or plain water, to dilute poison. If the poison was not corrosive or kerosene, induce vomiting.

6. Give artificial respiration in case of electrical shock. Learn artificial respiration techniques now before an emergency.

7. Handle with care. Don't move an injured person unless necessary and then use a stretcher or make one with blankets, a board, or ladders padded with clothing.

8. Care for burns by applying a sterile gauze dressing and cover with bandages. Do not pull off clothing stuck to burned tissue. In case of chemical burns, rinse immediately with plenty of water.

9. After covering wounds with sterile dressing, bandage to guard against infection, reduce bleeding and lessen pain.

A sound forage program for the farm or ranch that will meet all needs for grazing, hay and silage requires a great deal of planning, says E. M. Trew, extension specialist. He suggests a visit with the local county agent for details and planning.

CHERRY PIE SUPREME

- 3/4 cup PET Evaporated Milk
- 3 Tablespoons cornstarch
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1-lb. 4-oz. can sour, pitted cherries
- 2 Tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1 Tablespoon lemon juice
- Few grains salt
- 1 cup sifted, powdered sugar

Have ready a baked 9-inch pastry shell. Chill in ice tray until almost frozen around the edge. Meanwhile, mix in 1-qt. saucepan the cornstarch and sugar. Drain cherries, saving syrup. If necessary add water to syrup to make 1 cup. Stir cherry mixture into cornstarch mixture. Cook and stir over medium heat until very thick and clear, about 7 min. Cook thoroughly, then add drained cherries. Take out cherries to decorate pie. Put rest of cherry mixture into pastry shell. Melt butter in small saucepan. Remove from heat and mix in until smooth the lemon juice and powdered sugar. Cool thoroughly. Put cold milk into a cold 1-qt. bowl. Whip with rotary beater by hand, or with electric beater at high speed, until stiff. Whip in cooled powdered sugar mixture just until mixed, about 1/4 at a time. Do not overbeat. Arrange around edge of pie. Decorate with the 18 cherries. Chill an hour before serving.
