MORE MONEY AVAILABLE FOR **HOSPITALS**

More money is now available for building hospitals and health cent-ers in Texas, State Health Officer

Federal money channeled to the states for hospital contsruction has been increased from \$75 million to \$150 million and the program of federal assistance to hospital construction has been extended thru the fiscal year ending June 30th. 1955. The increase in time and money is contained in an ammend ment to the hospital Survey and Construction act.

Under provisions of the act, various states, to which the federal money is appropriated, makes the money available to local areas for hospital or public health center construction if a survey shows the area is in need of such facilities.

As of Cctober, when the Amendment became effective, the states will put up half the money for new construction and the local area, in which the hospital or public heal th center is to be built must provide the other half of the total construct ion costs.

Prior to October, the put up only one third and the local area was held responsible for rais ing two thirds of the toal construct ion costs. On new projects which had been approved prior to October the local area must still put up

two thirds of the entire cost. Several hospitals have been completed in Texas under the program and other projects are currently ander construction thruout

THE U. N. didn't go for that. Russia, its members claimed, was referring only to declared manufacture and materials, but what "hidden and undeclared" production and stockpiles. Vishinsky got nowhere with his proposal.

Then, the U. N. turned around, placed the shoe of warmongering on the foot upon which they felt it belonged. The United States and other western powers called upon Russia to stop its "campaign of hate" and cooperate in a 12-point program for peace.

The 12 points were: Stop threatening or using force contrary to the U. N. charter. Stop interfering with the independence of any other country and the fomenting of civil strife. Carry out in good faith all international agreements. Afford all U. N. bodies full cooperation. Promote full freedom of religion and political expression and full respect of all other fundamental rights. Promote higher standards of living for all peoples. Remove information barriers. Participate fully in the U. N.'s work. Settle international disputes peacefully. Cooperate in armaments control Agree to exercise national sovereignty jointly with other nations to attain international control of atomic energy. Urge five big powers to broaden their cooperation in the security council of the U. N., and to exercise restraint in using the veto.

THE FIRST REACTION of those conversant with Russian policy as it has been manifest thus far must have wondered if the western powers had taken complete leave of their senses in making any such proposal to Moscow. They might as well have asked the Russians to turn over the Kremlin to the Christian Endeavor society, enroll Joe Stalin as a Boy Scoutmaster. and to turn the politburo into a Sunday choral society. Even a kindergarten child would have known better than to expect Soviet agreement to any of the 12 points.

STRIKE ENDS:

Steel Costliest

America's costliest steel strike ended, appropriately enough on Armistice day, with the CIO steelworkers winning demands for an industry-financed insurance - pen-

sion formula. THE CAPITULATION of U. S. steel, bellwether of the industry as regards labor relations, brought an end to the crippling strike. Four smaller firms settled on the same terms the same day, terms which followed the pattern accepted by Bethlehem steel, first big company to sign with the

According to a CIO spokesman, the union-company agreement embodied such terms as a minimum \$100 monthly pension to workers aged 65 with 25 years service, with the employer paying all the cost, and an insurance program, costing five cents an hour per man, with the company and worker sharing the cost.

FARM RATS:

A Formula

The farmers in the Rio Grande tomato fields were beginning to get results in their interminable war on rats after garnishing their crops with poisoned grain. A FEW WEEKS AGO the rats

were swarming into tomato and green pepper fields near La Grulla, Tex. They spread methodically up and down the Rio Grande until the invasion covered a 15-mile strip, one to two miles wide in places. Farmers lost first pickings completely in several fields.

Then they began to dust their crops with poisoned grain. Said grower Ralph Jones: "That poison sure does the business. It's stopped the losses.'

But not before serious damage was done to 2,000 irrigated and cultivated acres.

U.S. PAY ROLL:

Tops 10 Billion

United States government operational expense, long in the astronomical bracket, had reached a total annual figure of 10 billion, 200 million dollars. That figure, in missile with "human intelligence" the aggregate, is almost meaningless to the average American. But broken down to show how it affects the individual, it could be brought very much home to the taxpayer. It was costing each American \$227 per capita. in a matter of seconds.

SWEDEN Talks Back

The United States senate, collectively and individually, has been called by some colorful and lurid names-but it remained for some Swedish editors to hurl the most devastating blast at that august body.

A SWEDISH NEWSPAPER, the liberal afternoon Expressen, had this to say:

"The U. S. senate is certainly a high assembly, but it is also a dumping place for all sorts of quaint characters and the most ignorant politicians from the darkest corners of the union. And it must be pretty dark in Oklahoma.

The shaft was aimed, really, at Oklahoma's Senator Thomas, Democrat, who was critical of the way Sweden had received a senate appropriations subcommittee visiting Marshall plan countries to see how U. S. funds were being

Sweden, it appeared, had received quite a bit of Marshall plan aid, but had sort of "snubbed" Thomas and his committee. Thomas declared the country to which he "referred" in his criticism, expressed in Vienna, "had helped no one in the past 135 years," and if got any more Marshall plan funds, it would be over his protest.

The "QUAINT CHARACTERS" and "most ignorant politicians" the Swedes referred to in the senate, or who had ever been a member of it, included some right influential fellows who might have much to say about continuing Marshall plan aid - among them, President and former Senator Harry S. Truman.

west German government spokesman who indicated this was one of the decisions reached at the big three Paris conference. U. S. secretary of state Dean

Acheson and German chancellor Konrad Adenauer had agreed upon the need for keeping western troops in Germany. This same spokesman said the

appointment of Soviet Marshal Konstantin Rokossovsky as commander-in-chief of the Polish army was construed to mean that Russian troops would be withdrawn from eastern Germany soon. EVEN THOUGH the Russians

. The old alibi that muzzle recoil messes up one's shooting accuracy has been scrapped for all time by recent demonstrations at the research laboratories of the Western cartridge company division of Olin industries at East Alton, Ill. There science answered two ques-


tions asked by shooters since one first experienced the "kick" of a Questions answered were; Does the visible recoil of a gun occur before the bullet leaves the muzzle and destroy aim, or does the gun "kick" after the bullet is safely on its aimed way. The answer was that visible re-

coil does not occur until after the bullet is some 30 feet away from the muzzle, which shows apparently indisputably that recoil, or "kick" has nothing to do with a shooter's

The photograph series here illustrates how this determination was made.



Here the test rifle is placed in recoil rest to simulate as far as possible conditions under which it would be fired by a man. The butt is in a spenge rubber pocket. The muzzle end rests upon a hard rubber cylinder with a depressed cen-ter and upon the block of wood used as a reference point for the tree micro-flash pictures. The trigger is pulled by a wire



ing how the micro-flash were made, this diswire, 1/100 of an inch in iameter, is stretched before the muzzle of the rifle across the path the bullet will take. When the bullet snips the wire in two, it breaks an electrical circuit thus having the bullet take its own picture.



And here's the proof that recoil doesn't interfere with aim, as the rifle muzzle is still seeurely on the rest, while the bullet has already left the muzzle and has broken the disjunctor wire. The snug fit of the muzzle on the rest shows recoil has not yet occurred. Other photos showed that visible recoil does not occur until bullet is some 30 feet from muzzle. ΔΔΔ



Make Your Fruit Cakes, Plum Puddings in Time For Leisurely Ripening

BEFORE YOU GET CAUGHT in the crush of holiday shopping or tangled in festive tinsel and wrapping, give a thought to your fruit cakes and plum puddings. These should be made at least a month or more



before the holidays to give time ripen and mellow so their flavors will be perfect. It's a comfort-

ing thought, too, many homemakers have found in years past, to have their Christmas desserts all snugly wrapped, ready to be eaten well in advance of all the other holiday food preparation.

In case you want to give away fruit cake and plum pudding as presents with "warmest regards" from your own kitchen, decide exactly who will be the lucky receivers, and plan accordingly.

PLAN TWO DAYS for making your fruit cake. The first day is usually spent ordering the fruits and nuts and getting them ready, along with lining the pans with paper. The second day is spent mixing and baking, as well as decorating and wrapping the cakes for

Cut the cherries in halves. Thinly slice the pineapple, apricots and eitron. Wash raisins and currants and dry them. Blanch and chop almonds. Mix all these ingredients together. Sift together flour, baking spices. and flour mixtures thoroughly. Cream together shortening and sugar. Add egg yolks and beat thoroughly. Add cider alternately with fruit mixture until all are thoroughly mixed. Beat egg whites stiff and fold into cake mixture. Line the bottoms of 4 pans (83/4 x 43/4 inches) with brown paper. Grease the paper and fill pans with cake mixture 3/4 full. Place pans on a rack in a large roaster which has about 1/2 inch of water at the bottom. Cover the pan and set in a slow (275°f.) oven for 21/2 hours. Remove pans from roaster and set in oven, at same temperature, for 1/2 hour to

allow cake to dry. Plum Pudding (Makes 2 3-pound molds) 1 pound seedless raisins pound currants

4 cup chopped nut meats 21/2 cups sifted flour teaspoons baking soda teaspoon cloves

teaspoon allspice teaspoon nutmeg teaspoon cinnamon teaspoons salt 4 eggs

1/2 cup grape juice 21/2 cups fine, hard bread

crumbs

cup sugar 2 cups pure dark molasses 2 cups buttermilk 11/2 cups finely chopped suct

Wash and dry raisins and currants, combine with nutmeats. Dredge with one cup flour. Sift remaining flour, baking soda, spices and salt. Beat eggs, add crumbs, sugar, molasses, buttermilk, suet and grape juice. Add raisin mixture and blend thoroughly. Add flour mixture; mix thoroughly. Pour into two greased three-pound molds. Cover and steam for three hours, Cool puddings, wrap in heavy waxed paper and store in a cool place. Re-steam to heat and serve with hard or other type sauce.

Garnish your ham with steamed apples which have been molded in cider or lemon gelatin. The flav-

"Checked" Enamel QUESTION: Is there any way to smooth the enamel on our woodwork without completely removing it? It has several coats of various colors of enamel and varnish on it. There are fine cracks or checks in some of the enamel. Could we rub it with turpentine or something, then sand it before repainting? If we have to remove all the old paint, how should we do that? Use a paint and varnish remover?

We want to repaint our woodwork,

but those checks show through so

that it doesn't look nice.

ANSWER: You have the right idea, but in reverse-that is, you should use the sandpaper first, and then clean off with turpentine before repainting. If you were going to varnish, you would have to take off all the old finish; but as long as you are going to use paint again, I do not believe it will be necessary to take off all the paint, which would be quite a job. But the cracks and checks should be sanded out smoothly so that they will not show through the new

Prophets False & True

Lesson for December 4, 1949

GOD is neither silent nor dead. We hear myriads of voices—preachers, teachers, editors, columnists, poets and politicians, all professing to tell us the truth. When a man claims

to speak in the name of truth, is there any way by which his claim can be tested? It is an old problem.

Away back in Bible times every prophet had his rivals, the false Dr. Foreman prophets. The false

were far more numerous, they often had immense prestige and government subsidies besides. How was the common man to tell the true prophets from the false?

Notion of Man or Word of God?

ONE DIFFERENCE between the true and false prophets, of course, was that the false ones passed out their own ideas, while the true ones gave voice to the ideas of God. Some of the false prophets even dug down into what we now call the subconscious, and told their dreams as if they meant something.

The false prophets of our own times are still the people who draw on their own minds, even on their day-dreams, to furnish messages for the people. The gypsy dreambooks are still with us. Astrologers flourish, and not always on the side streets. All sorts of queer cults profess to tell us what is coming next and what we ought to do.

Before we take a modern "prophet" seriously we should ask: Is what he is saying, his own idea or God's idea? In this 20th century after Christ, it should be easier to know God's ideas are than it was 27 centuries ago in Jeremiah's time.

For now that Christ has come, we can safely check all the self-styled prophets with the message and the mind of Christ.

Is the voice of the people the voice of God?

THE FALSE PROPHETS were always popular, the true ones seldom. Mere unpopularity does not prove a man a true prophet; but you may be sure that if a man says only what people like to hear, always tickling the ears and feeding the pride of his listeners, he is no true spokesman for God.

Not that the true prophet is always insulting his hearers. The Lord's prophets often speak comforting and welcome words, to be sure. But a steady outpouring of soothing-syrup is not what we would expect from a genuine prophet.

Man is often most proud when he is most wrong; and then God has to sweep the man down. Don't take too seriously the men who merely reinforce your prejudices and shore up your pride; they are more likely fake prophets than true. The voice of the people is not always the will of God.

Time is the Test

That great prophet Moses (Deut. 18) had already given a practical test of a true prophet: Does what he says turn out to be true? Can he really see into tomorrow? Alas, we may have to wait until tomorrow to find out for sure; but tomorrow always comes, and when it comes, the prophets of today will be shown up for what they are, true or false. Time is the test. Not, Is it likely?

Truth and Right are Twins

PERHAPS the worst feature of the false prophets who were Jeremiah's competitors was their real immorality. "Their course is evil and their might is not right, he said (23:10, American transla-tion). "They commit adultery and walk in lies, they strengthen the hands of evildoers so that no one turns from his evil ways" (v. 14).

God's spokesman can never also speak for the enemies of God. Whenever you hear any-one talking as if we could now get "beyond good and evil," or as if the Ten Commandments were something we had outgrown, then you may know you are listening to a false prophet.

There are no new commandments but the one which sums up all of them: Love one another. Prophets of hate, prophets of dissension, of lust, these may be speaking for themselves or for the devil -but not for God.
