HUMAN CONTACT MAY BE A FACTOR IN POLIO

This is the season of the year when an increase in poliomyelitis can be expected and Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer, is urging the public to cooperate in helping to prevent the spread of this

where poliomyelitis or symptoms of this disease are present. Prompt ness in diagnosing pollomyelitis is one of the most important factors

in its control. Direct contact between persons is the chief factor in the spread of infantile paralysis and since carriers are difficult to determine, it is advisable to reduce to a minimum all human contacts during any outbreak of this disease.

Dr. Holle stressed the fact that a rigid program of sanitation is advisable since it has been suspect ed that flies and other seasonal insects may convey the virus of polio. He added that insect trans-mission has not been scientifically demonstrated but pointed out that sanitation is always advisable controlling disease and that filth is likely to prove dangerous.

Early symptims of infantile para lysis are headache, fever, vomiting, unusual drowsiness, and irritability, followed by stiffness in the neck and back. Children under five years are most susceptible and all children under 12 years should be watched for suspicious symptoms.

VA Quiz

Q. I'm planning to take farm training under the Korean GI Bill but I found out I'll have to pay \$30 a month tuition. My cousin, a World War II veteran and the Government paid his tuit-Why the difference?

A. Your cousin trained under the World War II GI bill; you will be training under the Korean GI bill. They are separate laws, and each operates differently. Under the Korean GI Bill, you pay a,l train ing expenses yourself. But you get a single monthly allowance to help do this. Under the World War II GI bill, the VA paid a veteran's training costs.

Q. My husband was killed in Korea, and I have been receiving monthly indemnity payments of \$92.90. Will those payments stop if I remarry?

A. No. Remarriage will not bar

vour continued entitlement to the indemnity payments.
Q. I am a Korean veteran and I

am thinking of opening a business. I will have to wait for several years in order to accumulate enough cash. When I'm ready, will I be able to get a GI business loan or is the program due to expire soon?
Q. I am planning to take flight training under the Korean GI bill. a year, the same as veterans taki g

Will I be allowed 30 days absences trade and vocational courses?

A. No. Under the Korean GI bill, you will be paid on the basis of flight instruction actually received -- and nothing more. You will not be paid for absences.







Get Longer Life, **Better Service From** Your Appliances

I you've been plagued with many electrical repairs for appliances, resolve to take better care of them in the future.

That dreadful buzzing sound which your vacuum cleaner starts making spells trouble usually, and trouble which might have been saved if you'd just picked up loose hairpins, marbles, buttons or string before starting to use it.

This and other simple measures add longer life and better service to appliances.

Protect Electric Cords

Do you have an electric cord to disconnect? Don't pull it out of the socket by gripping the cord. Hold the plug and pull. Should the plug stick, and they sometimes do, if the cord has been plugged in for any length of time, rock the plug gently from side to side, pulling gently as you

Electric cords to your irons can amount to a great deal of money if you're careless about them. Not only can you pull the cord loose from the plug, but the cord frays because of its use.

Remove the cord from the iron by gripping the plug rather than the socket, just as in the case of a cord attached to a wall outlet.

A cup hook, a piece of cord and a plumb weight can be attached to the wall where you iron to hold the ironing cord out of the way while you iron. This will still give free play when you need the cord at different locations on the ironing board.

Overloading Appliances

One of the major appliances to be overloaded frequently is the washing machine. Either weigh the load or check in some receptacle like a basket so that you can avoid making the machine work too hard. The manufacturer usually gives specifications as to the weight the machines does efficiently.

You can overload the refrigerator with ice if you don't defrost regularly. This may, of course, vary with the season. When the frost becomes a quarter of an inch thick, it's time to defrost!

Always wipe spilled foods or grease from the gasket or rubber seal around the door. Keep your fingers off the rubber when you open the door so it does not beome sticky.


