AMENDMENT MAKES S. S. MORE LIBERAL
 Monthly benefits for women at age 62 instead of 65 beginning with November 1956, for disabled workers at age 50, beginning July 1957, benefits for children age 18 or over who were disabled before they reached 18, were added to the old-age and survivors insurance program when the 1956 Social Security Amendment was signed into law.

Under the amended law, working women, wives of men receiving old age insurance payments, and the widows of insured workers can start getting monthly benefits at age of 62. Working women and wives who apply before age 65 will receive benefits at reduced rates on a sliding scale. Benefits for widows, based on their husband's earnings, will not be reduced. Payment for women who are already 62 and who can qualify under the amendment can begin with the November benefit checks due early in December.

GREEN EXPLAINS BOLL. PAYMENTS
 The Lynn County AEC and Dee R. Green, county manager, believe that the information will be of interest to the people of Lynn and other counties regarding the 1956 boll acreage reserve program.

In each county in the state amount of money per acre was established as follows:
 1. Yields were established each farm by the county and community committees, and had to be established in accordance with regulations issued by the State Office. These yields had to be approved by a representative of the State Office before payments could be offered.
 2. The dollar value of each yield was established on the basis of yield approved by the farmer in some counties a yield approved by inspection. In each case payments were consummated on a smaller of appraised yield or normal yield, and in no case than \$6 per acre.

The average payment per acre in Lynn County is \$19.37. The average for the state is \$18.94.

How many hens are needed to provide a living income for the producer? The answer to this frequently asked question involves many hen numbers but more important the number of eggs required each week to earn the expected income. Weekly production should average about 1,000 dozen. The hens the fewer will be required to produce these eggs.

Cotton acreage in the nation has dropped 37 percent since 1951 but production only 8 percent. The drop in Texas for the same period has been 42 percent in acres but only 1 percent in production.

About 500,000 farmers in the nation had signed 10 million acres of cropland under the Soil Bank by July 27th. They can earn nearly \$225 million if all requirements are met. In Texas 60,000 agreements have been signed. These involve nearly 2 million acres.

A drop of 8 percent in the nation's spring pig crop and an indicated reduction of 7 percent in the number of sows to farrow this fall promise some relief for swine prices, says John G. McHane, extension economist.

The August list of plentiful foods is topped by broilers and fryers. Turkey supplies make this old favorite another good buy for August. Large quantities of all grades of beef are also available.

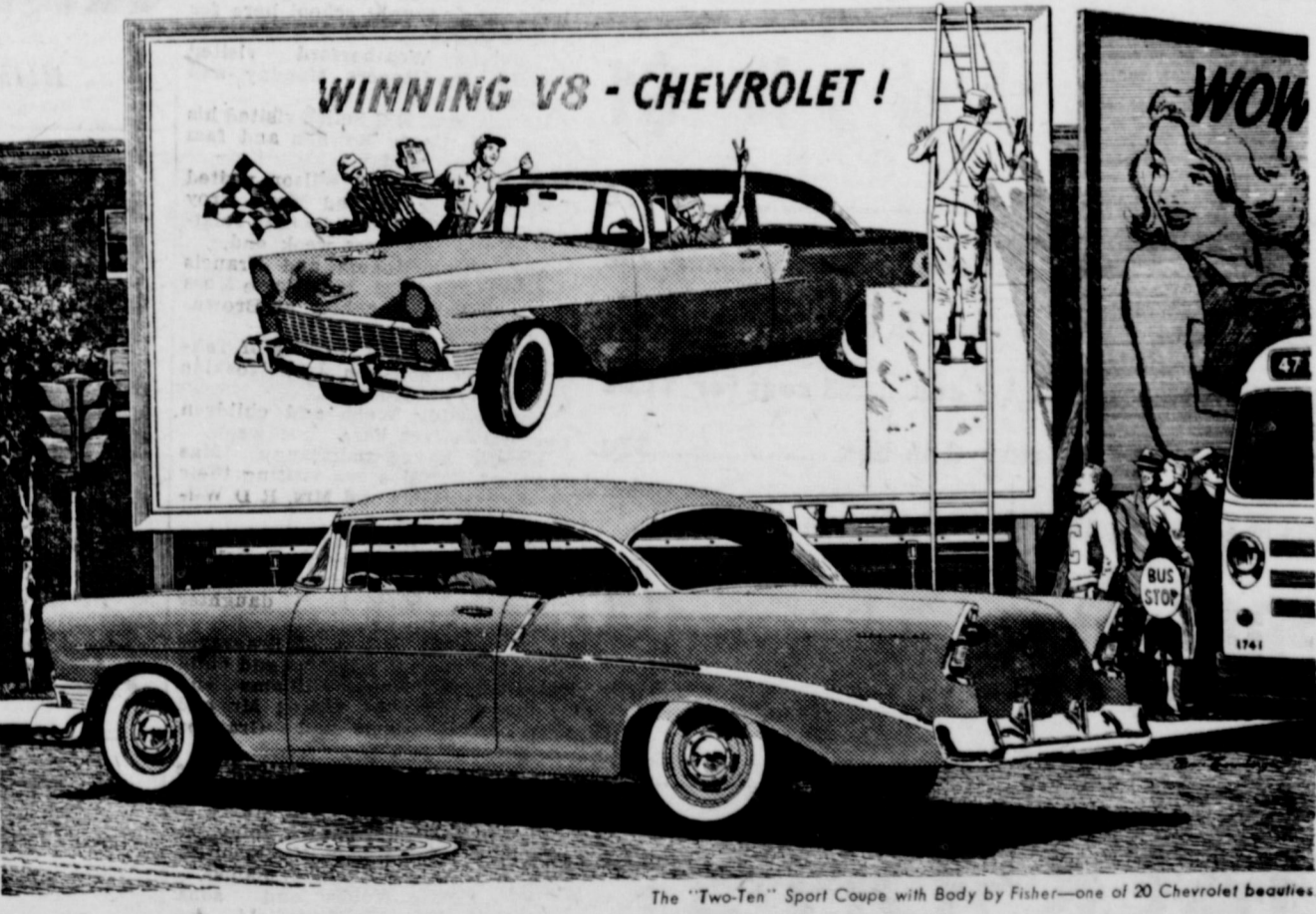
