"The vote on cotton acreage controls is set for December 15th. Secretary Benson has announced that under existing law, if controls are approved, cotton farmers as a whole will be given a national allot ment of 17,910,000 acres. This is 16 percent below what farmers were able to plant in 1950, the last year when acreage controls were in operation.

There has been a shifting of cotton production toward the West, particularly to California, and these Western states will share in the national allotment. This means that in most cotton counties of the Nation sharper reductions will be made because of the shift of cotton production westward, and because of the overall 16 percent cut below the 1950 control program.

"Under the anticipated control program, farmers in cotton producing counties will be privileged plant a certain percentage their cropland to cotton. Generally speaking within the county the percentage factor for each cotton farmer would be the same. The factor would differ from county to county. It would be based upon the percentage of the total cropland in the county which had been plated in tton during the past five years. However, the five year period upon which allotments for next year would be based would not include 1949 and 1953. The law specifies tha abnormal weather conditions must be taken in account in arriving at allotments.

In the 1950 program in the 19 District cotton factors ranged from a low of 12 percent in Yoakum County to a high of 58 percent in Dawson County. The factor repres ents the percentage of cropland that the average cotton farmer in the county could plant in cotton under the program. The acreage factor in the 25 counties was 38 percent. This was by far the highest average of any block of counties in Scores of Texas counties had factors of less than 5 percent.

Before Dec. 15th the local PMA office will announce the proposed factor for 1954 in each county. Gen erally, the announced factors will be lower for 1954 but the figures cannot be accurately predicted.

Many variations can be expected as result of cotton planting histories for the key 5 year period

"In my opinion, the announced national cotton acreage allotment is too low, and I believe that the chances are about 50-50 that Congress, when it reconvenes, will raise the national allotment to about 22 million acres. However, the farmer cannot be sure of future develop ments. The House of Representatives passed a bill in June raising national allotment to 22 and half million acres but a controversy on the matter arose in the Senate and final action was not taken.

"Secretary Benson has announce ed that controls may be established corn production next year. If this develops, a control program on combine milo could be announced. as of this date, there is NO reg ulation which would limit mile and sorghum plantings in 1954. For example, a producer in a county with a 30 percent cotton factor could plant 30 percent of his land n cotton and 70 percent of his land The Secretary has already announced a support prigram on milo for next year at 85 percent of

The wheat control program already in operation. However, it has now been specifically announce ed by the PMA in Washington that non wheat farmer without allotment can, without penalty plant, harvest and sell the wheat roduction from 15 acres of wheat less. He would not be eligible for a loan on the wheat, but this would not throw the producer out of compliance on oher farm pro-

Liquor Board Issues Church Drink Permit

COLUMBUS, O.-The state liquor department issued a beer and wine permit to the St. John Cantius Catholic Church in Cleveland, it was learned recently.




