

It is estimated that over 100 houses in town are empty and the population is presently down to an estimated 900. The present "recession" is more pronounced here and at Lamesa due to last year's short crop. Tahoka escaped with very little economic damage.

Fast cars, changing merchandise as "discount stores," and improved highways are creating small towns born 50 years ago due to lack of transportation. Medicine is going through one of its most rapid evolutions in history. I recently talked to a local man who had a complete "plumb-line" job. He was cut from his breast bone to the extreme lower abdomen. And again on the interior side of each leg. All vital organs were laid out of the body cavity including the heart. Life giving blood "pipes" or arteries were stripped out and replaced with a nylon type man-made pipe. As the surgery was being "closed" he was brought back to a semi-state of life, the heart reconnected and he was observed for leaks of the pipes. A team of five doctors did the job and they kid and act like they are on a summer picnic. The head surgeon is of Asia Minor parentage.

Next door to this man was a Shiek from the Jordan area with five of his wives. He was set for a similar operation. The Houston medical team lay the blame on smoking for causing calcium deposits in the arteries.

He is in Dallas this week for interview and records check with State judges who will pick one of nine Texas boys for the Star Lone Star Farmer award of 1965 to be announced at the Texas FFA convention in Houston in mid-July.

Louis, a 1965 graduate of O'Donnell High School who will enter Texas Tech this fall, has had an outstanding record in FFA work. At Tech, he plans to study agricultural economics.

This year, he was named Star Lone Star Farmer of O'Donnell Chapter, then of Mesa District, now of Area II, and is going for the top award at Houston.

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PARKING LOT CAR THEFT

Mort Meansell owned a parking lot. It was enclosed by an eight foot fence and had one entrance and one exit. Mort kept at least one attendant on duty at all times to park and watch after his customers' cars. Patrons were requested to leave their keys in the car to enable the attendants to park the cars as well as move them when necessary.

Hotrod Harry parked his car in Mort's lot and was given a claim check. He promptly put it into his pocket without paying any attention to it. Upon the back of the claim check was written "The person accepting this ticket assumes all risk of accident, and expressly agrees that the management shall not be liable, under any circumstances, for any injury to person, loss or damage."

A couple of hours later Harry returned. His car had been stolen. Mort said he was sorry, but pointed to the statement on the back of the claim check. Mort refused to pay for the stolen car. Harry sued him.

Mort: Mort pay for the stolen car? Mort probably would have to pay. Most courts have held that a statement on the back of a parking claim check is only effective if called to the car owner's attention. Mort had not done this. Also, Harry had a right to believe from the fact that Mort maintained an enclosed space for parking, with attendants on duty, that he was paying the parking fee in consideration of care and watchfulness to prevent injury or loss.

Parking lot operators may attempt to escape responsibility by a notice of limitation of liability posted on the lot or printed on the claim check

ACCENT ON HEALTH . . .

Ten killers are at large in Texas. These killers aren't bandits or criminals - they are the ten leading causes of Texans' deaths.

The ten killers account for a giant share of \$2,692 Texans who died in 1963.

The latest statistics released by the State Health Department categorize, profile and dissect the leading killers.

This is how they stack up on paper.

Heart disease took the lion's share . . . one out of every three deaths in the State. National statistics also show the same leading cause of Apoplexy - or stroke, is classified as the third most deadly, with 11 percent of the death total.

Accidents, as the fourth leading killer, claimed 5,999 lives, or seven percent of the total. Death due to accidental cause takes the largest percentage of lives for the age groups between one and 45.

Disease of early infancy, fifth in sequence, takes its toll . . . of course below the one year marker.

Pneumonia ranks sixth in the lineup of killers, claiming five percent of the deaths.

General arteriosclerosis, diabetes mellitus and congenital malformations are the seventh, eighth and ninth cause of death, respectively.

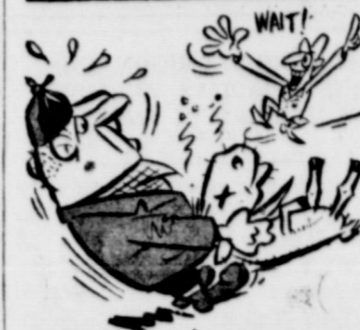
Suicide is the tenth leading cause of death. It first ranked tenth in 1958. Deaths from suicide increase given to owner of the car. But with few exceptions the courts have not upheld such limitations where the loss or injury was due to negligence of the operator of the lot and where the stipulations were not specifically called to the attention of the car owner.

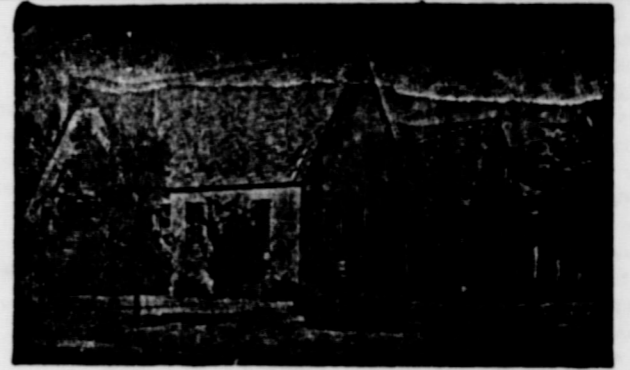

SELF SERVICE POST OFFICES

More service facilities for the postal customer are receiving new emphasis in the postal system. Postmaster Line documented today after receiving word from Postmaster General John Gronouski in Washington D. C. of a new improved "self service Post Office."

The new experimental 24 hour self service unit, the second opened in mid March just outside Los Angeles, to meet after hours postage and mailing needs of suburbanites. The first unit was installed at a shopping center just outside Wash-

IT'S THE LAW IN TEXAS

LOCAL RULE . . .
 Under our dual system of government, to sets of law . . . state and federal . . . may govern what we do.

State laws have traditionally governed certain fields: for example the law of wills, estates, and transfers of property upon death. Each state has its own rules on death transfers, how to make wills, and what happens when a person dies without a will.

But the federal government has some power in this field, especially when federal money went to the decedent or when it involved a national policy.

In a dispute between the United States and a State over a decedent's estate, the U.S. Supreme Court set forth some of the federal powers. A war veteran died in a veterans hospital without a will or heirs. He had some personal property. Under the state law property escheated to the state. Under federal law his property goes to the U.S.

The U.S. Supreme Court handed the estate to the U.S. under its war powers. When patients die without wills all their property goes to keep up veterans' hospitals and recreation programs.

Other veterans' laws have cut into the states' property laws. Federal laws govern G.I. insurance. They cut off community property rights even though premiums came from community funds.

As a rule people who live in federal enclaves within a state must obey state laws. Thus Texas law governs civilians on military and scientific areas, or workers on a federal reservation as to wills, property, marriage and divorce. In the case of crimes, there may sometimes be concurrent jurisdiction.

But the federal government may pass laws to avoid conflict between state laws and a national policy. County selected service business grossed \$730 thousand in 1963. Linn County's 58 service establishments had total receipts of \$330 thousand in 1963, a decrease of 8 percent from 1958, according to a report of the 1963 census of business just released by the Bureau of the Census, U.S. Department of Commerce. The last previous census of business covered operations during 1958.

The service trades in the census of business included those providing: personal services to individuals; miscellaneous business services; auto repair and other auto services. Also included were motion picture production and distribution business; motion picture theaters; other amusement and recreation services; and hotels and motels.

The selected service trade establishments in the county employed 61 persons (exclusive of proprietors) and had a payroll of the year of \$135 thousand. The state as a whole included 60,879 establishments with receipts of \$1,879.3 million.

Citizens should not be misled by the self-styled "hardline men" in our midst who with their patented tactics for all civil rights protests to hold the magic key to Utopia. Under close examination their records often prove to be as false as individuals, in their efforts to secure their charges that the FBI is dra-

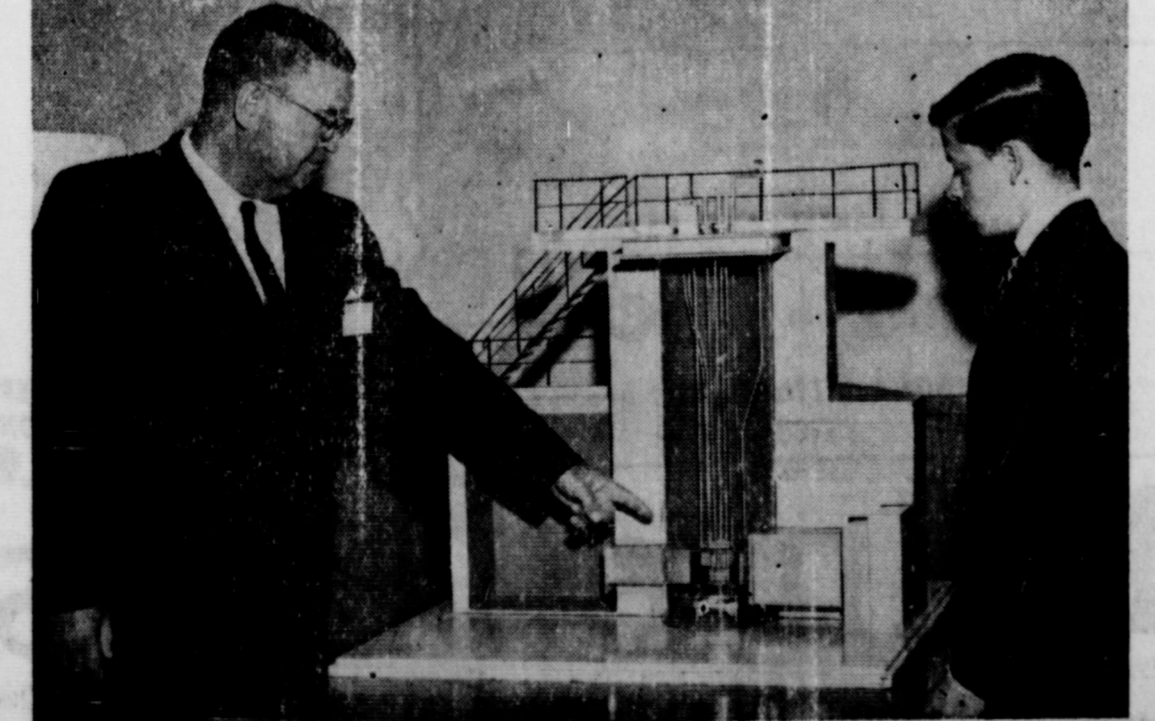

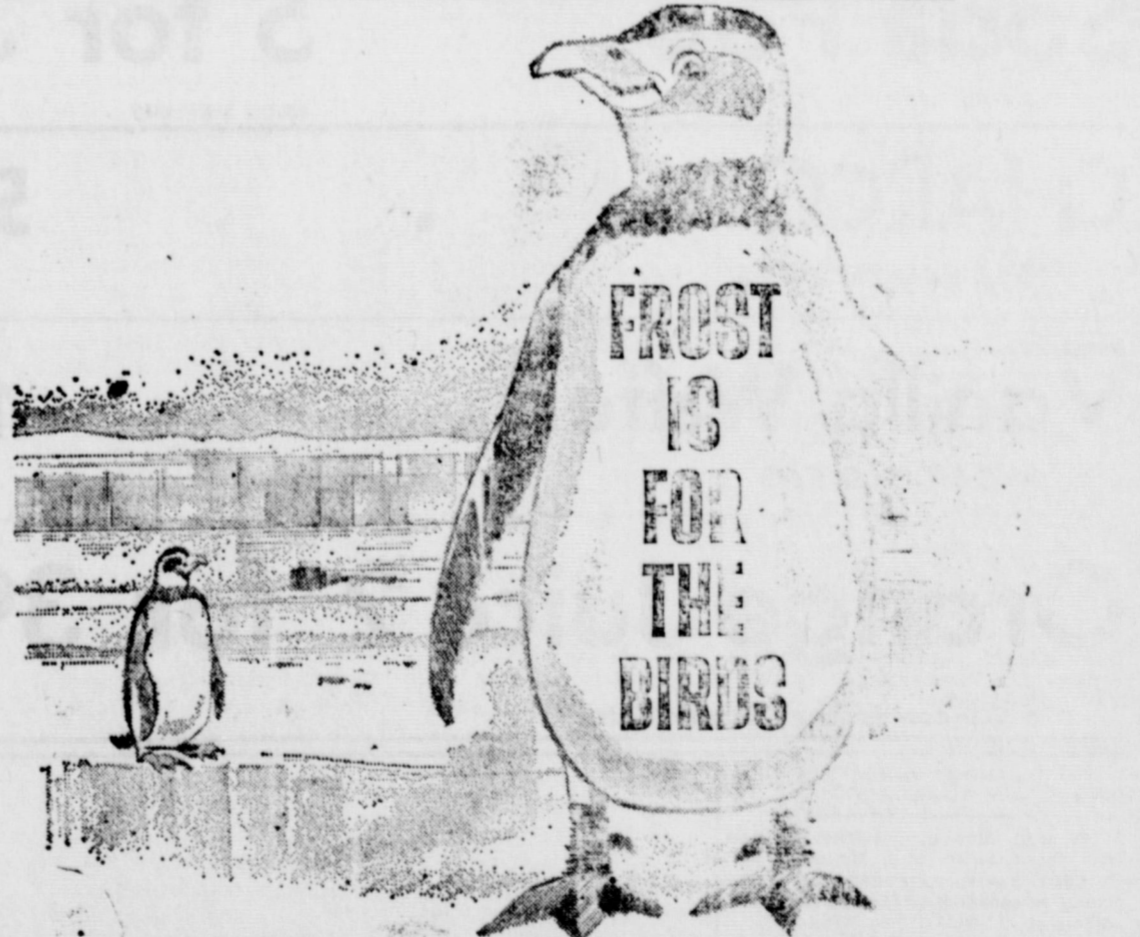
