\$200,000 Fire Guts Co-op Elevator

A wind whipped fire Thanksgiving Day razed the grain filled O'Donnell Farmer Co-op elevator in the north part of town burning out the 50 ft tall structure and damaging its contents. Damage estimates are not completed. Fire fighting units from Lamesa, Tahoka and here fought the blaze for four hours hampered by a northerly which blew astray streams of water directed at the top of the structure and the flames apparently originated in the top.

A crowd of several hundred filled the street for several blocks from the fire and hampered firemen in getting to the fire. Smoke was visible for six miles. The elevator, part of it built 20 years ago, and the remainder 10 years ago, was of sheet metal with a wooden framework. It contained about 150,000 bu. of milt in government storage. It was the older of two co-op elevators and was valued at about \$75,000.00. The grain and the elevator were both insured.

The blaze was discovered at about 11 a. m. and was under control until about 3 p. m. It continued to smoulder thru Friday. Twenty O'Donnell firemen and the firemen from Lamesa and Tahoka were fed at the Cemetery Association dinner. Hot coffee was kept on the scene. Firemen found no water shortage problem although hoses were strung for several blocks. Five hoses were strung on the blaze but the wind blew the water badly. Walls of the structure broke pouring the tons of milt to earth.

The public is reminded that it is a fine up to \$200 to drive or park a car within a block of a fire. This is a State law.

Road Bond Election Saturday

The public of Lynn county will vote Saturday, Dec. 5th on issuing \$100,000 right of way bonds. The money is to be used to buy right of way on Highway 87 from just south of Tahoka to Lubbock Co. line for the four lane road. County Judge Mathis says this will be far more economical than issuing warrants for that purpose as the latter would necessitate a raise in property values. The proposal lacked only 8 votes carrying about a month ago. 2-3rds majority is needed. Only about 200 people voted then. The last time O'Donnell voted 15 to 1 in favor.

On December 4th at 7:30 p. m. there will be a call meeting at O'Donnell High School auditorium of all adults and boys in the O'Donnell School District to determine if there are boys and adults interested in the community to warrant further work on securing a franchise to play Little League Baseball starting with the 1960 season.

Rabies Is Treat To State

There's a big three-dimensional outline map of Texas hanging prominently in an office at the State Department of Health in Austin. Bright orange blotches, neatly conforming to county lines, peck the face of the map from Texarkana to El Paso.

The legend underneath reads: "Rabies cases by counties, 1959."

The map is the Division of Veterinary Public Health's way of visualizing the extent of the State's rabies problem, both in wild and domestic animals. It is consistently one of the most acute in the nation the record shows.

Says Dr. A. B. Rich, the department's veterinary specialist: "It indicates a dangerous undercurrent of rabies exists throughout the whole range of Texas wildlife. In an unguarded moment it could erupt in a full-blown epidemic."

Preventing that grim eventuality falls to Dr. Rich and his staff of two other veterinarians. Working an area the size of Texas, advising and assisting local health departments and county officials in rabies control means spreading themselves very, very thin.

Know Your Law

Any day now you (and Uncle Sam) may need to figure out your "net worth."

The Internal Revenue Service may use the "net worth" method to check a taxpayer's income tax records. It compares what he was worth, say, five years ago, with what he is worth today. Then it looks to see if his increase in net worth compares well with his reported income during that time, after allowing for his estimated expenditures. By this method the government can detect tax deficiencies, fraud, or evasion, or assess tax where the taxpayer has not kept records or has lost them.

At a trial for tax evasion, the government must first prove what a taxpayer was worth at the beginning of a period, and what he is worth at the end of the period. The difference is his increase in net worth. The question: Has his wealth increased between the two periods by unreported taxable amounts?

For example: John Doe, a taxpayer, has little wealth when he started his career. He often borrowed. After four years his net worth grew much larger. In court John could not explain how this happened. So, to cut a long story short, he had to pay the tax, plus interest, and civil and criminal penalties.

Richard Roe, another taxpayer, was worth \$50,000 in 1946, but in 1950 the government claimed he was worth \$200,000. Roe tried to show, but couldn't, that he had much more money in 1946 than the government showed. For a while the government's old tax returns showed that Richard had reported a small income in 1946, and had mortgaged his home and business. Besides, Roe spent freely much more than his reported income, and could not show that he received gifts or other non-taxable money. So the court found a large unreported income and Richard was convicted for fraud.

By keeping proper records of all transactions over a period of years, a taxpayer can properly account for receipt and expenditure of income so that he can foistal the revenue service from using the net worth method.

Farm Census In Progress

The 1959 Census of Agriculture, now under way in Lynn County, will bring up to date farm statistics last collected in 1954, when the farm census revealed the following facts:

The value of products sold in 1954 by farm operators was \$29,203,265.
1954 by farm operators was \$19,570,388 and included \$19,567,325 for field crops, \$625 for vegetables, \$238 for fruits and nuts, and \$2,200 for horticultural specialties.
The value of all livestock and livestock products sold was \$632,877 and included \$83,820 for dairy products, \$92,903 for poultry and poultry products, and \$456,154 for livestock and livestock products.

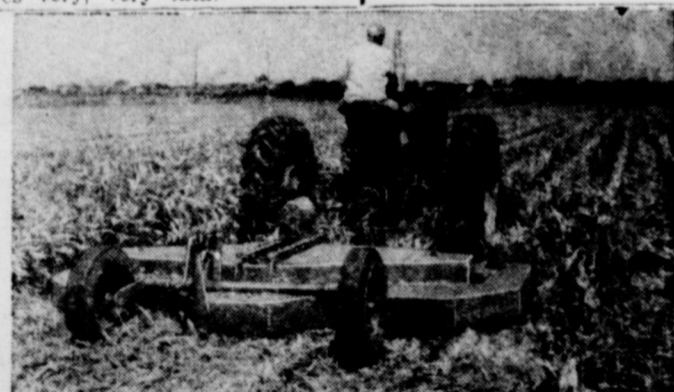
PARCEL POST RATES INCREASE FEB. 1ST

The higher rates for parcel post won't go into effect until Feb. 1st—long after the Christmas rush. Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield said Monday. The new rates will average 27 percent higher or about 88 million dollars a year. A four pound package for local area delivery will require 28 cents postage instead of 23 cents. The same parcel going from East Coast to West Coast will cost \$1.02 instead of 87 cents.

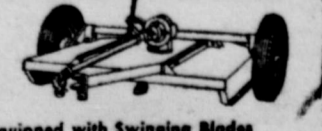

S. S. News

Persons who have reached retirement age and who plan to file claim for social security benefits shortly after the first of the year, are now being encouraged to contact their social security representative or district office in advance.

John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock District Office, announced this week, "In some instances it will be to the advantage of an individual to actually file claim before he retires, depending upon the amount of his earnings over the past several years. Social security personnel are always ready to discuss a person's status with him and assist him in planning for retirement and the filing of a claim. There will be a number of instances in which an application filed before December 31st will actually result in higher monthly benefits than if it is filed in 1969.

"An inquiry two or three months in advance of retirement also makes it possible for the district office to assure a more speedy delivery of that first benefit check. There is usually a backlog of claims that pile up shortly after the first of the year, and this creates something of a delay in getting new claims paid.

"Farm operators, particularly, often have problems concerning their retirement, the payment of social security taxes, whether or not to use the optional method of reporting farm income, obtaining the necessary proofs, and other matters, in which the social security office may be able to offer assistance."

Hutton gave the example of the

farmer who thought he had to sell off his farm and all of his livestock before he could become eligible for social security benefits. He stated "This is not usually the case, since a person under age 72 may have earnings of \$1200 per year and still be entitled to social security benefits for all months of the year. After 72, there is no limitation."

A representative of the Lubbock Social Security Office will be in Lamesa on Wed. Dec. 2 at 10:00 a. m. in the Post Office Basement and will be glad to assist in all matters pertaining to Social Security.

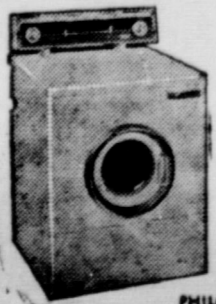

Radioactivity Has Many New Uses

A San Antonio firm exposed automobile piston rings to a radioactive isotope. Later, ring wear was calculated by measuring radioactivity in the engine oil.

In Houston a commercial art firm does original sketches with radioactive inks. Then, by pressing the drawing against photographic paper, they get a finely detailed copy truer than a photographic print, cheaper and more precise than lithography.

Texas industries are using isotopes to measure life expectancy of cutting tools. Botanists are check-amounts of phosphate absorbed by growing plants. Physicians use isotopes to destroy tumors and to locate other body abnormalities.

All of which indicates that radioactivity has grown right out of the pages of science fiction into everyday life, putting the State Department of Health up to its figurative ears in the business of keeping tabs on radioactivity's phenomenal growth as an industrial and medical tool.

The Department, as part of the tedious task of registering all radiation-producing devices used in Texas, has files on more than 4,000 users, from mammoth industrial concerns to private individuals. Files have accumulated since 1956 when regulations were adopted to cope with the snowballing use of radiation equipment.

Most names in the file are physicians and dentists who use x-ray and fluoroscope devices. Any Texas doctor can request an equipment survey for radiation hazards. Departmental engineers will check it out from anode to x-ray.
