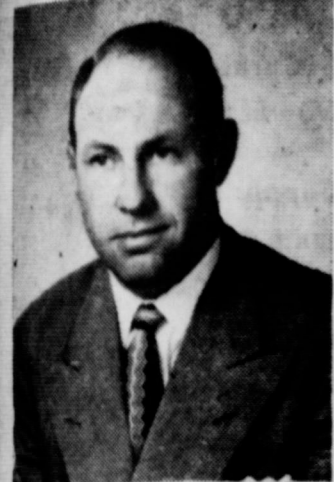


Walter Buckel Seeks Co. Clerk's Post in Dawson Co.

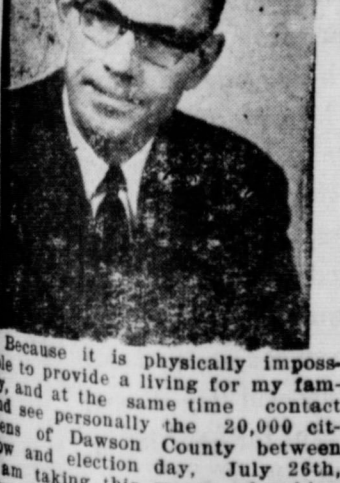
Miss Rains is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Urah C. Rains of O'Donnell. A total of 41 students recently took the tests which were administered in a group.

Paul Gooch Rites Read Here Monday

Funeral services were read Monday afternoon at 3 p. m. at F. R. T. Methodist church for Paul H. Gooch, pioneer farmer and citizen of here, who passed away at his home here Saturday night at 10:30 p. m. He was 59 years, 11 months and 12 days of age. Funeral services were read by his pastor, Rev. H. A. Longino assisted by Rev. Quay Farmer. Burial was in the O'Donnell Cemetery.

Mr. Gooch was born July 22nd 1892 at Dublin. He moved to O'Donnell with his parents in 1908 where he has lived since that date. The old family home site and farm is west of town.

On Dec. 31st, 1925 he was wed to Miss Anne Baker. On August 15th, 1925 he united with the Methodist church having been a loyal member unto his passing. He was a former member of the church's Board of Stewards, a veteran of World War I.

He was a charter member of the local lodge and was the second war shipmaster of the local lodge. Prior to moving here in 1908 Ben Moore sr. recalls the Gooch family lived in the north part of the county for a number of years running a big cattle company under the name of Gooch - Higginbotham.

Survivors include his wife, two sisters, Miss Marie Gooch of Lubbock, and Miss Fay Gooch of Phoenix, Ariz.

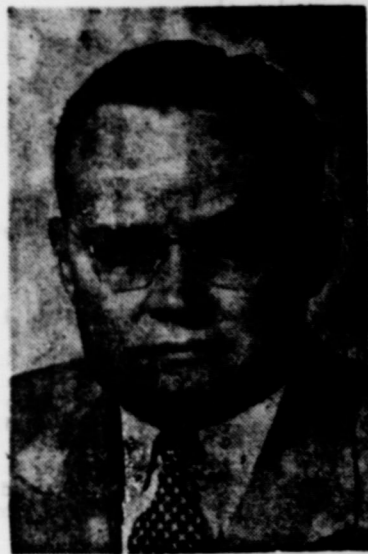

**America's Lawless
Nation, Reports
Criminal Authority**

NEW YORK—America's soaring
crime rate is a direct reflection of
the state of our national conscience
and present-day moral standards.
This is the opinion of Dr. Austin H.
MacCormick, noted criminologist
and professor of criminology at the
University of California, reporting
on the history of crime in America
recently to the "Conference on the
Future" arranged in New York by
2500 mutual fire and casualty
insurance companies.

"A climate of crime is created
by the moral standards of our con-
temporary officials and citizens,
our tolerance of wrongdoing, and
our attitude toward law enforce-
ment and the social controls op-
posed to crime," MacCormick said.

Because of the national lapse in
moral standards, MacCormick re-
ported, America today "has earned
the unenviable title of "the most
lawless nation on earth!"

We now have an estimated total
of nearly two million major crimes
and 15 million minor offenses com-
mitted in the United States each
year, he said.

He outlined the transition of crime
in America from the "need and
greed" theory of motivation to present
"highly organized criminal syn-
dicates operating on a national
level, skillfully integrated and dis-
torting the latest advances in
science and communication facili-
ties to their unlawful uses."

A generation or two ago, he said,
investigation of the youth caught
holding up the corner grocer re-
vealed he wanted the money for
food or shelter or to impress his
girl friend. "When that thief is
captured today, all too often we find
he got the gun from a higher-up
who was selling him dope and three-
by stood to gain from a successful
robbery. And this intermediary in
turn was being supplied with dope
wholesale by a third member of a
criminal hierarchy."

"Our present social and economic
situation is producing a predom-
inant motivation to crime," Mac-
Cormick said. "And today we must
face up to the presence of organized
crime, committed by predatory
racketeers combined in powerful
syndicates with a greed for money
and a greed for power."

Almost as important as support-
ing and strengthening our law-
enforcement agencies, MacCormick
said, "is a national moral renaiss-
ance, a return to the moral pre-
cepts of our founders, a return on
all levels to the old-fashioned prin-
ciples of teaching and believing in
the intrinsic difference between
right and wrong."

Dr. MacCormick was one of 11
outstanding scientists and educators
speaking at the Conference on the
Future.

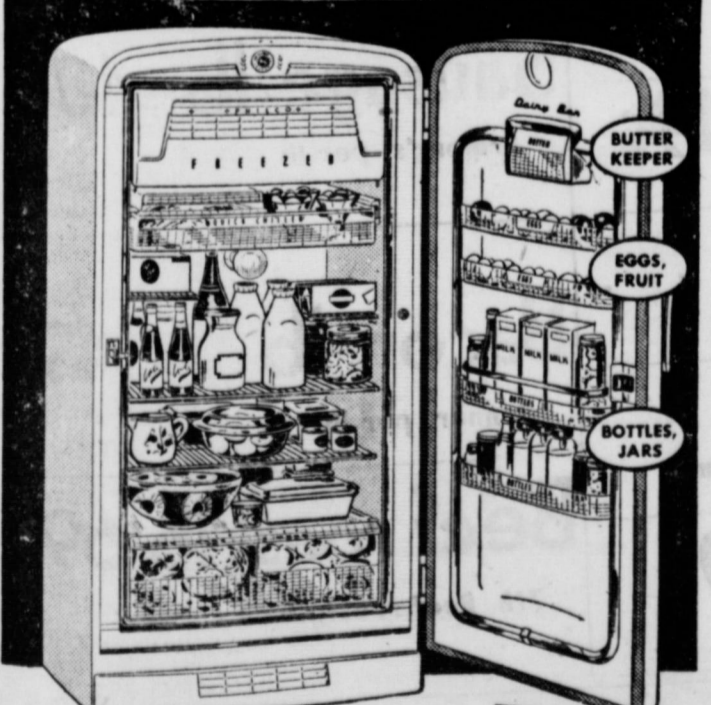
