

Jury Service For Women Explained By Judge Reed

Since the passage of the Constitutional Amendment providing for jury service by women, and certain legislation passed by the recent Legislature which became effective on May 20, 1955, the following changes have been made regarding jury service.

1. The law now provides for the same jury service on behalf of men and women. Under the law certain people have always been exempt. Some of these laws of exemption have been changed. The former law provides for the exemption of men over the age of 60. The law was changed by the recent Legislature which provides that men and women both are exempt only when they become 65.

2. The law provides that the spouses of attorneys engaged in actual practice of the law are exempt from jury service. The members of the National Guard during the period of time when they are actually on active duty are exempt.

3. Females who have legal custody of children under the age of 18 years are exempt.

4. Nurses, both registered and practical actually engaged in the practice of their profession are exempt.

5. The wife of a man summoned to serve on the same jury panel is exempt. She would not be exempt if she was summoned to serve on a different panel.

6. The law formerly provided that druggists were exempt. This has been changed and the word druggist has been omitted and registered pharmacists are now exempt. Under the change the druggist who is not actually a pharmacist himself would not be exempt.

7. School teachers were formerly exempt. They are no longer so under the law.

8. Publishers of newspapers were formerly exempt. They are not since the effective date of this recent enactment of May 20, 1955.

9. People who are exempt are eligible in every respect and will be used as jurors unless they wish to claim their exemption, in which case they are excused. There are a number of other exemptions but they remain unchanged, so no mention is made of them.

In criminal cases the law has always required that all members of the jury be kept together at all times from the time of their selection until they were discharged after reaching a verdict. This remains unchanged except as follows: The law now provides that when a jury is composed of males and females, then such jurors are permitted to separate to the extent of housing female jurors separate and apart from male jurors. The law further provides that there shall be furnished facilities for the female jurors separate and apart from facilities for the male jurors. Otherwise the law with regard to the separation of jurors remains unchanged.
