ROSS MUST ISSUE FORM W-2 BY JAN. 31

Employers, Internal Revenue Service has a reminder for you — Employees should receive two copies of a withholding statement Form W-2 on or before Wednesday, January 31, 1962.

John J. Sloan, Administrative officer of the Internal Revenue Service at Lubbock said "This statement shows the total wages paid and the income tax and social security tax withheld if any, during the calendar year 1961."

Total wages shown on an employee's W-2 must include amounts received as sick pay from his employer, even though no tax has been withheld on such sick pay. Sick pay is not required to be shown separately. If it becomes necessary to correct a W-2 after it has been given to an employee, a revised statement must be issued and marked "corrected by employer."

HARDBERGER SPEAKS AT ROTARY

The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced on Dec. 28th that there will be no restrictions for the second consecutive year on acreage of 1962 sugar beet acreage.

Though Texas grain sorghum producers set an all time high of 45 bushels or 2,520 lbs an acre in 1961, they still have a long ways to go to match the 9,333.9 lbs an acre produced by Bill Cole, a Deaf Smith County 4-H boy. His yield made with irrigation topped a 1 participant in the 1961 Texas Hybrid Grain Sorghum Production Program. He planted RS 610.

Egg production in 1962 is expected to slightly exceed that for 1961 due to a higher rate of laying birds. The increase is largely accounted for because of the increased number of pullets in 1962 laying flocks. The trend toward larger flocks will continue and competition between producing areas will be strong. Texas producers will have to use every known method of efficient production and marketing to meet this competition.

The 1962 edition of the Longhorn Recreation and Leadership Laboratory will be held Feb. 18-24 at the Glen Lake Camp, Glen Rose, Texas. Local-county extension agents can supply details.

BABY BORN TODAY OWES \$1,603 DEBT — AT INTEREST

Washington, — Resolutions for the New Year: Balance the federal budget. Reasons: The first child born in 1962 will owe \$1,603. So will every other child born during the year. That figure is the per capita share of the public debt. Let's not make it bigger. The dollar, 100 cents purchasing power in 1900, has 28 cents today (the two bit dollar is almost at hand). If inflation continues at the rate since the Korean War, the dollar will rot to 16.2 cents by the year 2,000. The federal debt and guaranteed obligations of the federal government, \$295 billion, surpass by \$42 billion all the debts of all the other countries in the world. IT'S THE LAW IN TEXAS — THE CASE OF THE MESSY TENANT

Joe Dogood and his wife rented their home to Joe's cousin, John Messmaker. The Dogoods were planning to be out of town for several months and since Mr. Messmaker was temporarily out of work and in need of a place to house his family, Joe rented their home at a very reasonable figure. The Messmakers were very grateful and promised someday to pay back Joe and his wife.

When the Messmakers finally moved out they left the house in a shambles. There were holes in the walls, the furniture was torn and broken, windows were broken, doors were off their hinges and the house looked as if it had never been cleaned.

The Dogoods asked the Messmakers to clean and repair the house and furniture but they refused. They said that they were only tenants and such repairs were the responsibility of the property owners.

Can the Messmakers be made to pay for the damage they caused? The courts have generally held that the tenants can be made to pay for damages in such a case. A tenant, even though bound by no express agreement as to the condition in which he is to leave the premises at the end of his tenancy, is nevertheless under a certain implied obligation. He is impliedly obligated to so use the rented premises that it will be returned to the landlord in the same general condition in which it was rented, subject to such general deterioration as is caused by a reasonable amount of use and lapse of time.

If, by the negligence of a tenant, the rented property is materially injured, he is liable to the landlord for the resulting damages. An implied contract binds the tenant to make good any loss that results from the want of reasonable care. However he is not liable for depreciation resulting from normal use of the property.

FEDERAL AND STATE GRANTS — HELP BUILD HOSPITALS

Austin — Over 12,000 general hospital beds, 550 beds for mental patients and 350 nursing home beds have been made available to aid Texans by virtue of a financial partnership in which the state has participated since 1947.

The opening of a cerebral palsy treatment center in Houston in mid 1961 brought to nearly 200 the number of projects completed in Texas under the Hill-Burton hospital and medical facilities survey and construction program.

Established by the Hill Burton Act of 1947 the program is a unified local-state-federal effort to provide financial assistance to areas with the greatest need for supplementary hospital and medical facilities.

Fund grants up to 50 percent of total construction costs for general, mental, tuberculosis and chronic disease hospitals, public health centers, diagnostic and treatment facilities, rehabilitation units and nursing homes may be made under the program.

BIRDS CARRY SLEEPING SICKNESS

The fact that birds are a reservoir of some diseases transmissible to man has been known for a long time. However, the mounting store of knowledge concerning the arboviruses (literally bird-borne) is a comparatively new item of public health research.

Some of the more common diseases caused by these viruses occur in Texas. These are the St. Louis encephalitis (mistakenly called sleeping sickness) and the Western and Eastern equine types. The names signify where a particular virus was first identified.

Puzzling transmission cycles are the hallmark of these viruses. Encephalitis is borne by birds, however transmission of the virus from birds to horses or from birds to man is thru mosquitoes. There apparently is no direct transmission from horse to man or from man to man. The responsible culprit is a family of mosquitoes called Culicoides. These include the common household mosquito and a mosquito common to rural areas. There are others but these two cause the most trouble in Texas.

In late summer and fall of 1961 several cases of encephalitis were confirmed by the State Health Department. Most of the cases were reported from counties of south and west Texas in the Hi-Plains area.

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### COTTON VARIETY IMPORTANT IN HARVESTING

College Station — Did your mechanical cotton harvester do a satisfactory job on this year's crop? If it didn't the blame might lay with the variety of cotton you planted. According to tests conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, some cotton varieties are more suitable to mechanical harvesting than others. For the studies, 14 open boll varieties were tested on the A. and M. Plantation, near College Station and 12 storm resistant varieties were tested at Substation No. 6 near Denton.

In the mechanical picking tests all varieties were planted on the same date and all received the same cultural practices. All were harvested in a once over operation and immediately after the harvesting the cotton remaining on the plants and cotton dropped to the ground was collected and weighed. This information was then analyzed statistically to determine mechanical picking efficiency.

The storm resistant varieties were tested in the same manner but two different types of stripper rolls were used. Doable steel rolls, which are used on some commercial strippers, and rubber saddle stripper rolls developed by the Experiment Station were used on all varieties. In almost every case the rubber paddle stripper rolls showed higher harvesting efficiency.

If you use machine harvesting and did not get the harvesting efficiency you desired on your last crop, then you should get a copy of PR 2209. This Texas Agricultural Experiment Station publication contains the test results and this information may help you select a cotton variety more suitable.

Foundation seed for Oro, a new shattering type sesame variety are now available to certified seed growers for multiplication from the Foundation Seed Section, Department of Soil and Crop Sciences, College Station.

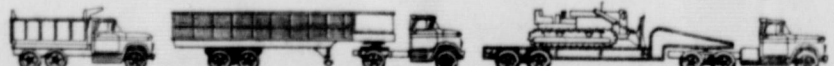

### WITHHOLDING AND S. S. TAXES EXPLAINED

Dallas - Employers liable for income tax withheld and social security taxes in excess of \$100 for the month of January, must deposit such taxes with a depository, district director Ellis Campbell, Jr. of Internal Revenue Service, announced today.

Stressing the importance of compliance with deposit deadline of Feb. 15th Mr Campbell added that a Form 459 should be used for this purpose. Deposits may be made in local authorized banks or Federal Reserve Banks, the IRS spokesman added. Employers who do not have a copy of Circular E - "Employer's Tax Guide," may get it from any IRS office. Circular E explains employment taxes and gives tables and percentage methods for computing such taxes.

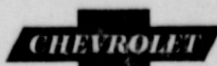
