These are the people who are making possible by their donations the permanent improvement of the C. W. Post Memorial Scout Camp, at Post, Texas. This list is to be run from week to week until the total reaches the \$5,000.00 marks necessary to the success of the undertaking.

Five thousand dollars is the goal set for the fund for the camp improvement. In order that the people who have contributed and those who are contemplating may know where the \$5,000.00 goes to exclusive of the \$1,000.00 light plant, the following items have been listed by the officials of the council:

Concrete dam	\$1,500.00
Kitchen and screened in mess hall	1,500.00
Water supply system	800.00
Latrine system, building of road from the highway to camp head quarters, remodeling the ranch and out houses and cleaning out of springs for water supply cost of care taker etc.	\$1,200.00

The clearing of the canyon for the dam-site has been completed, and it is in readiness now for the throwing up of the concrete work—when funds come in to take care of the cost. The dam is to be provided with a 12-inch valve that may be used in an emergency, emptying the lake in a very short time.

The water system includes a storage tank and pump in the canyon, and on the highest peak within the bounds of the camp, a 15,000 gallon reservoir concrete tank, which will give plenty of pressure for any water that might be needed on the (Continued on last page)

### Sky Juice Again Covers Country

Following close on the heels of the good rain of Thursday of last week, the ground was again soaked Sunday afternoon. In O'Donnell the precipitation was not above half an inch, but to the west, northwest and north it amounted to around two inches. In some localities the rain was accompanied by hail, but it fell only in small spots. On the farm of W. D. Harris two miles northwest of town about 100 acres of cotton was badly damaged. To the south and southeast very little rain fell.

This rain will send the cotton and feedstuffs well on toward maturity, some farmers stating that there is sufficient moisture in the ground to make an average crop if no more rain falls. The crops are putting on a rapid growth and as a whole the O'Donnell country was never in better shape at this time of the year.

### Doak Filling Dates for Weather Forecasts

C. H. Doak has been filling his dates for good old sky juice to a day with the exception of last Sunday. He predicted rain on the 22, but missed the time by nearly two days. But no one is mad about it, as a little matter of two days will make no great difference since we got the rain. The next heavy rain is scheduled for July 26, although there will be showers in the interim.

### Delegation of Boosters Accompany Band and Distribute Literature

What is said to be the largest delegation attending the West Texas Chamber of Commerce meeting at Amarillo from a town the size of O'Donnell left here Sunday morning in the vanguard of which was the town's crack one-year-old band. The convoy was followed by a truck containing the band instruments, chuck and bedding for the party. Enroute a stop was made at towns of importance and concerts given. Arriving at Amarillo in the evening the thousands of delegates already gathered were made to know that, while small in size, compared with other towns, O'Donnell was alive and had come to help make the convention a success. The Amarillo Daily News had the following to say concerning the band:

"O'Donnell may not be the largest town attending the convention but it may boast proudly of one of the foremost boys' bands in the state.

"The O'Donnell crew are the boys with the self-speaking green uniforms with the red decorations that alone without the snappy music they are putting forth, would make the band as outstanding.

"They also lay claim to the youngest, smallest and best snare drummer at the convention, Charles Tate, son of Dr. C. P. Tate, of O'Donnell.

"A. B. Taylor, leader of the band said that without Charlie the rest of the bunch would be lost.

"Charlie knows his drumsticks and has by his vigorous rolling and diminutive stature, attracted a lion's share of attention in parades and concerts."

Not only in the parade, but wherever they appeared, the band and delegation came in for no small amount of attention. Literature describing the town and trade territory was distributed.

From the moment the O'Donnell band gave its first concert it was a conceded winner in the first year class. Ovation followed ovation wherever the boys played and in the supreme test at the contest, they outplayed their competitors from every musical angle, but were cut down on marching department in leaving the stage where the contest was held. The boys misunderstood the orders and instead of marching off the stage in formation they went lame and limped off at will, and were assessed a penalty of 33 1-3 points. In music they were given 66 2-3 points. The ladies band of Quanah being the only other entrant in this class was given 33 1-3 points for music and 66 2-3 points for deportment. The judges divided the honors and the prize money of \$450 equally.

In all, the Amarillo trip was the biggest piece of advertising ever given the town. It was the kind of advertising that will live in the minds of the thousands attending the convention. It was worth many times the effort and cost of making the trip.

Honoring the band and its capable leader, Ab Taylor, a big banquet will be given tonight and it is expected that every business man and well-wisher of the band will be present.

J. W. Brinson came in from Abilene where he has been taking a course in cotton classing. He has about finished his course and will leave in a few days for South Texas where he will buy cotton during the season, returning here in the fall to bid on the staple with the other boys Mrs. Brinson who has been away visiting relatives, returned with her husband.

### Pioneer Citizen Passes Away

After an illness of six and a half years, A. C. Wilson, who resided on his farm east of town, passed away June 10. Mr. Wilson had suffered intensely during his long illness but bore his pains with the fortitude of the true Christian he was. He had been a Christian since he was fourteen years of age, having united with the Baptist church at that time. Besides a wife he leaves three children, two sons and a daughter, Ralph and Miss Shirley, who were with him when the end came, and Wyeth, who is in the United States Marines and was unable to be present. His father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. J. G. Wilson of Glen Cove, and two sisters, Mrs. B. T. Galloway of Friona, and Mrs. F. W. Dunway of Canyon, also survive him.

He was buried at the O'Donnell cemetery on Friday following his death, Rev. Braswell of Lamesa, preaching the funeral sermon at the graveside amid a large concourse of sorrowing friends.

During his active life, Mr. Wilson had always taken a prominent part in church affairs and the building up of the O'Donnell country and his many friends throughout this section will regret to learn of his passing.

### Editor Martin Visits O'Donnell

J. L. Martin and son, J. L. Jr., were over from Snyder Monday on business. Mr. Martin is publisher of the Scurry County Times and is publishing the best paper in his section of the state. This being Mr. Martin's first trip to O'Donnell he expressed great surprise at the progress having been made here. 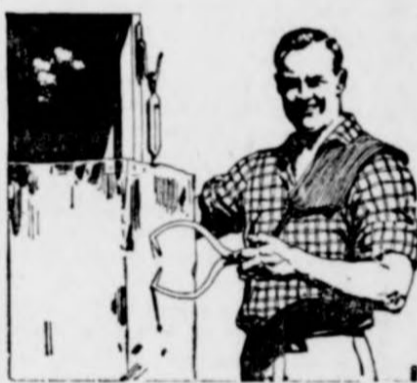

## Chevrolet Sales Increased In Month of May

For the first time in the history of the Chevrolet Motor Company sales during the month of May have exceeded sales during April, according to figures just made public by the sales department of the company.

During May 70,935 Chevrolet cars were sold in the United States, making a total of 84,944 cars, including Canada and export, the largest number of three-speed transmission cars ever sold in one month by any automobile manufacturer. Sales increased by 23,650 cars over May, 1925, when 47,285 Chevrolets were sold in the domestic market.

For the first five months during 1926, up to June 1, 250,927 cars were sold in this country alone, an increase in sales of 84,138 over the same period in 1925, when 166,789 cars were sold in the United States.

A tremendous expansion of dealer representation is also shown, the number of direct and associate dealers representing the Chevrolet Motor Company increasing by 2,488 in the first five months of this year over the same period in 1925. On June 1, 1926, 8,398 dealers were merchandising Chevrolet cars, and on June 1, 1925 there were 5,910 dealers in the United States.

Applications for dealer franchises still continue to pour in to the sales department daily. At the present time sales are running at the rate of more than 18,000 weekly. The best weekly sales record prior to this year was the week of May 2, 1925, when 10,700 Chevrolet cars were sold in the retail domestic field.

Domestic sales are continuing at so high a peak that the mammoth production facilities of the Chevrolet Motor Company have been taxed to their utmost capacity to fill the demand. In fact, the company would have been unable to fill this spring's orders had it not been for the reserve stock built up during the winter. This is illustrated by domestic sales totaling 70,935 cars in May while factory production for domestic distribution was approximately 61,000 during this month.

## IS YOUR BOY A SCOUT?

Several important products are ready to gather at this time, according to Eaton and the country or community that does not get them now will be at a loss later. the crops in this shape, officials of the Panhandle South Plains Fair are looking for the best and largest number of agricultural exhibits in the history of the exposition.
