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

Oregon Blood Donor Trying for 50 Pints

HILLSBORO, Ore.-After giving his 26th pint of blood when the Red Cross bloodmobile was in Hillsboro, Bob Lewis said he's 'hitting for 50."

As nearly as he can figure, 19 of the pints have been given to the Red Cross beginning in Portland early in World War II. He continued giving blood there until the center closed following the war, and since the bloodmobile has made its regular trips to Hillsboro, he's missed only one time.

While he was a member of the Portland fire department, donations were a regular thing. There firemen were allowed to give blood while on duty and a four-hour rest period was allotted. But Lewis recalls, he never missed a fire call -four hours or no four hours.

Because he has type 'O' blood -so-called universal type-he was often called upon by hospitals in emergency cases. He counts giving twice each at the Multnomah county hospital, St. Vincent's, and Good Samaritan and once at Providence in Portland. Although he has given more than

two and a half times the amount of blood now coursing through his veins, Lewis has never suffered any ill effects. "I'm always careful to drink plenty of juice afterwards," he said. His advice to others is to give a

try at donating. "If there's any reason why you shouldn't give blood, the nurses there are sure to catch it before you get in," he said.


