### Total of 221 **Votes** Cast

O'Donnell went heavily republican l'uesday so tar as the gubernatorial candidates were concerned, Ma Ferguson receiving 96 votes while G. C. Butte was given 125. The national repub lican electors received 54 votes. the democratic electors 136 and and the Independent Progres. sives received 9, there being 221 votes cast altogether.

The voting was the lightest cast in some years, many seeming to take no interest. It is the first time that a republican can didate received a majority in the O'Donnell precinct.

From some cause the county and district candidates received light votes, Judge C. H. Cain tak ing the lead with 196, while the others varied from 171 up to 195.

"Ma" Ferguson was defeated in this precinct in both prima ries, this being the third time that the majority of the voters have shown that she was not in favor as a candidate.






