OPINION TESTIMONY

In court all lawyers ask all wit nesses except witnesses to report their observations, not opinions. It is for the judge and the jury -- not the fact witnesses -- to make inferences as to the guilt or liability form the facts.

On the other hand, only "experts" can give the court their opinions Aren't most people expert in some things? Most people are qualified to give opinions on such everyday the like. Sometimes where impres-sions are hard to describe, a witnss may have to talk in terms of opinions about such things as the force of a blow, distance of a sound the amount of light, the degree of cold or heat, weight, size, health, temper, fear. and the like.

We can express the opinion that Jones "looks like the man" who did a crime, or that his footfalls or his voice were those of Jones. Courts will admit such evidence. So too, one can testify about hs friends' sanity or handwriting and some-

times your own motives.

But most often the court must rely on certain skilled persons like physicians or engineers for "expert opinions" especially in complex or technical cases.

Problems in using experts: They may not agree. They may give opin-ions on the "ultimate" fact which itself must decide(extent of injuries, who is the father, what caused the explosion.) Lo the experts here invade the

jury's province? As a rule, no. Before a court will let the expert testify he must show is special knowledge, say, in science, art, trade. Even so, the judge and jury decide issues of the trial, not the experts alone.

ANNUAL PHYSICAL EXAM IS BEST CANCER PREVENTION

Cancer is often spoken of as the Cancer is often spoken of as the "silent" disease. This is because in many cases cancer grows without giving any symptom. And pain which is most often thought of as accompanying disease, is not generally present until cancer is far advanced. Most cancer can be cured when detected and treated in the early stages. The difficulty in cancer control, then, lies with the detection of the disease.

Only a physician can tell if can cer is present. Any suspicious symptom should always be examined by the family physician. But often, by the time any symptoms of cancer show up, it is too late. Treatment of advanced cancer is difficult.



and "expense accounts." Cancled checks alone are no long er being accepted as adequate substantiation for c.aimed expenses. Consequently, before Mr. Hardworking Businessman gets too far off on the wrong foot with the IRS in 1962, Ellis Campbell, Jr., Dal-las IRS district director, comes up

with some helpful suggestions. "Accurate record keeping is the best way to save fedral tax money that I can think of." Campbell said.
"Te following pointers can be as useful to our area self-employed folks as to corporation executives claiming deductions on personal

tax returns for business expenses, wheather reimbursed or not."

Campbell revealed that intertainment expense records should provide relation of the expenditure to the taxpayer's business, and the ordinary and necessary business purpose of the expense. Records should show the name of

the person or persons entertained and the companies the represent, as well as the date and place of

entertainment.
"Naturally," Campbell cautioned.
"the amount of the expenditure must be ordinary and necessary. If the sum is sizeable, be sure to keep a copy of the bill. It's necessary for us to know wheather the enter-tainment was paid by out-of-pocket cash, credit card, check, or charged to the employer."
