The germs of lockjaw are com monly found in soil --- especially manured soil. They enter through a break in the skin and emit a readly toxin which cause jaw and neck muscles to contract so severely that jaws involuntarily close.

There is a new killer in our midst! Actually it isn't so new. There have been deaths from this cause for a few years now.

However, this killer is easily recognized by grown ups. It is the clear plastic that is used for so many purposes these days.

are used as crib sheets? Last year in Texas, three infants eight, seven, and five months old suffocated because they accidently pulled the plastic sheet over their

Pillow cases too, are just as dead ly. Early this year a four month old child was found n bed with its head buried in a plastic pillow case.

Internal Revenue Service's documentary film, "Since the Beginning of Time", covering our Federal tax system has been made available for local organizations' use.



#### -000 Insects Continue Light

-0-Aphids continued to be the major pest on cotton in many localities. Heaviest infestations were found on late planted cotton or in fields which suffered earlier hail damage. Al-though beneficial insect populations have often built up to large numbers, such increases have rarely occured before heavy damage was caused by the aphids in at least parts of plantings. Aphids should be controlled when heavy populations occur gen-erally, and before leaves curl or honeydew shows on most plants.

Fleahoppers were not a serious pest in a majority of fields. Light to medium infestatons were report-ed in most counties. Heavy populations were reported in some fields in Crosby and Floyd counties. The heavier populations were found on older cotton whch generally had a good set of squares and young bolls. In most instances infestations were

not causing serious damage Bollworm egg and small worm counts were low in most fields throughout the area. Light to medium infestations were reported in Briscoe, Garza, and Howard Countes. Since bollworms often appear in damaging infestations in late July or early August fields should be

small worms. found in larger numbers than before. Noticeable ragging occured in parts of some fields but infestations have rarely been sufficient to warrant control. Should heavy infest-ations develop the loopers should be controlled while small.



Some authorities hold that it is due to the thinning out of larger cat species, such as jaguars, which used to keep West Texas' fox populations in bounds. But the widest held theory is that foxes form-erly could not successfully compete with West Texas coyotes. Both are carnivores, but coyotes have the upper hand because of size. In recent years, though, farmers and ranchers have diligently prusued the sheep-killing coyotes until today they are as scarse as purple cows. Result: foxes have moved in from rabies regions of Central and East

The simple rabies transmisssion pattern of dog-bitse-dog and dogbites-man has been a familiar one at least since the days of the Roman Empire. Even today, whenever rabies is mentioned, the vision most readily conjured up is one of a huge dog with dripping jaws run-ning amuck through the streets. The truth is that the host range of rabies is one of the broadest claimed by any disease. All mammals are liable to the infection. It may even extend to poultry. The wildlife reservoir, however, does today and apparently will continue to loom as the most serious menace.

Skunk rabies is nothing new in Texas. More than one cowboy on cattle drives along the old Chisholm Trail a hundred years ago fell victim to attacks of so-called "hydro-phobia cats," which in reality are civet cats, or "skunks of the genus Spilogale" would say. as the mammalogists

Dogs are man's most constant four legged companion, his dearest and most devoted animal friend. Yet this very fidelity makes dogs the principal source of human exposure to deadly rabies. Dr. Ernest Tierkel, the government rabies ex-pert who heads the research pro-gram at the U. S. Public Health Service communicable disease center at Atlanta, Georga, has been quoted as saying "the bite of infected dogs causes 90 percent of the

human cases of rabies in the U. S." Conservation estimates place the number of persons bitten by mad dogs each year in this country at 600.000

Rabies kills a reported average of 12,000 dogs and 1000 head of cattle annually. Since January 1 a known total of 63 head of cattle have been lost by Texas farmers and ranchers and that's only a small part of the real loss. It is no small chore to sever the head of fallen stock, pack it in ice and ship it to the Austin laboratory. Consequently the number of heads sub-mitted for diagnosis reflects only a fraction of the total number of animals which die of rabies New York state gets a truer index of their cattle rabies by the simple but expensive egpedient of paying an indemnity to farmers for cattle lost to the disease.

Fresh fruits and summer vegetables dominate the list of more than a dozen plentiful foods for August in Texas, reports the Agricultural Marketing Service of Dallas. Pears and plums top the list with peaches, lemons and limes also expected to be plentiful.

The third conference for Texas livestock auction market operators will be held at Texas A & M College on August 9. The program will fea-ture discussions of interest to every auction market operator, says Dr. Jarvis Miller, conference chairman.

Either practice, if carried out during late summer, will likely result in oxygen depletion and the loss of fish in the treated pond

The production of watermelons The production of watermeions per acre may soon be doubled by planting bush types which have most of the desirable characteristics of the present vine types. Dr. H. C. Mohr, Department of Horticulture at Texas A & M College, who has played a leading role in developing the bush types says about twice as many plants can be grown on an acre and plants can be grown on an acre and that production from tests has a-bout doubled that of vines on a 12 X 12 foot spacing. Home gardeners may also get some bush types for their limited space. No seed of the types being developed are available.
