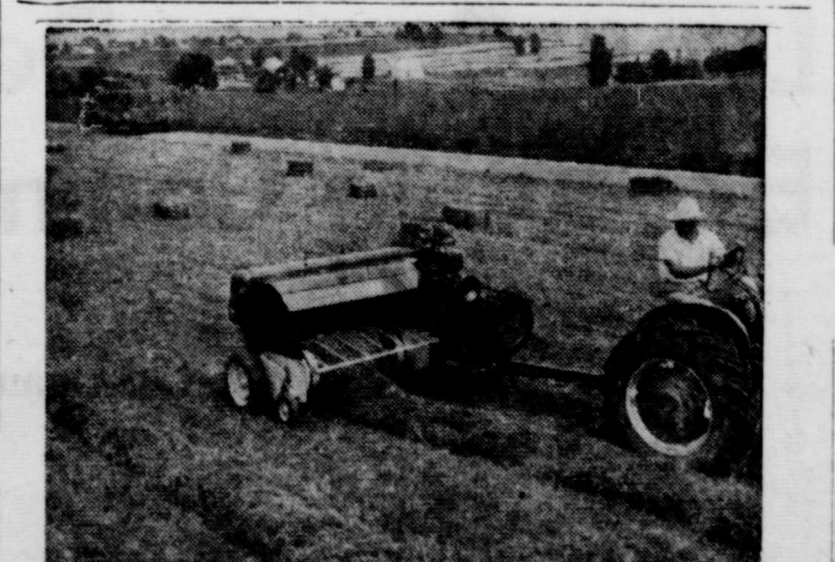

The event will begin at 1 p. m. and continue thru the day. 1st Lt. Dwayne Carter, a '48 graduate will speak. The banquet will be at 6 p. m. The queen will not be announced until the game.

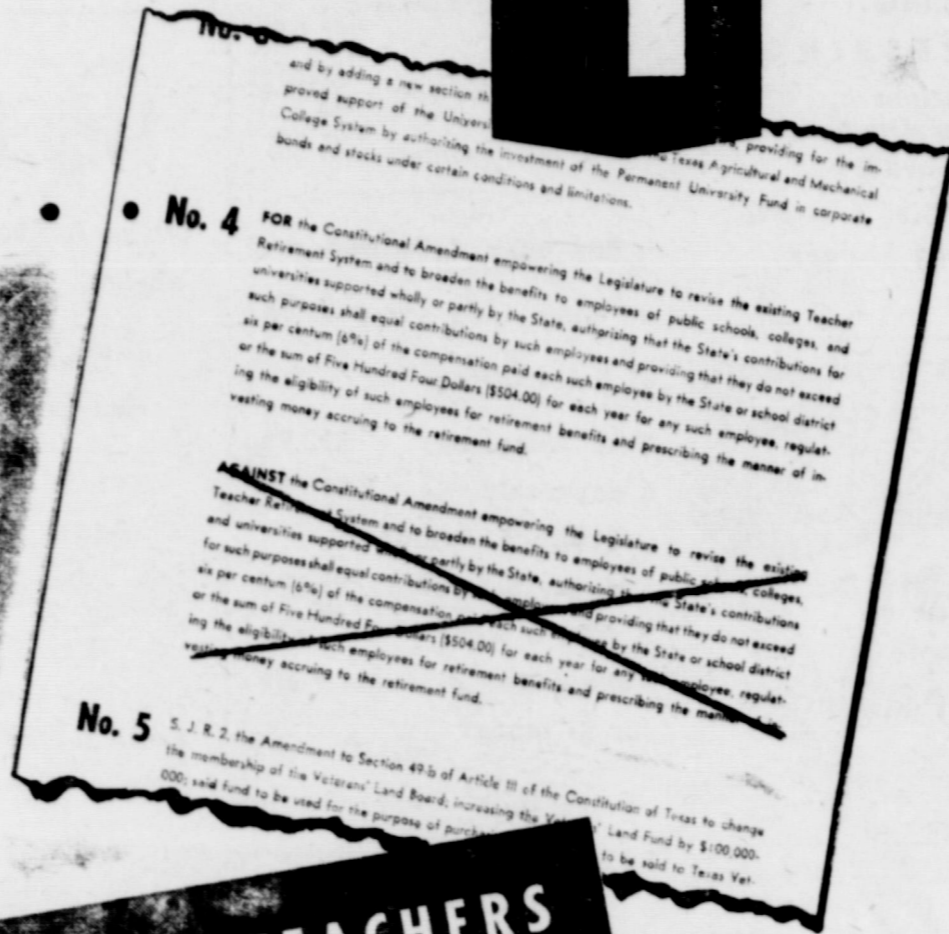

CHAGAS DISEASE IS BEING STUDIED

State Health Department lab. personnel this week launched a three year study of Chagas disease, a rare but potentially dangerous disease entity in Texas.

Dr. Holle said the study is being supported by a \$10,000 research grant from the National Institute of Health. It will run an estimated three years. The study will concern the entire state but will be mostly confined to Gulf Coast regions. Only two human cases of the disease have ever been reported in the nation — one from Corpus Christi and one from Houston. Both occurred last year. Why more cases haven't developed has long been a matter of puzzlement; since six species of the transmitting bugs in Texas have been found to be naturally infected. The disease is transmitted by various species of reduviid or triatoma bugs commonly called kissing bugs, giant bed bugs, blood suckers, or assassin bugs. The malady has been of considerable concern in regions of Central and South America for many years. The infection is transmitted in the droplets of infested bugs. The reservoir of the causative organisms, known as trypanosomes, are such mammals as wood rats, house mice, armadillos and opossums. Children most often have the disease.

Glass School Reward For Not Tossing Rocks

DARIEN, Conn.—Because junior high children in this town can be trusted not to throw stones, educators have rewarded them with a modernly daylighted building that contains entire walls of glass.

The new structure, designed by Ketchum, Gina and Sharp, New York architectural firm, not only has floor-to-ceiling windows which might tempt ordinary kids, but also corridors that are lined with glass walls.

It was decided to use this treatment, which assures extraordinarily fine daylighting in all classroom and general areas, after Darien schoolmen reported they never were bothered with the kind of vandalism that makes it necessary to have 100 per cent replacement of window glass every two years in some metropolitan centers.

As an added feature, the classroom windows have fixed metal louvers to cut out sky glare. The result is one of the most perfectly daylighted schools in the nation.

Pennsylvania Town Tackles Tough Job

CANTON, Pa.—Under the leadership of the Canton Borough Authority (water service), plans are now progressing for the complete numbering of every property in the borough.

The cooperation of the Canton Borough Council seems assured thus paving the way to make the project legal. The plan has backing of the post office, public utilities, and local firms.

Attempts have been made several times to have the town numbered but each time the task seemed too great and the project would fall by the wayside.

At the present time, Floyd Taylor, a member of the authority, has mapped the town and has the task two thirds completed by assigning numbers to each property.

It is the plan of the authority to have numbers purchased and each resident is notified to have the numerals placed on the house.

In order to make this program fully effective it will be necessary to have an ordinance passed by the council and published.

The numbering project will come as good news to all residents of Canton as well as to strangers coming to town. At the present time there has been no rhyme or reason or sequence to the numbering. If a person didn't like his number he could buy any number and place on his building.

Cancer Killer That Spares Life Sought

BERKELEY, Calif.—What would be the ideal chemical to kill cancer cells and at the same time leave normal tissues of the body unharmed?

A new approach to this difficult question will be undertaken by a team of scientists in the University of California School of Medicine, San Francisco, with the aid of a \$10,000 grant from the Damon Runyon Fund.

At the present time the trial and error method usually guides the search for cancer-fighting chemicals. Chemicals are made in the laboratory, then tried on cancerous mice. If they have some effect on cancer, they are then tried on human patients.

There are at present two chief classes of cancer-fighting chemicals.

In each case the chemicals that inhibit cancer growth so far tried have not been able to make a sharp enough distinction between cancer cells and normal cells.

The scientists will study the basic chemical reactions that take place between the chemicals and both cancer and normal tissue.

Their goal is to learn enough about the reactions to be able to write specifications for chemicals that would carry out the desired inhibiting reactions with cancer cells but not with normal cells.

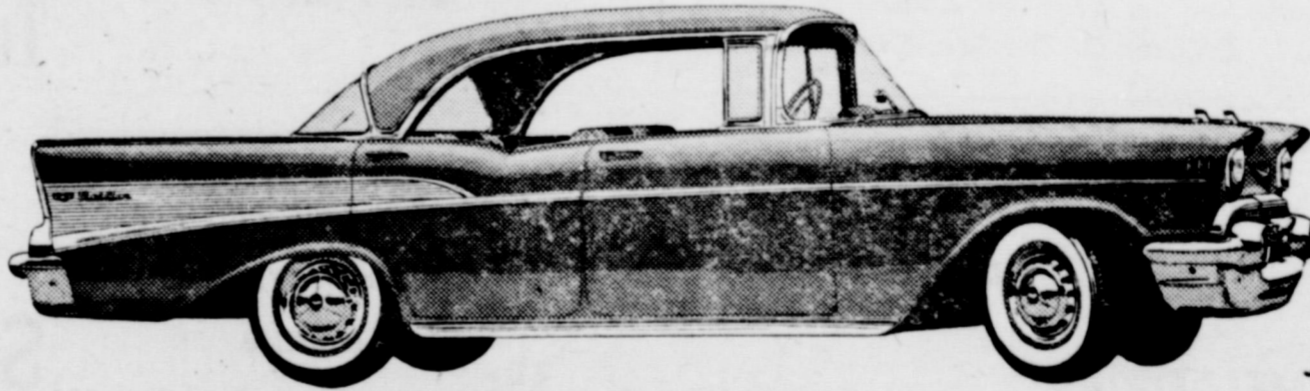
