Planting Goes Into High Gear

Third Planting In Progress

Farmers are "rocking around the clock" this week plowing into the rain-soaked soil cotton seed to give this area the best running start on a good crop in many moons. For many this is the third and second planting with only a few escaping planting until now. There is only a slight amount of April cotton to a stand. Grain will go in after cotton planting is completed.

Rain last week of 85-100ths in. brings the moisture to roughly 10 1-2 inches—almost an inch over the total for 1956. Some of the plains area of Borden Co. was still to wet to plant Monday.

Soil is blowing badly on soils of very fine sandy loam texture where planting has not been completed. For the next month it will be a battle of man against wind-driven, cutting sand on the tender plants.

So far as index knows there is no portion of area too dry to plant this year.

MAY ADD MORE SCIENCE AS GRADUATION REQUIREMENT

The State Board of Education is giving consideration to several proposed changes in accreditation standards for Texas high schools.

Following are recommendations: Four units in English, three of which are required for graduation;

One unit in World History, one unit in American History, and one-half unit in Government, all required for graduation;

Four units in mathematics including Algebra, Geometry and General Mathematics with two units of mathematics required for graduation;

Four units in laboratory science including General Science, Biology, Chemistry, and Physics, with two units required for graduation; and

Enough elective units to make alternatives available to students.

No limitation is proposed on the number of elective courses a high school may offer but the above list specifies 14 1-2 units which every high school must make available and 9 1-2 of these specified units will be required for graduation. To graduate a student must have a minimum of 16 units above credits in Health and Physical Education.



"He did catch it," replied the youngster, "but it got away."




Beauty 'Flips Lid' As Mayor Kisses Her
