ONE SOLITARY LIFE

I am far within the mark when I say that all the armies that ever marched and all the parliaments that ever sat, and all the kings that ever reigned, but together, have not affected the life of man upon this earth as has that

SAFETY RULES GIVEN ON HUNTING

Austin — Quail season opened in
Texas Dec. 1st sending even more
hunters into fields to join those
still talking deer and turkey or
hunting rabbits. It is anyone's guess
as to how many hunters will fall
victim to another hunter's gun.

Statisticians contend 95 percent of
hunting accidents involving guns
could be avoided by sensible hand-
ling of firearms. Last year 194
Texans died in accidents involving
firearms. Expert hunters realize
guns are instruments of violence,
not toys to be handled frivolously.
One of the most deadly hunting sit-
uations is created when hunting is
combined with drinking. Circles top
ranking is accorded the safe,
thoughtful gunhandler. He earns
highest respect and is a welcome
companion among the elite in the
field.

A smart hunter keeps his gun
empty of ammunition except when
actually on the prowl for game. He
never carries a loaded gun in a car,
into home surroundings or into a
camp even when only hunters are
present. Pointing a gun at a com-
panion, even when unloaded, is an
inexcusable violation of safety,
sportsmanship, hunting ethics and
common sense.

Climbing fences is another test
of hunting sense. Either pass the
gun to a companion, muzzle pointed
safely, for him to hold while you
climb thru or over, or lay the gun
on the ground while you cross over.
Another frequent cause of hunt-
ing mishaps is an exploding gun,
the barrel of which has been clog-
ged with mud or snow. Basic intelli-
gence dictates that when a gun mu-
zzle touches the ground it should be
unloaded and checked for obstruc-
tions.

HOLIDAY LEAVE SET

Again, as in the past, a Christ-
mas leave policy is being offered by
the U. S. Army. According to Sgt.
George Moore, Local Army Recruit-
er, men enlisting from Dec. 11 thru
New Year's Day may request as
much as 15 days leave before re-
porting for basic training. With
this liberal policy young men can
enjoy the holiday season with their
families and still draw full pay and
allowances from the U. S. Army.

Post Office on Wednesdays from 4
to 5 p. m. or at 1110 Texas Ave in
Uubbock.

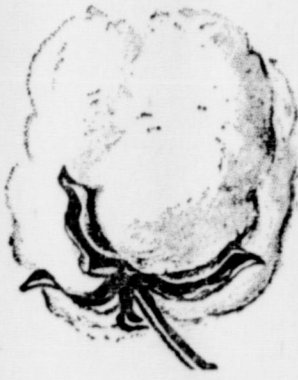
TWO COUNTY FM ROADS TO HAVE SEAL COATS

Your Poinsettia Will Bloom Next Christmas

THE POINSETTIA has long been a popular Christmas plant but probably few people have given much thought to the fact that it does come into bloom each year only at this season.

The poinsettia is one of a group of plants known as short day plants because it will bloom only in the season of the year with short day lengths, preferably 10 hours or less. That is why it is always in bloom during the Christmas season and not during the summer. It could be prevented from blooming now by lengthening the daylight period to 15 hours by means of artificial lights.

Flower growers have learned how to bring garden chrysanthemums into bloom any month of the year by using shading cloth to shorten the days and artificial lights to lengthen the days. The chrysanthemum is also a short day plant.

How can one keep a poinsettia plant until next season? After its usefulness is over, place it in the basement or some dry place where it will not freeze. Do not water it, or at least very little, and let the soil dry up. Next May bring the plant out, cut the stem back about two-thirds, wash the old soil off the roots and re-pot in new soil.

Bay and Rosemary Christmas Tradition

Bay and rosemary have also been represented among our Christmas plants from time immemorial. An ancient writer says: "Rosemarie and Baies that are most faire were stuck about the houses and the churches at the time of Christmas."

According to tradition it was the bay tree, with its lance-like leaves and purple berries, that sheltered the holy family during a thunderstorm. Accordingly it was believed that lightning will never strike a bay tree.

The association of the rosemary plant with Christmas also goes back to the early childhood of our Lord, namely to the flight into Egypt to escape the wrath and jealousy of King Herod. Its branches are said to have held the little garments of the Christ Child that were placed upon them by the Virgin Mother. Originally, its flowers were supposed to have been white, but the plant changed the color of its blossoms to lavender as a result of Mary's cloak.

Yule Tree Business Figured in Millions

CHRISTMAS TREES are a multi-million dollar business. Throughout the nation, some 15 million trees are supplied to the holiday demand. Prices range from \$1 to \$5, and that adds up to real money.

A Christmas tree, in the lake states, is usually a balsam or a spruce. The same is true in New England and the Appalachian section. Elsewhere in the country, virtually all kinds of evergreens are used.

The lodgepole pine and Douglas fir are frequently used in Colorado. On the Pacific coast, it is principally Douglas fir.

In Maryland, Virginia and Washington, D. C., a scrub pine takes a trimming.

In other localities, white pine, southern pine, hemlock, red and white cedar and redwood are used.

The business of harvesting this annual crop begins in the fall, when cutters go into the woods after trees. It continues as cutters bring huge loads to metropolitan markets.

Many land owners manage their swamps to make them yield a crop of trees year after year. Thinning operations are another source of Yule trees.

Farmers have discovered that they can get a cash crop from eroded acres by harvesting Christmas trees 10 or 15 years after they are planted.

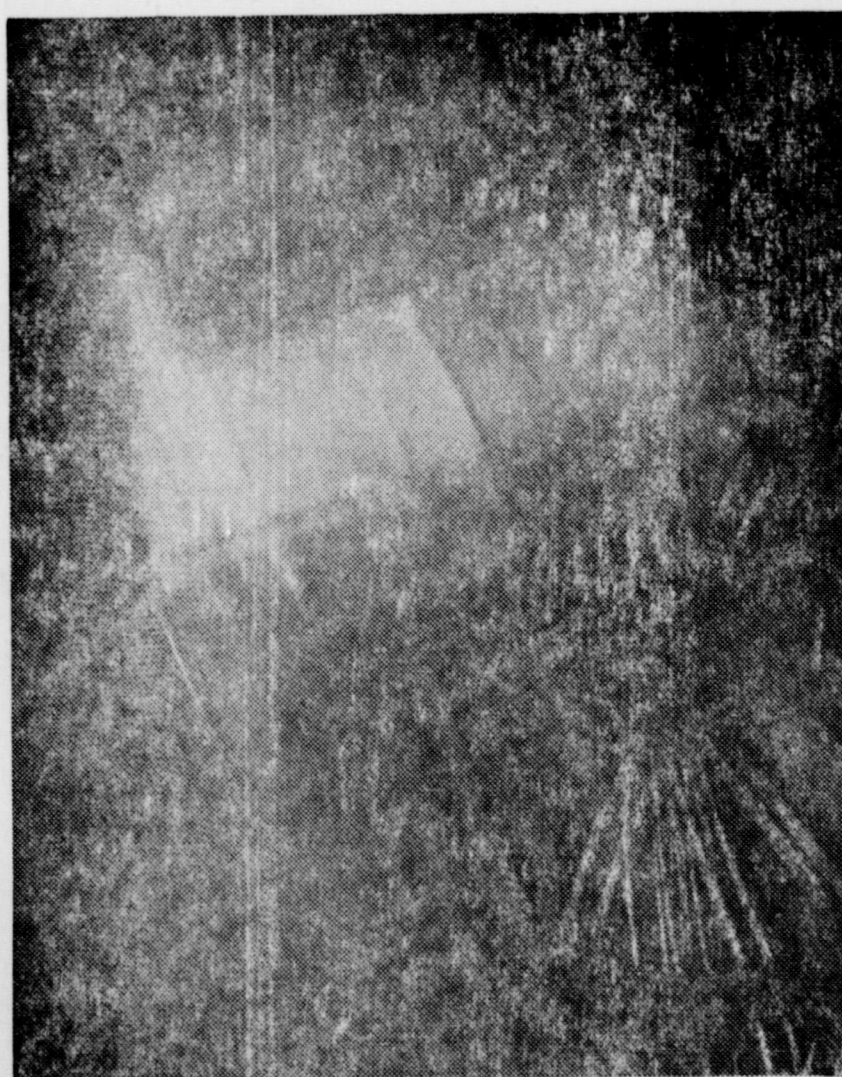
