CERTAIN SLEEPING PILLS MAY BE HARMFUL

How often have you asked yourself, after reading a newspaper account of the authorities swooping down on a narcotic den, what would prompt a person to willingly become a slave to the drug habit?

It seems unreasonable that any normal, healthy person would deliberately endanger his life, family and future by allowing himself to become enmeshed in a net from whence there is often no escape.

Yet, many thousands have developed the sleeping pill habit without considering the possibility of becoming an addict to the drug. A habit of this type is a menace to health as well as the cause of an alarming number of deaths.

Sleeping pills, or "goof balls" as they are commonly referred to by addicts, belong to a group of drugs known as the barbiturates, which when properly used have a high medicinal value. The too frequent or indiscriminate use of the drug may lead to serious illness, mental crackups and death.

As an individual continues to use sleep inducing medicines with out consulting a physician, the dose required to relax and put him him to sleep grows larger and larger. It is here that the danger lies—the tentacles of addiction have entangled him and he is unaware of the fact.

Twelve hundred dollars is still the magic number for retired workers. If they earn \$1200 or less in a year or are over 72 years old for the entire year they can get social security checks for each month. However if a retiree who is under age 72 during the entire year earns over \$1200 a year but less than \$2950, some checks may still be due him — the number of checks depending on his total annual earnings.

Social security also has a monthly retirement test. Even though a person continues full time work he may still get social security checks for any month in which he earns \$100 or less as an employee. Before this year the figure was \$80 a month. Self employed people can get checks for any month they are not actively engaged in their business. Thus, if a person is sick or on a vacation for a long time he may get some checks even though not "retired" in any months.

A representative of the Lubbock Social Security office will be in O'Donnell April 29 at 2 p. m. at the Elementary School and will be glad to assist in all matters pertaining to Social Security.

Q — I have a dental condition which resulted from an injury on maneuvers while in service but for which I am not entitled to receive compensation. Is there any deadline in my case for applying for out patient dental treatment?

A — No. Veterans whose service connected noncompensable dental conditions or disabilities resulted from service injuries may apply at any time and receive as many treatments as are needed.

Q — I am a Korea veteran going to school part time under the GI Bill. To help me plan my school program to get in courses I need for graduation credits, please tell me how long a time I have to complete my training.

A — You have eight years from the date of your discharge to complete training under the Korean GI bill. But you may not train beyond Jan. 31, 1965.

Q — Because of financial difficulties I am finding it hard to make the payments on my World War 2 permanent plan GI life insurance. Could I change to some permanent plan with a lower premium?

A — Yes. That is possible. For example, if you are now paying on a 25 year endowment policy you could change to ordinary life. This is different from the wording on your policy which says no change is possible. However, the law governing the wording on your policy has been changed.

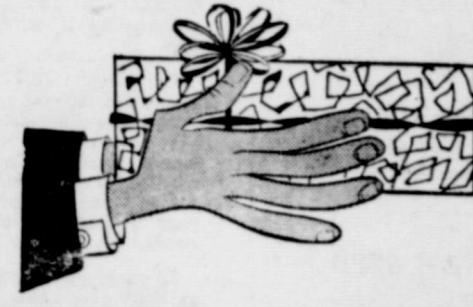
