### Kerr & Middleton To Do Work

City officials this week are rounding into shape plans for a summer paving program. The City expects that 50 or more blocks will be paved and Kerr & Middleton of Lubbock were awarded the contract at lowest of the three bidders.

Provision will be made to pay the pavement out over a two year period with one third down and the balance at 6 per cent interest. The last paving done here, about 2 years ago, cost \$2 a running foot. A 50 ft. lot cost \$100 and \$250 when paved lengthwise. More details will appear as the program develops.

## DAN BLOCKER WRITES OF LIFE IN ARMY AND JAPAN

Dearest Mom and Dad: How are my sweethearts? Yours is fat and sassy; already half Jap. My eyes are beginning to slant. I am aware of a strange change in my eating habits. I've acquired a taste for rice and fish heads. After about 30 days at sea, I can't remember being happier than when we saw land. The good earth, back on solid ground again. I guess you are pretty anxious to hear about our trip over and our safe arrival. Well here goes: I hope the censorship is lax with me.

We left New Orleans on the U S Navy boat "Marine Lynx"; a little single stack troop carrier, about 450 ft long carrying over 3,000 men. We crossed the Caribbean sea in about 5 days only barely missing Cuba and Puerto Rico. In the journey to Panama, we went thru the Canal in about 8 hours; a magnificent job of engineering, and docked at Panama City. We were given 5 hours ashore, but were restricted to a Naval base. After leaving there we set sail for Japan, non-stop. But the 4th day out a man was stricken by polio and consequently changed our course for San Diego, where we left our patient in good hands at a Naval hospital. We set sail again for Hokkaido, Japan. After about 15 days at sea this time I really believed we were going. This time I awoke to find myself falling and rolling all over the bed. I thought the world was surely coming to an end. At dawn we managed to pick ourselves up from the floor and go up on deck. It was only a storm but it lasted about 18 hours. It was quite an experience but we weathered it all right.

After what seemed a short century, one Friday afternoon some one on top deck called out "Land" and we all tore out for the top and there we got our first glance of the Japanese Islands. There were two mountain ranges rising thru the water surface, side by side to a high summit; they were beautiful. All Snow capped; they were beautiful. Just like our Rockies, only very odd shaped trees. We sailed down between the ranges to a beautiful little natural harbor. Muroran, just at the foot of the huge snow capped mountains. We docked and came down off the ship and boarded a small narrow gauge, funny looking three hours to the main land. A small train, which is an old Jap army camp. It is now occupied by some Air Corps men. Of course there wasn't enough facilities for us so we were moved about 2 miles away and put up our tents.

The trial was at San Angelo as a retrial after Rogers was given death for the same crime in Dawson County.

It seems a great miscarriage of justice that there should be such a wide range of sentences in the two trials. Rogers may well get out of the pen after serving no more than two years for his shocking crime which he admitted at trial. The Index has no idea who, if anyone, was at fault in this latest trial but out here on the Baldies it makes us sick at our bellies. The taking of Claudes life drew a lighter sentence than stealing a dozen old hens. How sad, how revolting. Justice? Try to make Mrs Johnson or the family believe that!

But that case is closed. Others will breed from that and other light sentences.

In some states, no. Texas, however, the State has the right to appeal the same as does the defense if grounds justify. It seems this change would be wise in Texas. Now Rogers has paid his debt to society after a short hitch with Uncle Ben—but being a peace officer, a noble profession, is far more risky. As said above this case will breed wanton killers.

## Senator Byrd Tries To Save Nation Nine Billion

SENATOR BYRD, Democrat of Virginia, says, and knows, that there can be a cut from the President's budget, that calls for taxes of better than 71 billions of dollars in order to pay as we go for our war preparations. Of these more than 71 billions, Senator Byrd proposes to cut more than nine billion, without hampering the defense preparations to the extent of a single dollar. He would take out of that budget only those items that call for expenditures on strictly home projects, either those proposed to start, such as the St. Lawrence waterway, or those for continuing work on projects started in previous years, or those new or continuing projects in this country or abroad, that have no possible connection with our American defense.

In the United States there are approximately 30 million families. That immediately unnecessary nine billion of taxes, means a burden of some \$300 as an average for each of those 30 million families. That is a sizable item in the budget of the average American family. In adding such an amount to the family expenditures, adjustments must be made to provide for the unneeded tax item. A family of my acquaintance had a family discussion as to what expense they could cut out in order to provide for that additional new tax item.

There are few American families that would not willingly sacrifice

The lower you get, the more barriers there are likely to be against blast, heat and radioactivity.

Select the basement wall nearest the probable target area of your city. If the house is blown over, it will most likely fall away from this wall. If you have a work bench or strong table, big enough to get under, move it into your shelter area, near a wall or strong supporting column. If the time comes when you actually have to take shelter, lie under the table.

If you live in a home that has no basement, choose a shelter area without windows, on the ground floor. An interior hallway is probably best. In time of emergency the shelter area should be cleared of mirrors or other objects that might cause injury.

If you live in an apartment house, rules for taking shelter will be posted in your building. Learn them!

IT IS HOPED—but it's not at all certain—that news of the attack will come through in sufficient time to enable air raid stations to warn the citizens. The alert will be a warbling siren blast lasting three minutes.

Immediately close all your Venetian blinds to keep radioactivity as much as possible out of the house. Go to your shelter.

Your shelter should be supplied well in advance with the following items:

1. First aid kit.
2. Fire extinguisher.
3. Axe and crowbar; a shovel.
4. Battery operated radio to listen for instructions or all-clear signal.
5. At least one flashlight.
6. An emergency supply of canned food and bottled water in the event that an attack continues for several hours.

Household preparedness plus many important facts concerning the actual strength and effects of atom bombs are part of the new film authorized by the federal office of civilian defense, "Survival Under Atomic Attack." Dr. Richard Gerstell, consultant to the federal office of civilian defense, and technical advisor on the film, urges every American to see the picture and follow its advice.

## Dangers of Wartime

Lesson for May 20, 1951

NOT all the dangers of wartime are to life and limb. More serious dangers threaten the minds, the attitudes, the characters, the souls of those who make war. Some of our readers will find no war a good war; others will draw a line between wars that are justified and wars that are not. But no matter how well-justified a war may be, its dangers to mind and heart are just as real as if it were not justified at all.

### "To Decide Who Is Left"

ONE danger which war-making brings is that it gets everyone thinking that might makes right. Now might does not really make right and never did; otherwise the champion heavy-weight would always be the best man, morally, in all the world, and the most helpless invalid would be the most wicked.

Along with this "might-is-right" idea is another one close to it: that the best way to persuade others to our way of thinking or to our way of living is to beat them over the head. That has never succeeded yet. You know yourself that you were never persuaded that way. Fists and guns and armies can make people change their tune, but never change their minds.

The way to change people is through their minds and consciences and hearts. One act of international goodwill, justice or generosity is more potent than tons of high explosives. The sending of food, services, skilled help such as doctors and teachers, does more to win friends than any number of armed alliances. The Christian way is always the way of love.

### Topsy-Turvy Land

THE waging of war creates illusions. Besides the one just mentioned, of confusing might with right, there is this one too: a nation at war lives in a kind of topsy-turvy land. What is of greatest value is rated low, and things of little value are made much of.

The longer a war goes on, the more of a habit this crooked scale of values becomes. For instance: normally we value life above all things. Violent death is something to make the headlines, and causing death to others is something from which we all shrink. But in wartime we are all tuned, so to speak, to the business of killing.

Whatever genius such a nation may have, whatever productive power, goes mainly to building up the military "potential," devising more and better ways of inflicting sudden death.

Dr. Charles Leber tells of remembering, when a boy, how his father and mother read in the paper about the sinking of the steamship Titanic, which went down with the loss of over 1,500 lives. It was breakfast time when they read the paper; but neither father nor mother could finish the meal.

That was before World War I. But now, forty years later, how many people would lose their appetite at reading of the death of a mere 1,500 persons? We are so used to slaughter that as Dr. Leber puts it, we have become brutalized, we have "lost our sense of compassionate shame."

### The Illusion of Violence

TWO last illusions pursue the warring nation. One is that war is normal. In reality, however necessary war may ever be, it is never normal; but let it run too long or come too often, and people take it for granted.

The other illusion is that it is possible by war to end wars, that by one more war, one more victory, peace will be secured once and for all. It never works.

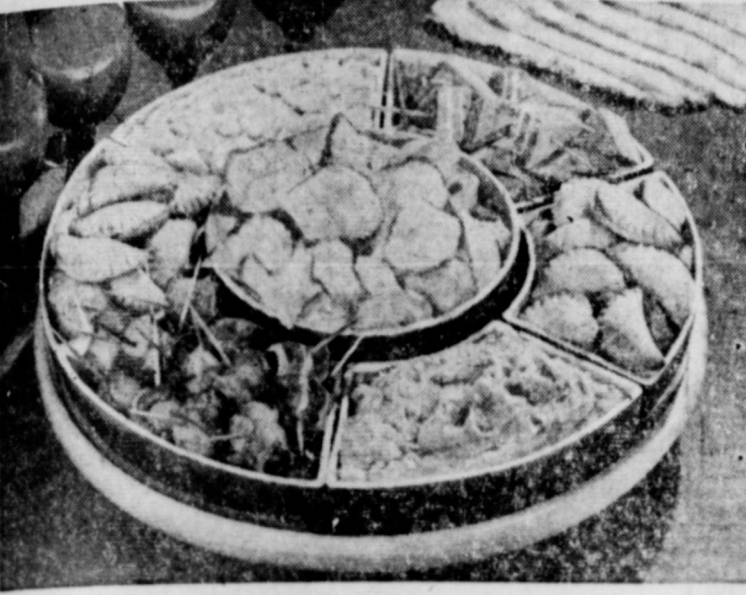
"The one thing you cannot do with bayonets is to sit upon them," Arnold J. Toynbee has warned us (see his "War and Civilization") that "the ultimate failure of all attempts to win salvation by the sword... is demonstrated in history."

He might have taken his text from Isaiah 31, or the history of Israel and Judah, for Isaiah was saying much the same thing to both Hezekiah and Sennacherib. But neither one understood him; and so their nations died. For whenever any nation puts its supreme faith in force, and neglects the character of its citizens, or the justice of its institutions, then it has forgotten God.

Serve an Appetizing Tray at Snacktime!

### Appetizing Ideas

ONE OF THE nicest ways to entertain is just to ask friends to drop in for a snack. If you've been invited to a church supper or a large family get-together, have friends drop in to visit you, and then all go together. Snacking is a popular and informal way of entertaining during afternoons and evenings. Nibbling while you chat or play games, listen to music or watch programs is an easy way to serve food. Just put out a tray of snacks along with a pitcher of chilled fruit or vegetable juice and let guests help themselves.

HERE'S AN old-fashioned onion cake which may be served warm with chilly vegetable juice. It's ideal for eating before dinner or for evening, since the "cake" is best served in very small wedges.

**\*Zweibelkuchen (Onion Cake)**  
(Serves 8-10)

**Crust:**  
1 cup butter  
4 tablespoons milk  
Pinch of sugar  
2 cups flour  
Pinch of salt  
Mix together all ingredients gently and place in refrigerator until dough is ready to be handled. Roll out dough and place in 2 8-inch pie tins. Bake in a moderate (350°) oven for 10 minutes or until half done.

**Batter:**  
4 large onions, diced  
6 strips bacon, diced  
2 whole eggs  
1 egg yolk  
1/2 cup sour cream  
1 teaspoon chopped chives  
Pinch of caraway seed  
Salt and pepper to taste  
Fry bacon; when crisp, drain off some of the fat, leaving the remainder for cooking the onions. When yellow and soft, drain off fat and add beaten eggs, bacon, sour cream, seasoning and chives. Pour into pie crust, partially baked, add the caraway seeds and bake in a moderate (350°) oven for 12 to 15 minutes. Serve warm.

A LAZY SUSAN is an excellent way of serving snack; but if you don't have one, arrange four or five small pottery bowls on a round tray and fill each bowl with a different appetizer. Place a bowl of potato chips in the center for dipping into the "dunk" mixtures.

**Cream Cheese-Pickle "Dunk"**  
Blend 1 3-ounce package cream cheese with 2 tablespoons milk. Stir in 1/4 cup sweet pickle relish. Cover and refrigerate until served.

**Deviled Ham "Dunk"**  
Blend 2 3-ounce cans of deviled ham with 2 tablespoons mayonnaise and 1 tablespoon prepared mustard. (Liver or tongue spread may be used in place of the deviled ham.) Cover and refrigerate until served.

**Veal Loaf Triangles**  
Spread thin slices of canned veal loaf with a soft sharp cheese and stack three together; chill. Cut into triangles and spear with a toothpick. Wrap well in waxed paper and refrigerate until serving time.

A cheese sandwich gives you a hearty and tasty supper if you spread the bread enclosing it in a bit of mustard. Dip the sandwich in egg and milk mixture and fry until golden brown. Serve with broiled Canadian bacon.

Canned corned beef hash becomes something of a treat when you brown it in the skillet until crisp and serve with scrambled eggs over the top.

### Deviled Ham Pastries

Cut tiny rounds from rich pastry. Place 1 teaspoon deviled ham on half a round. Moisten the edges with water and fold over. Crimp with a fork and prick the top. Bake in a very hot (450°) oven about 10 minutes. These may be made ahead, refrigerated and baked at the time of serving. Or, bake and reheat before serving.

**Bacon Wrapped Olives or Pineapple**  
Wrap well-drained, canned pineapple chunks or stuffed olives in half slices of bacon; secure with toothpick. Broil slowly, turning once until bacon is crisp. These may be prepared for broiling, wrapped in waxed paper and refrigerated. Broil just before serving time.

### Delicious Balls (Makes 2 dozen)

2 tablespoons finely chopped onion  
1 tablespoon chopped green pepper  
1 tablespoon fat  
1 pound finely ground lamb  
1/2 cup canned tomato juice  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon pepper  
Dash of nutmeg  
1 tablespoon minced parsley  
Cook onion and green pepper in fat until onion is golden. Combine with remaining ingredients. Mix well. Form into bite-sized balls. Cook in 2 tablespoons fat until light brown on all sides. Serve hot on toothpicks.

### Crab-Meat Rolls (Makes 2 dozen)

1/2 cup tomato juice  
1 well-beaten egg  
1 cup dry bread crumbs  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
Dash of pepper  
1/2 teaspoon chopped parsley  
1/2 teaspoon chopped celery leaves  
1 1/2-ounce can crab meat, flaked  
12 strips bacon, cut in half crosswise  
Mix tomato juice and egg. Add crumbs, seasonings, parsley, celery leaves, and crab meat. Mix thoroughly. Roll into finger lengths; wrap each in half strip of bacon. Broil, turning frequently to brown evenly. Serve hot.



A HOT "dunking sauce" can be especially nice if you want to pass it around for fresh, canned or frozen shrimp propped on toothpicks:

### Creele Sauce

1/4 cup finely chopped onion  
1/4 cup finely chopped green pepper  
2 tablespoons shortening  
1 can condensed tomato soup  
1/2 cup water  
1 teaspoon vinegar  
Dash of black pepper  
Dash of tabasco sauce  
Cook onion and green pepper in shortening in skillet. Add remaining ingredients; cook over low heat for about 10 minutes to blend flavors.

Canned Spanish rice makes a quick stuffing for parboiled green pepper halves. Top with a slice of American cheese and bake in tomato sauce.

You can cream some canned lobster quickly if you're in a hurry for supper, and serve on easily cooked instant rice.

Marinated leftover vegetables can make a fine salad to serve with slices of cold boiled ham, spread with cream cheese. Place a dill pickle strip on top of the cheese and roll the ham.

## AROUND THE HOUSE

Starch burned on to the bottom of an iron can prove a nuisance in ironing. To clean a starch-stuck iron, let iron cool thoroughly, then rub bottom with a damp cloth sprinkled with baking soda perfectly safe.

With a can-opener which cuts evenly, remove both ends of small soup cans, grease the inside, and Soda cleans without scratching, its peck cookie dough into these cans. After chilling thoroughly, the firm dough can be pushed out in molded form for easy slicing.

To successfully darn a woolen fabric of many colors, use a strand of each color of thread in the needle.

When making muffins, have milk and eggs at room temperature for best results. This is especially important when melted shortening is used, because cold milk will solidify shortening.

If a loaf of bread is in danger of molding, cut it in thin slices, place the slices in a pan and place in the oven. When dry, put through a food chopper, store in a closed container, and use for stuffing and puddings.

If food is burned on the bottom of a pan, soak with baking soda and water overnight. When you're in a hurry to use the pan, bring cold water and soda to a boil over a high flame until burned residue falls off.

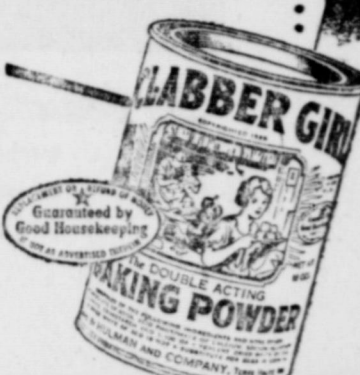

**American Farmers Own 91 Billion Dollar Plant**

The family economics bureau of the Northwestern National Life Insurance reports American farmers now own 91 million dollars worth of land, buildings, live stock and equipment.

This gigantic food "factory" turned out approximately 30 billion dollars worth of produce in 1950, or a third of the "plant" itself. In 1900 and even in 1910, American agriculture produced only a sixth of its own physical value in a year. Even in prosperous 1929 it produced a little less than one-fourth of its "plant" value, according to the study.

The average farm today is a third bigger, comprising 195 acres of land, as against an average of 146 acres in 1900 and 145 in 1925. Annual net income per farm has climbed from \$350 in 1900 to an estimated \$2,225 in 1950.

The American farmer has accomplished these gains through a 900 per cent increase in his investment in tools and machinery and by better methods, better seed, better livestock, and more fertilizer.

The American farmer is constantly in search of new machinery that will do a faster and better job. Among new tools is a one-man wire-tie baler that handles up to 10 tons of hay per hour. The New Holland machine has a "warner" that makes the baler engine sputter when the wire supply runs low; a hydraulic unit that keeps bales uniform and "twisters" which make two wire ties in less than two seconds while the bale is held under compression.

## Truman-MacArthur Fight Continues; Chinese Launch Spring Offensive

**HOW DIVIDED THE NATION**—There was no sign of a letup in the great quarrel on whether President Truman did right or wrong when he fired Gen. Douglas MacArthur from his Pacific commands. If anything, the man on Main Street was hotter under the collar than ever before following the general's impressive speech before congress. The line of dispute was clearly drawn: The general's supporters believed his proposed plan of action in Asia the only possible realistic one; his opponents were just as positive his plan of action would mean world wide war. The great controversy caused many in the home towns to wonder just how divided can a nation become and still effectively battle communism?



**ticker-tape blizzard**

Never before in the history of the U. S., or possibly in the history of the world, has a returning hero received such acclaim as Gen. Douglas MacArthur as he drove through a ticker-tape blizzard in the shouting of 7,500,000 people in New York. It was the climax of welcome home celebrations which began in San Francisco when the general returned to his native land for the first time in 14 years.

plain the conduct of the Korean conflict. The testimony will blow hot and cold. It will be up to the home-towner to sift it and find the truth.

**THE UNITED NATIONS**—Members of the United Nations, whether they were in agreement with General MacArthur's policy in the far east or not, were almost as impressed by the general's address as were members of congress.

But the general did not gain any votes in the U.N. for following his policy. His speech confirmed many delegates in the belief that a yawning gulf separates his concept of the way to defeat Communist imperialism and that of the United Nations. Only on one point was there any degree of accord—his demand for an intensified economic blockade of Communist China.

**ON THE FRONT**—And while the politicians ranted over how the Korean conflict should be conducted, the North Koreans and Chinese Reds opened their long awaited spring offensive. First reports from the front indicated a break-through in the mountainous central sector of Korea by an estimated 400,000 enemy troops. Approximately 300,000 others were reported attacking in other sectors of Korea.

First withdrawals amounted to as much as 15 miles. Allied officers reported, with the Chinese suffering heavy casualties. Nearly 9,000 Reds were killed or wounded by artillery alone on the first day of the attack, the eighth army estimated. Swarms of planes claimed an additional toll of nearly 2,000.

**SALES TAX**—The Committee of Americans, reportedly a nonprofit, fact-finding research-survey organization covering all 48 states and Hawaii, reports a recent survey indicated the majority of the nation's businessmen favor a retail-sales tax on the federal level.

The organization said it sent questionnaires to some 30,000 businessmen, of whom more than 15,000 replied. The businessmen were said to favor the sales tax by 62 per cent; 12 per cent for such a tax at the manufacturer's level; and 26 per cent opposed to any sales tax.

Whether or not the survey reached to the Main Street businessman was not indicated, but it could hardly be conclusive unless he was consulted.



**Take Me Out to the Ball Game**

Neither wars or threats of wars, politics or the acclaim of a conquering hero could dim the opening of the baseball season on the sandlot of the home towns to the major leagues. Sport-minded Americans took time out for the greatest game of them all.

**MAIN STREET BUSINESS**—Hardware, dry goods and general merchandise, and jewelry stores on Main Street enjoyed a dollar sales increase during March of 1951 over the same month last year, the census bureau reported.

Hardware stores recorded a 22 per cent sales rise; dry goods and general merchandise stores a 20 per cent rise and jewelry stores a 15 per cent rise.

The agency said its figures were based on reports from about 10,000 independent stores. The department gave out no actual sales figures.

**PROBER HAILS PRESS**—Senator Kefauver, speaking before the American Society of Newspaper Editors, said his committee's celebrated investigation into crime could not have succeeded without the support of the nation's press.

The senator restated his theory that the place for "action against gamblers and other underworld elements is Main Street, not Pennsylvania Ave., Washington."

All the press joined in the effort of exposing crime, Kefauver said. "That spark was instrumental in setting off the explosion that has followed."

### MARRIAGE AND DIVORCE

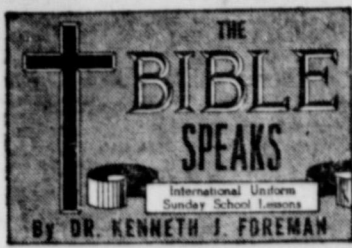
#### 1950 Marriage Rate Climbs 6 Per Cent

The U.S. public health service reported recently the marriage rate rose and the divorce rate dropped in the United States during the past year.

The agency's figure show the number of 1950 marriages—1,669,934 in all—rose nearly 6 per cent over 1949, the first increase since 1946. The total of 1950 divorces—estimated at 385,000—was the smallest

since 1943. The drop was 3 per cent from the preceding year and marked the fourth successive year of declines. The agency gave no explanation for the increase in marriages or decrease of divorces.

Statisticians calculated that 11 out of every 1,000 men, women and children in the nation got married last year. Only 2 1/4 of each 1,000 found it did not work out.

### How Nations Decay

Lesson for May 13, 1951

**THE** mortality rate of nations is 100%. So Dr. T. W. Lingle used to put the fact that no nation yet has lived forever. They all die sooner or later. What kills them?

The student of history may delve into such books as Gibbon's "Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire" or Spengler's pessimistic "Decline of the West", or Toynbee's more optimistic "Study of History." Dr. Foreman



But when the juice has been squeezed out of these learned and interesting volumes, the Truth's essence turns out to be much the same as what we can find by reading the Old Testament. True, the nations under the Old Testament lens are not big empires like Rome, still less like the British Empire; the kingdom of Israel was only about 100 miles long and 60 miles wide, while the kingdom of Judah was smaller than many an American county.

**Promise**  
WHEN Solomon died, the kingdom he had inherited from David had already shrunk. After his death, what was left immediately split into two kingdoms, the one on the south called Judah and the one in the north called Israel.

The nation of Israel, which lasted more than 200 years, began with great promise. Indeed, one of God's prophecies (1 Kings 11) had given to Jeroboam, the first king, the same promise which had been given David, of an enduring kingdom on condition of obedience to God.

Everything seemed to be favorable. Israel had more territory than most of her neighbors had, a far more productive soil, and easy access to transportation.

**Crash**  
ISRAEL should have succeeded; but it failed. Only a little more than 200 years afterwards, no very great age as nations go, it crashed completely, never to rise again. When the walls of its "impregnable" capital city of Samaria, after a two-year siege, fell to the battering-rams of the Assyrian army, and over 27,000 leading citizens were deported, that was the end of Israel for good and all.

How did this happen?  
The Hebrew historian ties everything into a few words when he says that they wrought wicked things . . . they rejected God's statutes . . . they served idols.

But what were the details? What, in particular, did the nation of Israel do that was wicked?

Reading the prophet Amos will give many of the answers. At the time he preached, by all chamber-of-commerce standards Israel was at the peak of production and prosperity. But he foresaw doom around the corner, and he gave reasons. He called a spade a spade. Reading him, or even reading the bolder accounts in Kings, we can see the collapse was no mystery.

**Other Gods**  
ONE thing fundamentally wrong with Israel was idolatry. This was not the simple matter of making carved images; it meant taking some other "god" to be the true God.

We know what the religions of Chemish and Molech and Baal were like; they were thoroughly bad. In the law of the true God, life and purity were regarded as sacred; life and purity under these other gods were held cheap. But one can see from reading Amos that what the people of Israel really worshipped was still another idol to whom no statue was erected: their own pleasures.

Too many citizens didn't care what happened to the country, so long as they could get their liquor. Well, let us not read the Old Testament from mere curiosity. What about our own nation, our own people and times? The United Stewardship Council (now the Joint Department of Stewardship of the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U. S. A.) reports that every year since 1934, excepting 1936, has shown an increase in giving through the churches.

But—the percent of this increase is not so large as the increase of annual income. The increase for contributions through the church of God is less, far less, than the increase in spending for alcoholic liquors, soft drinks, candy, football games, jewelry, and a multitude of other things. We, like Israel, are putting God last!

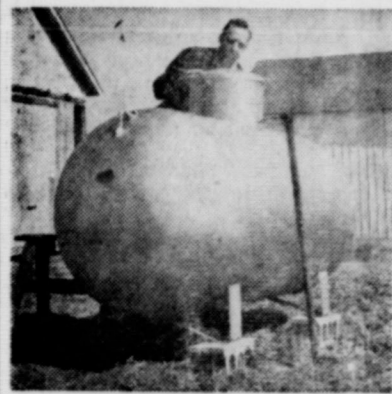

## Liquefied Petroleum Gas Popular Farm Fuel System Gives Farmer Independent Fuel Supply

The days of the wood stove and coal heating of the nation's farm houses, brooders and barns is almost a thing of the past. Newer, cleaner, and more efficient methods are being adopted at an unprecedented rate.

D. G. Nelson, who operates a 20-acre poultry feed and medicine re-

search farm near Coral, Ill., is an example of what the American farmer is doing about heating.

He found that temperature variances of 4 to 5 degrees in brooder tests completely upset his experiments. After tests with three fuels, he settled on liquefied petroleum gas as the most efficient and inexpensive for his particular operation.

Convinced of the fuel's efficiency, he installed a supply tank large enough for house heating, water heating and cooking. The system also heats two 500-chick brooders. A new 1,700-square-foot laboratory now under construction will be connected to the system.

Nelson is particularly pleased with the dependability of the system that gives him an independent fuel supply right on the farm.

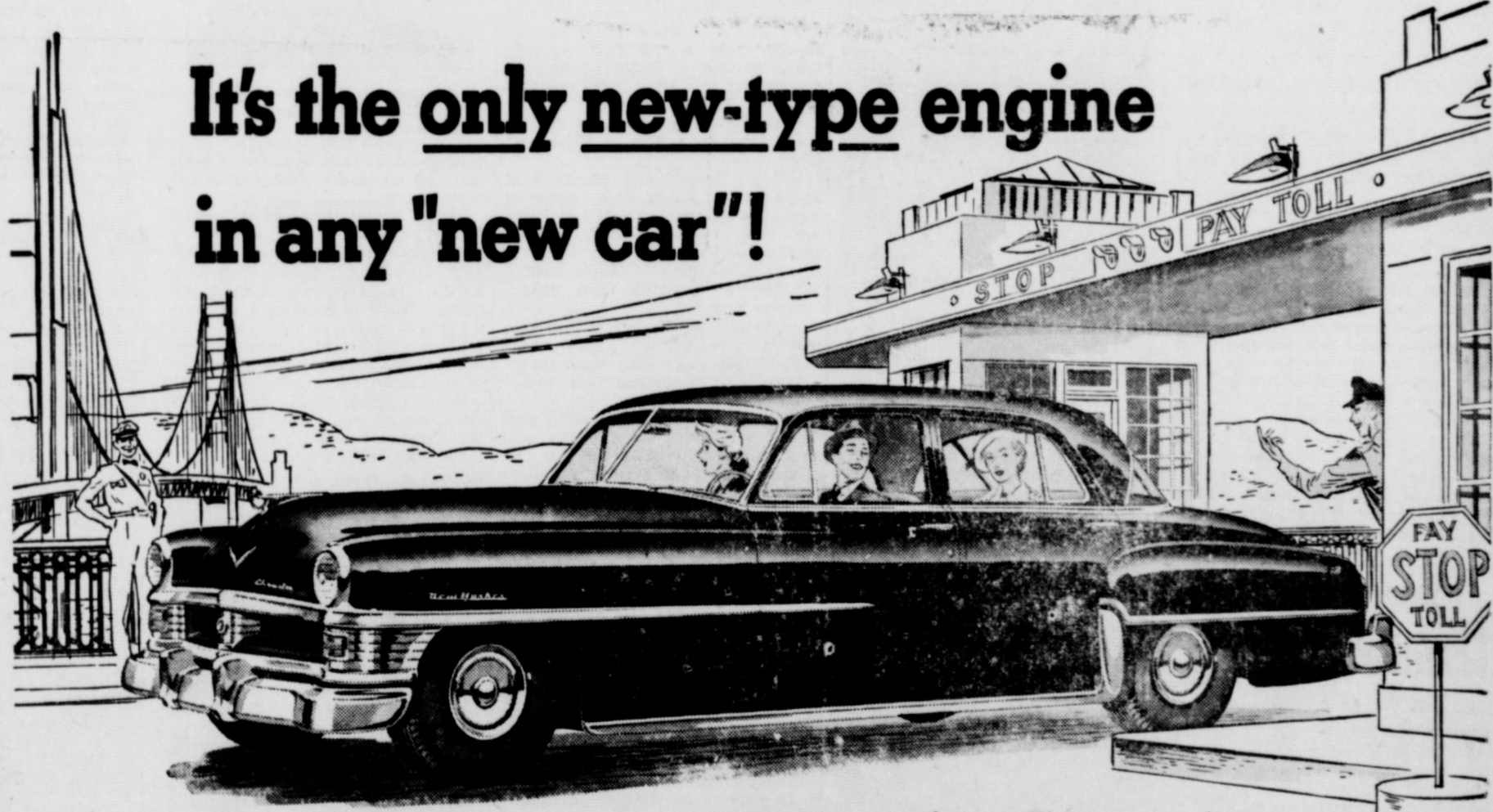

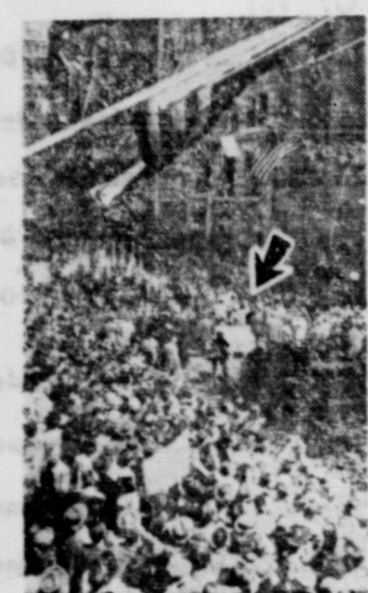

# Truman-MacArthur Fight Continues; Chinese Launch Spring Offensive

**HOW DIVIDED THE NATION**—There was no sign of a letup in the great quarrel on whether President Truman did right or wrong when he fired Gen. Douglas MacArthur from his Pacific commands. If anything, the man on Main Street was hotter under the collar than ever before following the general's impressive speech before congress. The line of dispute was clearly drawn: The general's supporters believed his proposed plan of action in Asia the only possible realistic one; his opponents were just as positive his plan of action would mean world wide war. The great controversy caused many in the home towns to wonder just how divided can a nation become and still effectively battle communism?



**Ticker-Tape Blizzard**

Never before in the history of the U. S., or possibly in the history of the world, has a returning hero received such acclaim as Gen. Douglas MacArthur as he drove through a ticker-tape blizzard to the shouting of 7,500,000 people in New York. It was the climax of welcome home celebrations which began in San Francisco when the general returned to his native land for the first time in 14 years.

**THE UNITED NATIONS**—Members of the United Nations, whether they were in agreement with General MacArthur's policy in the far east or not, were almost as impressed by the general's address as were members of congress.

But the general did not gain any votes in the U.N. for following his policy. His speech confirmed many delegates in the belief that a yawning gulf separates his concept of the way to defeat Communist imperialism and that of the United Nations. Only on one point was there any degree of accord—his demand for an intensified economic blockade of Communist China.

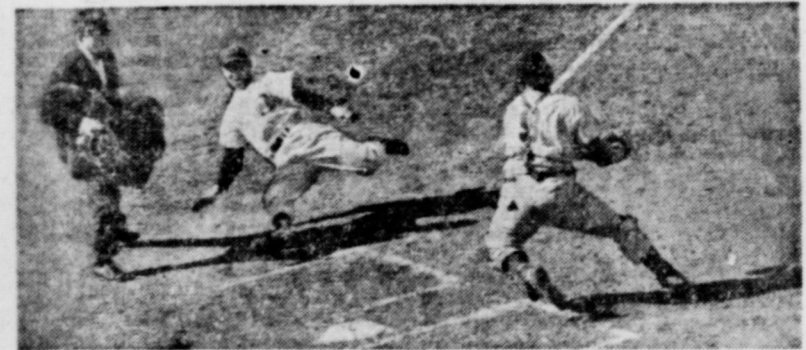
**ON THE FRONT**—And while the politicians ranted over how the Korean conflict should be conducted, the North Koreans and Chinese Reds opened their long awaited spring offensive. First reports from the front indicated a break-through in the mountainous central sector of Korea by an estimated 400,000 enemy troops. Approximately 300,000 others were reported attacking in other sectors of Korea.

First withdrawals amounted to as much as 15 miles. Allied officers reported, with the Chinese suffering heavy casualties. Nearly 9,000 Reds were killed or wounded by artillery alone on the first day of the attack, the eighth army estimated. Swarms of planes claimed an additional toll of nearly 2,000.

**SALES TAX**—The Committee of Americans, reportedly a nonprofit, fact-finding research-survey organization covering all 48 states and Hawaii, reports a recent survey indicated the majority of the nation's businessmen favor a retail-sales tax on the federal level.

The organization said it sent questionnaires to some 30,000 businessmen, of whom more than 15,000 replied. The businessmen were said to favor the sales tax by 62 per cent; 12 per cent for such a tax at the manufacturer's level; and 26 per cent opposed to any sales tax.

Whether or not the survey reached to the Main Street businessman was not indicated, but it could hardly be conclusive unless he was consulted.



**Take Me Out to the Ball Game**

Neither wars or threats of wars, politics or the acclaim of a conquering hero could dim the opening of the baseball season on the sandlot of the home towns to the major leagues. Sport-minded Americans took time out for the greatest game of them all.

**MAIN STREET BUSINESS**—Hardware, dry goods and general merchandise, and jewelry stores on Main Street enjoyed a dollar sales increase during March of 1951 over the same month last year, the census bureau reported.

Hardware stores recorded a 22 per cent sales rise; dry goods and general merchandise stores a 20 per cent rise and jewelry stores a 15 per cent rise.

The agency said its figures were based on reports from about 10,000 independent stores. The department gave out no actual sales figures.

**PROBER HAILS PRESS**—Senator Kefauver, speaking before the American Society of Newspaper Editors, said his committee's celebrated investigation into crime could not have succeeded without the support of the nation's press.

The senator restated his theory that the place for "action against gamblers and other underworld elements is Main Street, not Pennsylvania Ave., Washington."

All the press joined in the effort of exposing crime, Kefauver said. "That spark was instrumental in setting off the explosion that has followed."

**MARRIAGE AND DIVORCE**

## 1950 Marriage Rate Climbs 6 Per Cent

The U.S. public health service reported recently the marriage rate rose and the divorce rate dropped in the United States during the past year.

The agency's figure show the number of 1950 marriages—1,669,934 in all—rose nearly 6 per cent over 1949, the first increase since 1946. The total of 1950 divorces—estimated at 385,400—was the smallest

since 1943. The drop was 3 per cent from the preceding year and marked the fourth successive year of declines. The agency gave no explanation for the increase in marriages or decrease of divorces.

Statisticians calculated that 11 out of every 1,000 men, women and children in the nation got married last year. Only 2 1/2 of each 1,000 found it did not work out.

## How Nations Decay

Lesson for May 13, 1951

"THE mortality rate of nations is 100%." So Dr. T. W. Lingle used to put the fact that no nation yet has lived forever. They all die sooner or later. What kills them? The student of history may delve into such books as Gibbon's "Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire" or Spengler's pessimistic "Decline of the West," or Toynbee's more optimistic six-volume "Study of History."

But when the juice has been squeezed out of these learned and interesting volumes, the Truth's essence turns out to be much the same as what we can find by reading the Old Testament. True, the nations under the Old Testament lens are not big empires like Rome, still less like the British Empire; the kingdom of Israel was only about 100 miles long and 60 miles wide, while the kingdom of Judah was smaller than many an American county.

**Promise**

WHEN Solomon died, the kingdom he had inherited from David had already shrunk. After his death, what was left immediately split into two kingdoms, the one on the south called Judah and the one in the north called Israel.

The nation of Israel, which lasted more than 200 years, began with great promise. Indeed, one of God's prophecies (1 Kings 11) had given to Jeroboam, the first king, the same promise which had been given David, of an enduring kingdom on condition of obedience to God.

Everything seemed to be favorable. Israel had more territory than most of her neighbors had, a far more productive soil, and easy access to transportation.

**Crash**

ISRAEL should have succeeded; but it failed. Only a little more than 200 years afterwards, no very great age as nations go, it crashed completely, never to rise again. When the walls of its "impregnable" capital city of Samaria, after a two-year siege, fell to the battering-rams of the Assyrian army, and over 27,000 leading citizens were deported, that was the end of Israel for good and all.

How did this happen?

The Hebrew historian ties everything into a few words when he says that they wrought wicked things . . . they rejected God's statutes . . . they served idols.

But what were the details? What, in particular, did the nation of Israel do that was wicked?

Reading the prophet Amos will give many of the answers. At the time he preached, by all chamber-of-commerce standards Israel was at the peak of production and prosperity. But he foresaw doom around the corner, and he gave reasons. He called a spade a spade. Reading him, or even reading the bolder accounts in Kings, we can see the collapse was no mystery.

**Other Gods**

ONE thing fundamentally wrong with Israel was idolatry. This was not the simple matter of making carved images; it meant taking some other "god" to be the true God.

We know what the religions of Chemish and Molech and Baal were like; they were thoroughly bad. In the law of the true God, life and purity were regarded as sacred; life and purity under these other gods were held cheap. But one can see from reading Amos that what the people of Israel really worshipped was still another idol to whom no statue was erected; their own pleasures.

Too many citizens didn't care what happened to the country, so long as they could get their liquor. Well, let us not read the Old Testament from mere curiosity. What about our own nation, our own people and times? The United Stewardship Council (now the Joint Department of Stewardship of the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U. S. A.) reports that every year since 1934, excepting 1936, has shown an increase in giving through the churches.

But—the percent of this increase is not so large as the increase of annual income. The increase for contributions through the church of God is less, far less, than the increase in spending for alcoholic liquors, soft drinks, candy, football games, jewelry, and a multitude of other things. We, like Israel, are putting God last!

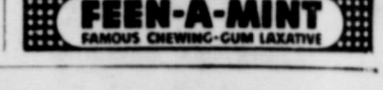

**Liquefied Petroleum Gas Popular Farm Fuel System Gives Farmer Independent Fuel Supply**

# Apathy Toward Possible Atomic Bomb Attack Noted by Officials

(The first of two articles.)

During the last few days in Washington, D. C., officials have been considering the most important problem in the United States—the lives of its citizens.

"An extreme apathy—the 'it can't happen here' attitude—has been the reaction of the public toward the many bulletins we have sent out concerning the possibility of atomic attack on this country," said Dr. Richard Gerstell, consultant to the federal office of civilian defense, and author of the book, "How to Survive an Atom Bomb."

A cross-country check on homeowners revealed that initial steps toward individual household safety

had not been heeded. This "lack of interest" on the part of citizens forced Millard Caldwell, Washington's administrator of the civilian defense program, to call a nationwide emergency conference on the problem of indifference to the need of precaution.

HOME-OWNERS are urged to immediately enforce the following basic steps:

From hardware or notions counters, get hold-down brackets for Venetian blinds. These tiny brackets will hold the blind firmly to the window sill; the blind will serve as the best window covering not only in stopping flying debris, but in deflecting a great part of the initial, scorching heat flash.

Rid your yard, your basement, your house and attic, of any combustible piles of trash, such as old papers or a basement congestion of furniture storage; it's especially important to clear your basement because it will be your best shelter area in the event of attack.

Decide exactly which area of your home will be the most effective shelter against a bombing attack. Make it a permanent decision so that you and your family will automatically gather there if a panic should start.



Venetian blinds are best window covering if bomb should fall. They protect against flying debris and will also deflect a great part of initial, scorching heat flash. Don all heavy clothing possible for all parts of the body; it's added insurance against burns or flying objects.

WHAT EVER, IF ANY, may be his deficiencies in other lines, the American people have credited President Truman with a complete knowledge of partisan politics, of how to make or lose votes for his party and its candidates, whoever such candidates may be, and of the need of votes if his party is to be successful.

Such being the case, it is hard to conceive of the promptings of Harry S. Truman, the partisan politician, taking the action Harry S. Truman, the President, did in the case of Gen. MacArthur. To arbitrarily dismiss from the nation's service a man in whom the people had full confidence, a man of demonstrated ability, at the instigation of such as Dean Acheson, secretary of state, and some others, who do not have the confidence of any considerable number of American voters, a condition of which the President must be aware, is a simply incredible action, and one that will be paid for in a loss of votes, now and for years to come. It will come nearer wrecking the Democratic party than anything that has happened since the days of President Johnson.

The President tells us we are facing a grave emergency, a crisis in our relations with Communist Russia. We may be called upon any day to meet the Red army hordes in both Europe and the far east. In the face of such conditions Harry S. Truman, the president, dismisses from the nation's service one of the great military leaders

of the century, a man whose ability and knowledge of far eastern conditions we will so terribly need.

To the American people it would be unthinkable to dismiss Gen. MacArthur for any reason, but to do so at the instigation of Dean Acheson will politically condemn Harry S. Truman and his party. It may mean the party's defeat at the hands of the voters for years to come. It was Acheson's bad guesses, if they were nothing worse than bad guesses, that are responsible for the conditions we face in the far east, and have been responsible for our more than 60,000 casualties in Korea.

It is not alone we in America who must suffer from that stubborn will that insists that whatever he says or whatever he does must be right. The people of Japan, of Korea and others throughout the Pacific must also suffer a severe loss. For Stalin, it is like winning the final battle.

The cry of "wolf! wolf!" has been heard frequently from the White House or from those backing the President's policies, and his demands for more taxes, for more appropriations, for more power, but has been followed within a few hours by the assurance that we are nearer peace with Russia than at any time since the beginning of the cold war. So often has that wolf cry been repeated, with its assuring follow-up that it has lost all of its effect, both with congress and the people of the nation.

Whether the wolf cry comes from the President or from Speaker Ray-

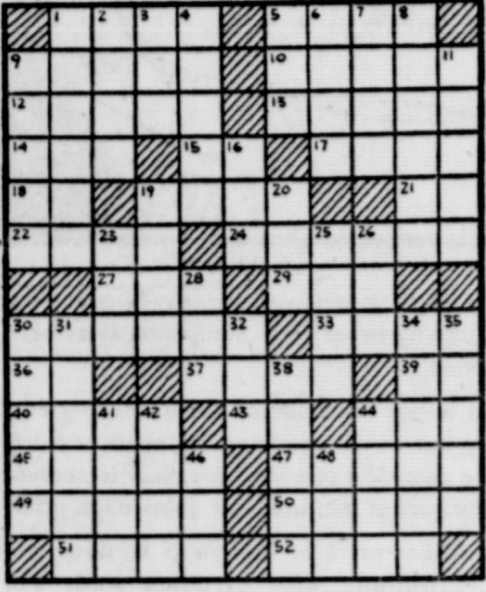

### Great Debate Not Over

IT SEEMS that the "great debate" in congress over foreign policy is not over, it is just getting started.

But what is hard to understand is this — during more than three months of debate, the Republican leadership in congress opposed sending troops to Europe on the theory that to do so would arouse the Russian Bear to the point of war, that it was a calculated risk that should not be taken and that our main line of defense should be the western hemisphere.

And almost over-night this same band of leadership has switched from a western hemisphere defense to demands for an aggressive war on Red China which would take a million American boys and all the planes and ships and guns we could muster to send across the Pacific.

The rhyme or reason in this thinking is certainly not clear, and the only interpretation which can be placed on such a metamorphosis is politics, pure and simple. The Democratic administration was for sending an army to serve under General Eisenhower in continental Europe to implement the Atlantic pact, so politically, the Republican leadership must oppose and they did, but lost. The Democratic administration was opposed to making any aggressive war on Red China, seeking to confine the fighting for Republican leadership to do as to oppose it, so they are opposing, some going even as far as asking for an immediate declaration of war.

What has happened to the proposal of ex-President Hoover, to withdraw behind our two oceans? What General MacArthur thinks about this is not even important insofar as this congress is concerned, for the simple reason that what he says before a joint session or before any congressional committee will not change a vote one way or another. Minds already are made up beforehand. Does any one believe for a minute that anything General MacArthur might say would change the minds of such senators as Taft, Wherry, Jenner, Cain and Kem? Nor do you think they will heed for one instant whatever General Collins, or Admiral Sherman, or General Bradley or General Marshall will say, or what General Vandenberg, or Admiral Nimitz or even General Eisenhower might say on the subject in these committees?

What has happened is unfortunate, particularly for General MacArthur, and it is unfortunate for the country, for it is having the effect of driving deeper and deeper the wedge of disunity into the marrow of the nation, and it is permitting politicians to make a scapegoat of MacArthur, when the General's return should mean only a tribute to his military feats of valor.

### MacArthur Deserved Honors

General MacArthur, setting foot on U.S. soil for the first time in 14 years deserved all the adulation and honors heaped up on him by the American people. A lot of it was overdone, but that is the characteristic American way—do it up brown if you do it at all.

But after all the shouting dies down and the emotional hysteria has worn off—remember the man who withstood most, and who exhibited the most personal courage and just plain guts in this whole affair, was the present occupant of the White House—Harry S. Truman, President of the United States.

### Truman Clears the Way

And it was the President who cleared the way for MacArthur's formal Congressional appearance, and it was the President who canceled his own public appearances so there would be no counter-attraction to the MacArthur's day in court in Washington and permitted government offices, the schools, the whole town to turn out to greet the general on his return after 14 years abroad in the service of his country.

President Truman is now at his lowest ebb of popularity. If you are interested, however, watch his popularity barometer start climbing. His two most recent talks to the American people were more forceful and contained more plain common American horse sense than any in many months.

### Europe Approved

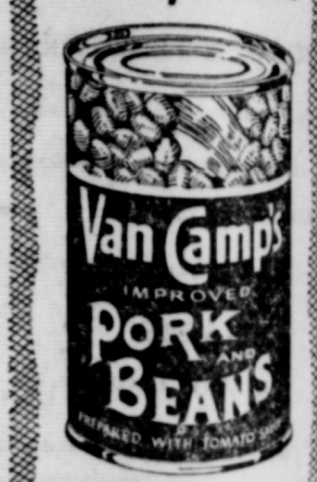
One thing appears to be certain, if the MacArthur position insofar as Asia is concerned is ever maintained or supported by this government, we will wind up behind the international eight-ball without a single ally in Europe or the United Nations with the exception of Gen. Chiang Kai-shek, now holed-up on the small island of Formosa. It is significant that every allied nation without exception approved the removal of MacArthur.

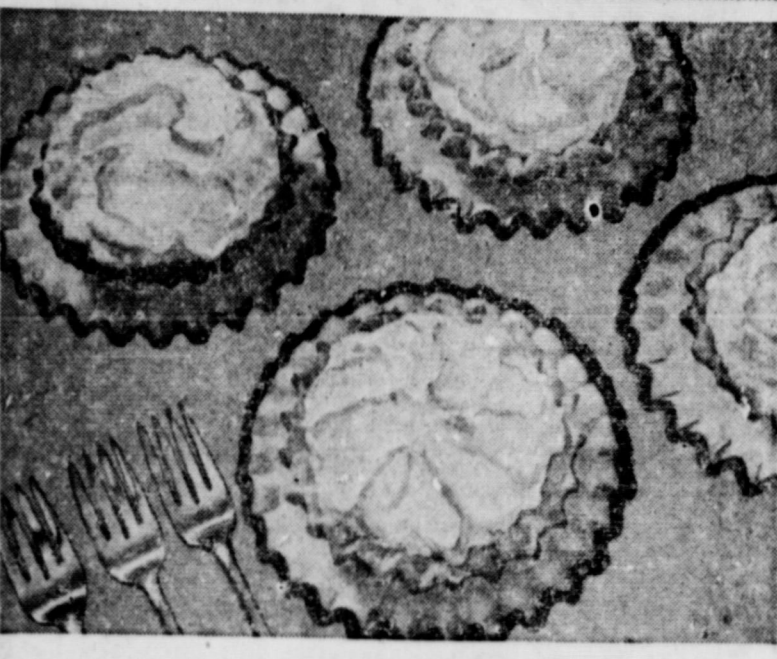

# HOUSEHOLD MEMOS... by Lynn Chambers



Use Easy-Mix Recipe for Perfect Pastry (See Recipes Below)

## Perfect Pastries

YOU MAY HAVE to be a magician to pull rabbits out of a hat, but amateurs and experienced cooks can make perfect pastry if they have the right directions!

There was a time when you had to have that certain touch to make light, fluffy, tender, melt-in-your-mouth pie crust, but all the guesswork has been taken out of pie making with recent developments. The only requirements needed are exact measurements and the ability to read directions. All fuss, muss and extra utensils are eliminated.

New type pastry is made with liquid shortening and an ordinary kitchen fork. The pastry is rolled between two pieces of waxed paper, thus eliminating the need for extra flour which in the past has often toughened perfectly good pastry.

## Easy-Mix Pastry (Makes 2 8 or 9-inch crusts)

- 2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup salad oil
- 1/4 cup plus 1 tablespoon ice water

Sift together flour and salt. Combine in a measuring cup, the salad oil and ice water. Beat with a fork until thick and creamy. To avoid separation, immediately pour (all at once) over entire surface of the flour mixture. Toss and mix with fork. The dough will be moist. Form into a ball with the fork.

Divide dough in half. Before rolling, shape each half with the hands into a flat round, making top and edges smooth. Roll dough between two squares of waxed paper. Remove top sheet, invert dough over pan; peel off paper. Fit pastry into pan. Roll out top crust. Cut gashes for escape of steam. Fill pastry-lined pan with desired filling. Place top crust over filling, and trim 1/2-inch beyond the rim of the pan. Seal edge by folding top under bottom crust. Flute edge. Bake at temperature required for filling used.

## PIE FOR LUNCHEON can be an easy matter with this new type crust because it's so simple to make, so successful, always.

Why not try this pie, plain, or with the addition of weiners or fish if you like it meaty?

## Provençal Potato Pie (Serves 6)

- 6 medium potatoes
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 1 teaspoon chopped parsley
- 1 recipe easy-mix pastry
- 2 tablespoons butter
- Few grains pepper
- 1 cup light cream or top milk

Peel potatoes; cut in very thin slices and place in bowl. Add salt, onion and chopped parsley and clear while preparing pastry. Line an oblong baking dish (10x6x2 inches) using 1/2 of the pastry rolled 1/4 inch thick. Drain onion-potato mixture. Fill pastry-lined dish. Dot with

pepper. Roll out remaining pastry for top crust. Cover potatoes. Seal and flute edges. Make several slits in top to permit escape of steam. Bake in a moderate (350°F.) oven about 1 1/4 hours or until potatoes are tender. Remove from oven. Turn off oven. Slowly pour cream over potatoes through slits. Return pie to oven for 10 minutes longer. Potatoes will absorb most of the cream. If desired, pie may be prepared several hours in advance and held in refrigerator until ready to bake. Serve with meat, cut into squares or wedges.

VARIATION: Follow above recipe. Add 4 (1/2 pound) frankfurters, or 1 1/2 cups (one 7-ounce can) drained, flaked salmon or tuna fish, to drained potato mixture.

## Cheese Straws (Makes 40 straws)

- 1/2 recipe easy-mix pastry
- 1/2 cup grated American cheese (sharp cheddar or processed)

Prepare easy-mix pastry as directed. Roll out dough in rectangle, 1/2-inch thick. Sprinkle with one-half of the grated cheese; fold and sprinkle with remaining cheese and fold again. Roll to desired thickness. Lift dough and place on cookie sheet. Cut in strips 5 inches long, 1/4 inch wide. Twist, if desired. Bake in a hot (425°F.) oven 8 to 10 minutes or until light brown. Serve as a soup or salad accompaniment.

## \*Coconut Cream Pie

- 1/2 cup cornstarch
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups milk, scalded
- 2 slightly beaten egg yolks
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup moist, shredded coconut
- 1 9-inch baked pastry shell

Mix cornstarch, sugar and salt. Gradually add milk. Cook in double boiler until thick, about 10 minutes, stirring constantly. Slowly add small amount of hot mixture to egg yolks; stir into remaining hot mixture. Cook 5 minutes. Cool. Add butter and vanilla. Stir in coconut. Pour into cooled pie shell and spread with meringue:

- Combine 2 egg whites, unbeaten, with 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt and 2 tablespoons water.

Beat with rotary egg beater until thoroughly blended. Cook 1 minute over boiling water, beating constantly. Remove from hot water; beat 2 minutes longer or until mixture stands in peaks. Pile lightly on pie and sprinkle lightly with toasted coconut. To toast coconut, spread on cookie sheet and brown lightly in a hot (400°) oven. Watch it carefully as it should brown only until golden.

Baked Bean Rarebit? Yes, it's a hearty supper dish made by melting sharp American cheese, grated, and then mixing in canned baked beans and pork. Serve on toast.  
Any green vegetable will be the better if served with Maitre d'hotel butter which is made with sweet butter, lemon juice and minced parsley. Serve very hot.

# Apathy Toward Possible Atomic Bomb Attack Noted by Officials

(The first of two articles.)

During the last few days in Washington, D. C., officials have been considering the most important problem in the United States—the lives of its citizens.

"An extreme apathy—the 'it can't happen here' attitude—has been the reaction of the public toward the many bulletins we have sent out concerning the possibility of atomic attack on this country," said Dr. Richard Gerstell, consultant to the federal office of civilian defense, and author of the book, "How to Survive an Atom Bomb."

A cross-country check on homeowners revealed that initial steps toward individual household safety

had not been heeded. This "lack of interest" on the part of citizens forced Millard Caldwell, Washington's administrator of the civilian defense program, to call a nationwide emergency conference on the problem of indifference to the need of precaution.

**HOME-OWNERS** are urged to immediately enforce the following basic steps:

From hardware or notions counters, get hold-down brackets for Venetian blinds. These tiny brackets will hold the blind firmly to the window sill; the blind will serve as the best window covering not only in stopping flying debris, but in deflecting a great part of the initial, scorching heat flash.

Rid your yard, your basement, your house and attic, of any combustible piles of trash, such as old papers or a basement congestion of furniture storage; it's especially important to clear your basement because it will be your best shelter area in the event of attack.

Decide exactly which area of your home will be the most effective shelter against a bombing attack. Make it a permanent decision so that you and your family will automatically gather there if a panic should start.

## Dismissal of Mac Showed Disregard of Politics

**WHAT EVER, IF ANY,** may be his deficiencies in other lines, the American people have credited President Truman with a complete knowledge of partisan politics, of how to make or lose votes for his party and its candidates, whoever such candidates may be, and of the need of votes if his party is to be successful.

Such being the case, it is hard to conceive of the promptings of Harry S. Truman, the partisan politician, taking the action Harry S. Truman, the President, did in the case of Gen. MacArthur. To arbitrarily dismiss from the nation's service a man in whom the people had full confidence, a man of demonstrated ability, at the instigation of such as Dean Acheson, secretary of state, and some others, who do not have the confidence of any considerable number of American voters, a condition of which the President must be aware, is a simply incredible action, and one that will be paid for in a loss of votes, now and for years to come. It will come nearer wrecking the Democratic party than anything that has happened since the days of President Johnson.

The President tells us we are facing a grave emergency, a crisis in our relations with Communist Russia. We may be called upon any day to meet the Red army hordes in both Europe and the far east. In the face of such conditions Harry S. Truman, the president, dismisses from the nation's service one of the great military leaders

of the century, a man whose ability and knowledge of far eastern conditions we will so terribly need. To the American people it would be unthinkable to dismiss Gen. MacArthur for any reason, but to do so at the instigation of Dean Acheson will politically condemn Harry S. Truman and his party. It may mean the party's defeat at the hands of the voters for years to come. It was Acheson's bad guesses, if they were nothing worse than bad guesses, that are responsible for the conditions we face in the far east, and have been responsible for our more than 60,000 casualties in Korea.

It is not alone we in America who must suffer from that stubborn will that insists that whatever he says or whatever he does must be right. The people of Japan, of Korea and others throughout the Pacific must also suffer a severe loss. For Stalin, it is like winning the final battle.

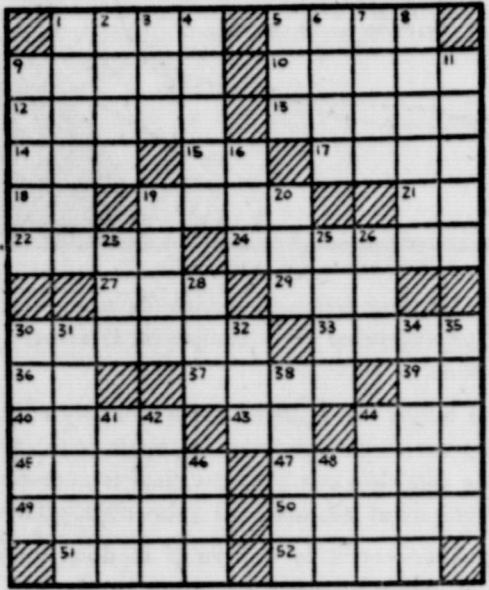

So often has that wolf cry been repeated, with its assuring follow-up that it has lost all of its effect, both with congress and the people of the nation.

### Great Debate Not Over

**IT SEEMS** that the "great debate" in congress over foreign policy is not over, it is just getting started.

But what is hard to understand is this — during more than three months of debate, the Republican leadership in congress opposed sending troops to Europe on the theory that to do so would arouse the Russian Bear to the point of war, that it was a calculated risk that should not be taken and that our main line of defense should be the western hemisphere.

And almost over-night this same band of leadership has switched from a western hemisphere defense to demands for an aggressive war on Red China which would take a million American boys and all the planes and ships and guns we could muster to send across the Pacific.

The rhyme or reason in this thinking is certainly not clear, and the only interpretation that can be placed on such a metamorphosis is politics, pure and simple. The Democratic administration was for sending an army to serve under General Eisenhower in continental Europe to implement the Atlantic pact, so politically, the Republican leadership must oppose and they did, but lost. The Democratic administration was opposed to making any aggressive war on Red China, seeking to confine the fighting in Korea, so the political thing for Republican leadership to do was to oppose it, so they are opposing, some going even as far as asking for an immediate declaration of war.

What has happened to the proposal of ex-President Hoover, to withdraw behind our two oceans? What General MacArthur thinks about this is not even important insofar as this congress is concerned, for the simple reason that what he says before a joint session or before any congressional committee will not change a vote one way or another. Minds already are made up beforehand. Does any one believe for a minute that anything General MacArthur might say would change the minds of such senators as Taft, Wherry, Jenner, Cain and Kem? Nor do you think they will heed for one instant whatever General Collins, or Admiral Sherman, or General Bradley or General Marshall will say, or what General Vandenberg, or Admiral Nimitz or even General Eisenhower might say on the subject in these committees?

What has happened is unfortunate, particularly for General MacArthur, and it is unfortunate for the country, for it is having the effect of driving deeper and deeper the wedge of disunity into the marrow of the nation, and it is permitting politicians to make a scapegoat of MacArthur, when the General's return should mean only a tribute to his military feats of valor.

### MacArthur Deserved Honors

General MacArthur, setting foot on U.S. soil for the first time in 14 years deserved all the adulation and honors heaped up on him by the American people. A lot of it was overdone, but that is the characteristic American way—do it up brown if you do it at all.

But after all the shouting dies down and the emotional hysteria has worn off—remember the man who withstood most, and who exhibited the most personal courage and just plain guts in this whole affair, was the present occupant of the White House—Harry S. Truman, President of the United States.

### Truman Clears the Way

And it was the President who cleared the way for MacArthur's formal Congressional appearance, and it was the President who canceled his own public appearances so there would be no counter-attraction to the MacArthur's day in court in Washington and permitted government offices, the schools, the whole town to turn out to greet the general on his return after 14 years abroad in the service of his country.

President Truman is now at his lowest ebb of popularity. If you are interested, however, watch his popularity barometer start climbing. His two most recent talks to the American people were more forceful and contained more plain common American horse sense than any in many months.

### Europe Approved

One thing appears to be certain, if the MacArthur position insofar as Asia is concerned is ever maintained or supported by this government, we will wind up behind the international eight-ball without a single ally in Europe or the United Nations with the exception of Gen. Chiang Kai-shek, now holed-up on the small island of Formosa. It is significant that every allied nation without exception approved the removal of MacArthur.

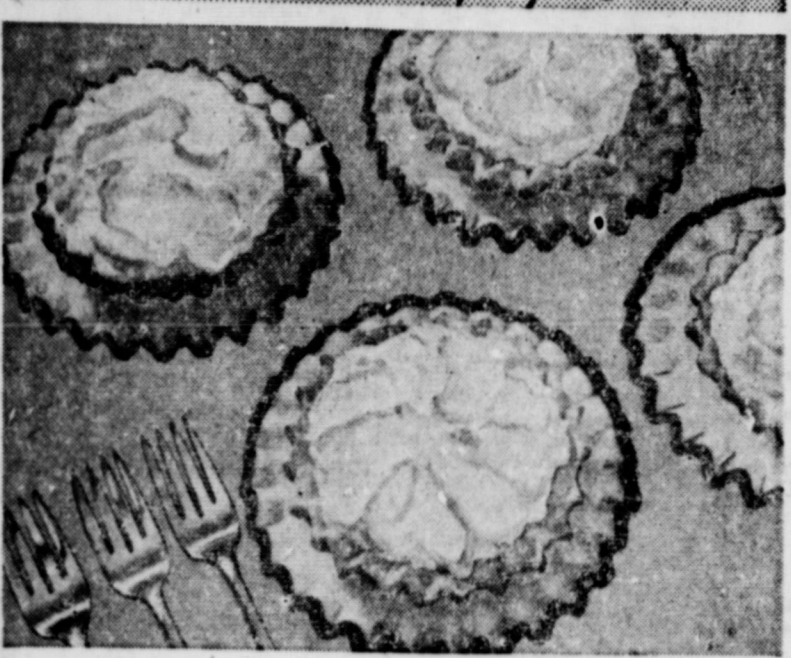

Use Easy-Mix Recipe for Perfect Pastry (See Recipes Below)

## Perfect Pastries

YOU MAY HAVE to be a magician to pull rabbits out of a hat, but amateurs and experienced cooks can make perfect pastry if they have the right directions!

There was a time when you had to have that certain touch to make light, fluffy, tender, melt-in-your-mouth pie crust, but all the guesswork has been taken out of pie making with recent developments. The only requirements needed are exact measurements and the ability to read directions. All fuss, muss and extra utensils are eliminated.

New type pastry is made with liquid shortening and an ordinary kitchen fork. The pastry is rolled between two pieces of waxed paper, thus eliminating the need for extra flour which in the past has often toughened perfectly good pastry.

## Easy-Mix Pastry

(Makes 2 8 or 9-inch crusts)  
2 cups sifted all-purpose flour  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup salad oil  
1/4 cup plus 1 tablespoon ice water

Sift together flour and salt. Combine in a measuring cup, the salad oil and ice water. Beat with a fork until thick and creamy. To avoid separation, immediately pour (all at once) over entire surface of the flour mixture. Toss and mix with fork. The dough will be moist. Form into a ball with the fork.

Divide dough in half. Before rolling, shape each half with the hands into a flat round, making top and edges smooth. Roll dough between two squares of waxed paper. Remove top sheet, invert dough over pan; peel off paper. Fit pastry into pan. Roll out top crust. Cut gashes for escape of steam. Fill pastry-lined pan with desired filling. Place top crust over filling, and trim 1/2-inch beyond the rim of the pan. Seal edge by folding top under bottom crust. Flute edge. Bake at temperature required for filling used.

## Provençal Potato Pie

(Serves 6)  
6 medium potatoes  
1 1/2 teaspoons salt  
1 large onion, chopped  
1 teaspoon chopped parsley  
1 recipe easy-mix pastry  
2 tablespoons butter  
Few grains pepper  
1 cup light cream or top milk

Peel potatoes; cut in very thin slices and place in bowl. Add salt, onion and chopped parsley and mix all together. Cover and let stand while preparing pastry. Line an oblong baking dish (10x6x2 inches) using 1/2 of the pastry rolled 1/4 inch thick. Drain onion-potato mixture. Fill pastry-lined dish. Dot with

pepper. Roll out remaining pastry for top crust. Cover potatoes. Seal and flute edges. Make several slits in top to permit escape of steam. Bake in a moderate (350°F.) oven about 1 1/4 hours or until potatoes are tender. Remove from oven. Turn off oven. Slowly pour cream over potatoes through slits. Return pie to oven for 10 minutes longer. Potatoes will absorb most of the cream. If desired, pie may be prepared several hours in advance and held in refrigerator until ready to bake. Serve with meat, cut into squares or wedges.

**VARIATION:** Follow above recipe. Add 4 (1/2 pound) frankfurters, or 1 1/4 cups (one 7-ounce can) drained, flaked salmon or tuna fish, to drained potato mixture.

## Cheese Straws

(Makes 40 straws)  
1/2 recipe easy-mix pastry  
1/2 cup grated American cheese  
1/2 cup plus 1 tablespoon processed

Prepare easy-mix pastry as directed. Roll out dough in rectangle, 1/4-inch thick. Sprinkle with one-half of the grated cheese; fold and sprinkle with remaining cheese and fold again. Roll to desired thickness. Lift dough and place on cookie sheet. Cut in strips 5 inches long, 1/4 inch wide. Twist, if desired. Bake in a hot (425°F.) oven 8 to 10 minutes or until light brown. Serve as a soup or salad accompaniment.

## \*Coconut Cream Pie

1/4 cup cornstarch  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
2 cups milk, scalded  
3 slightly beaten egg yolks  
2 tablespoons butter  
1/2 teaspoon vanilla  
1 cup moist, shredded coconut  
1 9-inch baked pastry shell

Mix cornstarch, sugar and salt. Gradually add milk. Cook in double boiler until thick, about 10 minutes, stirring constantly. Slowly add small amount of hot mixture to egg yolks; stir into remaining hot mixture. Cook 5 minutes. Cool. Add butter and vanilla. Stir in coconut. Pour into cooled pie shell and spread with meringue: Combine 2 egg whites, unbeaten, with 1/2 cup sugar, 1/4 teaspoon salt and 2 tablespoons water. Beat with rotary egg beater until thoroughly blended. Cook 1 minute over boiling water, beating constantly. Remove from hot water; beat 2 minutes longer or until mixture stands in peaks. Pile lightly on pie and sprinkle lightly with toasted coconut. To toast coconut, spread on cookie sheet and brown lightly in a hot (400°F.) oven. Watch it carefully as it should brown only until golden.

## Baked Bean Rarebit?

Yes, it's a hearty supper dish made by melting sharp American cheese, grated, and then mixing in canned baked beans and pork. Serve on toast.

Any green vegetable will be the better if served with Maitre d'hotel butter which is made with sweet butter, lemon juice and minced parsley. Serve very hot.

For a good vegetable plus protein luncheon you'll like a spinach ring in the center of which are served creamed eggs and mushrooms. It's pretty enough for guests, too!
