

Rites Read Sunday For
B. M. Haymes



A pioneer civic leader, business man and farmer, Branch Mac Haymes, 74, died Saturday at 7 a. m. in the Lubbock Methodist hospital after an illness of about three weeks. Funeral services were Sunday at 4:30 p. m. in the First Methodist Church here with the Rev. Howard Marcom, pastor, officiating. Burial followed in the O'Donnell Cemetery. Mr. Haymes was born May 6, 1855 in Springfield, Mo. and had lived here since 1925. He had been a member of the Methodist Church since early youth and was a member of the Masonic Lodge. He lived for a number of years in Munday. Survivors include his wife, Vera, a daughter, Mrs. Cecil Royce of Saratoga, a son, Bill Schooler of here, four sisters, Mrs. Florence Wyatt of San Angelo, Mrs. Otis Hardin of Salem, Ore., Mrs. Blanche Calhoun of Amarillo, and Mrs. Carroll Hopkins of Artesia, N. M., two brothers, Dr. J. P. Haymes of Lubbock and Lee Haymes of Munday and four grandchildren. Pallbearers were Naymon Everett, E. R. Moore, Cleo Pierce, J. T. Forbes, S. M. Clayton, Jr. and Harold Payne.

In a real sense, Mr. Haymes was "Mr. O'Donnell." During his nearly 35 years residence here, he either led or supported every worthwhile community project that made our town the Christian community that it is today. He was mayor for several terms in the early days. He was a school trustee for many years and a county trustee at time of his passing. He was a member of official board of local Methodist Church for many years and was a past Worshipful Master of Masonic Lodge. He was in the insurance business here for many years and later the real estate and oil business. He owned extensive real estate holdings. For many years he was president chairman of Democratic Party. A handsome, kind, gentlemanly man, so many spoke of him as "Mac." He was in good health in spite of a former heart attack. Few men have done more for our little town, yet few men know all he has done.

Road Bond Election Set

Citizens of Lynn County have petitioned for a road bond election called for Oct. 17th to vote \$190,000 in road bonds. The money is to be used to pay one half the cost of right of way for the four lane Highway 87 running north of Tahoka to Lubbock County Line. The State will pay the other one half. If the issue carries, contract is expected to be let by late spring of next year.

This seems money well spent. The four lane Highway 87 now runs from Tahoka south to Lamesa. Since completion there has been NO serious mishaps on this beautiful 30 miles of road. Who can place the value on even one life saved. And a modern highway is such a pleasure to use. Local civic clubs will study the proposal in detail.

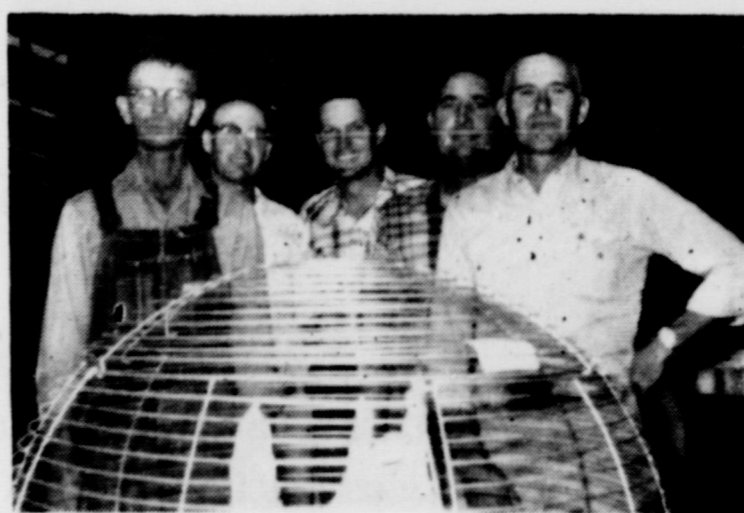
Safety Is Important

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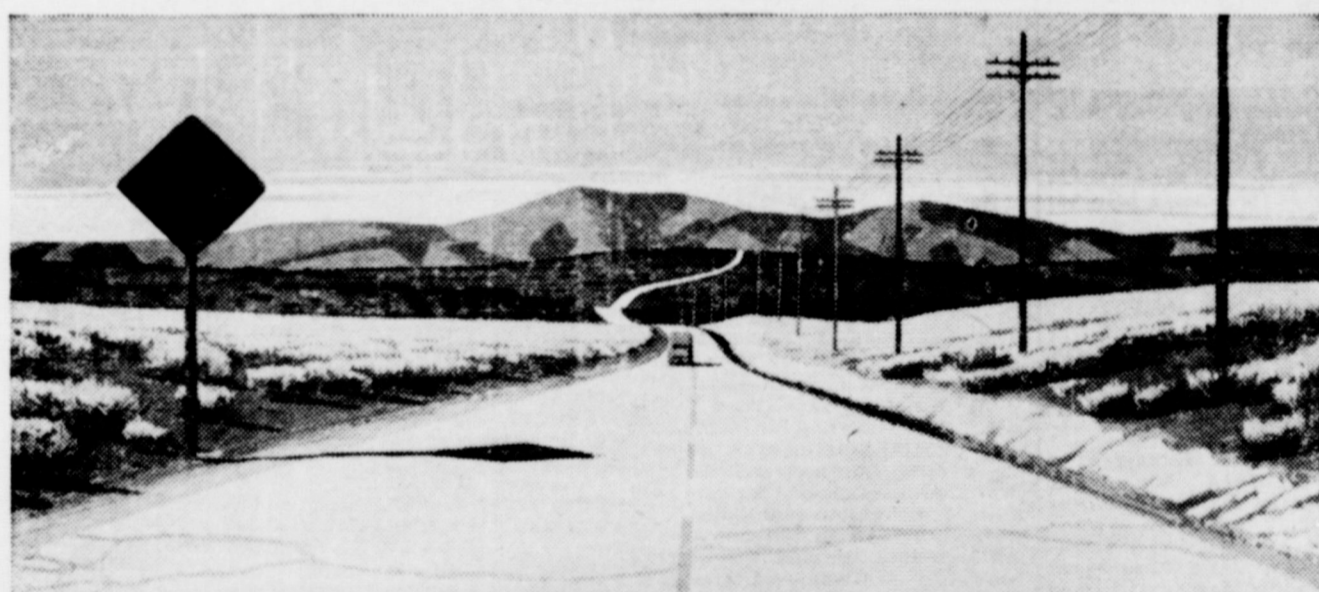

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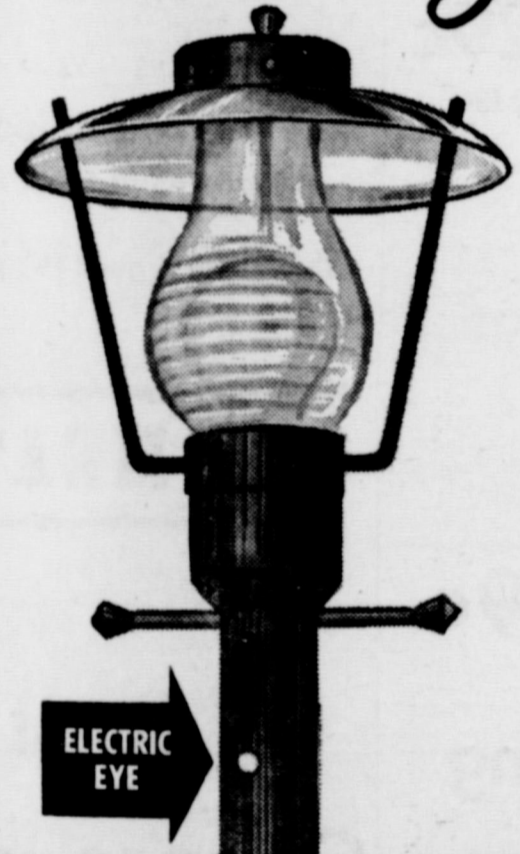

"It is a little easier now to qualify for disability benefits under social security", John G. Hutton, Manager of the Lubbock social security office, said recently.

As a result of changes made by Congress in 1958, the work requirements were liberalized so that some people who were previously turned down may now be eligible. The manager emphasized, however, that there was no change in the requirement that the disability must be very severe and of indefinite duration.

Before the 1958 change in the law, the amount of work needed to qualify under the social security disability provisions was at least 5 years out of the 10 years before becoming disabled and not less than 1 1/2 years of work being in the 3 preceding the disability. This last requirement (1 1/2 years work in 3 years) was repealed.

Hutton explained that people who gradually became disabled found it hard to meet the requirement of 1 1/2 years of work in the 3 years before disability, and their applications had to be denied. They may now reapply under the recent change in the law. Those who are 50 years of age or over should reapply promptly to avoid losing any back payments due them.

"Anyone whose application was denied because the disability was found not severe enough", Hutton added, "is not helped by this change in the law and a new application would serve no purpose."

In planning for child safety, a child is fortunate if he has attended a well-conducted nursery or kindergarten before school. Here the youngster learns very early to play safely and happily with other children, and he begins to learn the rules of safety.

If he walks to nursery school with his mother, or even if he goes to school in a bus or the family car, the rules of safety can still be taught.

The wise parent finds what safety rules the school is teaching and then sees to it that the same rules apply at home.

He makes doubly sure that nothing he says or does runs counter to what is being taught in school, because such conflict only confuse and undermines the child's confidence in both his teachers and parents.
