
-000-Washington - Rep. George Mahon reports that the recently announced drop in support loans for feed grains has been a shock to the members of Congress from grain

The House Committee on Agricul ture is making a study of the sit-uation in preparation for a Committee hearing which will be held on March 13th. The support loan level announced for milo for the 1959

announced for milo for the 1959 crop is 31 cents per hundred below the level for last year. The national average support for milo last year was \$1.83 per hundred. The announ ced national average support for this year is \$1.52 per hundred. On Feb. 18th the Secretary of Agriculture announced support loan levels for corn, milo, and other feed grains. In view of the language of the law, it was anticipated that the support price for milo in 1959 would be approximately the same as corn, inasmuch as both have apas corn, inasmuch as both have ap-proximately the same feed value. This is not the case and an explanation is being demanded and ways are being sought to remedy the situation.

Mahon said, "Since the drastic drop in support levels for milo was announced, I have appealed to the Secretary of Agriculture and others in the Department to reconsider the action taken. I have received complaints in regard to the situation from Frank Moore of Plainview, President of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association, and many others. If the drastic cut in sup-ports remains in effect, grain sorports remains in effect, grain sor-ghum producers will sustain losses totaling many millions of dollars. A more effective program for all feed grains is needed but action is made most difficult by reason of the well known attitude of the Secre-tary of Agriculture."
