## First Local Fair To Open Next Week

The first O'Donnell Community Fair will be held here next week end Sept. 3, 4, and 5th at the show barn in the south part of town. Everyone in this trade area is urged to take part. A number of years past a fair was held here every fall. Following are the different divisions according to Harold Hohn and James Reed —

### School Traffic Rules —

Perhaps many people have not thought of the possibility of the great danger our school children are placed in around the school buildings. A child may be in the street most any time during the day. The 15 MPH speed limit around the school buildings is for the protection of our children and our neighbors children.

We are all prone to think that accidents will not happen while we are driving. Accidents happen to the best of drivers. A child may dart out into the street from behind a parked car. A driver may dodge another car or a person and hit a child. He may side-swipe another car, hit the curb, or any number of things could happen. So many of us think that we can stop in time. According to proven tests by the State Department of Public Safety, a car with good brakes going 30 MPH will travel 80 ft. after the driver decides to stop. The car will travel 100 ft. if the brakes are just normal. If the car is going 40 MPH it will travel 128 ft. after the driver decides to stop. The car will travel 164 ft. if the brakes are just normal. From these facts we see that one may not always be able to stop in time.

There has been a great deal of careless, and unsafe driving around the school. We have been more fortunate than some schools in that we have not had a serious accident. We want to do every thing possible to prevent an accident. May we have your cooperation to help protect the health and safety of the school children. Will you please drive carefully and safely, and see that all members of your family do the same.

In the past some students have been driving careless and unsafe. This consisted of speeding, quick starting and stopping, spinning wheels, skidding tires, etc. The school administration has repeatedly asked the cooperation of the students. In most cases they have been rather cooperative, but some of the unsafe driving continued to exist.

For the safety and protection of the school children, the school board felt it wise to adopt the following policies pertaining to the use of cars at school by students. Your cooperation will be greatly appreciated.

### USE OF CARS AT SCHOOL BY STUDENTS:

1. Cars are to be parked upon arrival at school and left there until leaving school in the afternoon.
2. Students are not to enter any car during the school day without permission.
3. A student who has been given permission to move his car shall not permit another student to enter his car without the expressed permission of the principal.
4. Any student needing to leave school during the school day must clear through the principal's office.
5. If absolute necessary to leave the school ground at noon parents may make arrangements with the principal for their son or daughter to leave, parents are to appear in person.
6. In an emergency teachers may grant permission, then report the incident to the principal.
7. If a student is reprimanded a second time for driving unsafe at school or violating regulations pertaining to cars his parents will be contacted concerning his or her bringing a car to school.

### Few Insects Reported

The cotton insects situation has changed little from that of a week ago in most localities. Occasional plantings have developed sufficient infestations to require control but low infestations were reported in a majority of fields.

Aphids were present in most fields. While infestations were not sufficient to warrant control in most cases, scattered fields were treated to control heavy populations.

Fleahoppers were reported in heavy infestations in some fields in Hockley and Lynn counties. Some young cotton was reported damaged by the insects in Lynn County. Light to medium infestations were reported elsewhere.

Bollworm infestations were reported light in a majority of fields. Scattered fields were treated for control of the worms in a number of counties, with medium to heavy infestations reported in some fields in Hockley and Terry Counties.

Cabbage loopers caused ragging in parts of scattered plantings of cotton. Increased hatching was reported in some localities, with larger egg populations than observed a week ago.

Leafworms were reported in Hockley, Lubbock, Lynn and Terry counties. Only occasional worms were observed in all these counties.

**Boats Need Tags**

State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer said recently that registration of boats would go into effect in October. The new boating act requiring registration was recently passed by the Legislature.

Greer assured boat owners that no penalties or convictions will be involved for this delayed registration date, particularly in view of the fact that the final boat-registration date is March 1, 1960. Other features of the act go into effect immediately.

Greer explained that boat registration was a little foreign to the ordinary function of the Texas Highway Department, but that the Department was already well experienced in handling this type of operation.

"We have been registering motor vehicles for more than forty years. Nearly four and a half million motor vehicles were registered by the Department this year. The Texas Legislature, cognizant of the experience of the Highway Department, gave us the job in order to take advantage of existing operations and to cut cost. The Texas Highway Department deals solely with registration in this boat bill, we have nothing to do with the safety aspect," Greer said.

The appropriation bill passed recently provides funds after Sept. 30. These funds enable the Texas Highway Department to print the necessary forms and place into operation the procedures invested in the Highway Department by the act.

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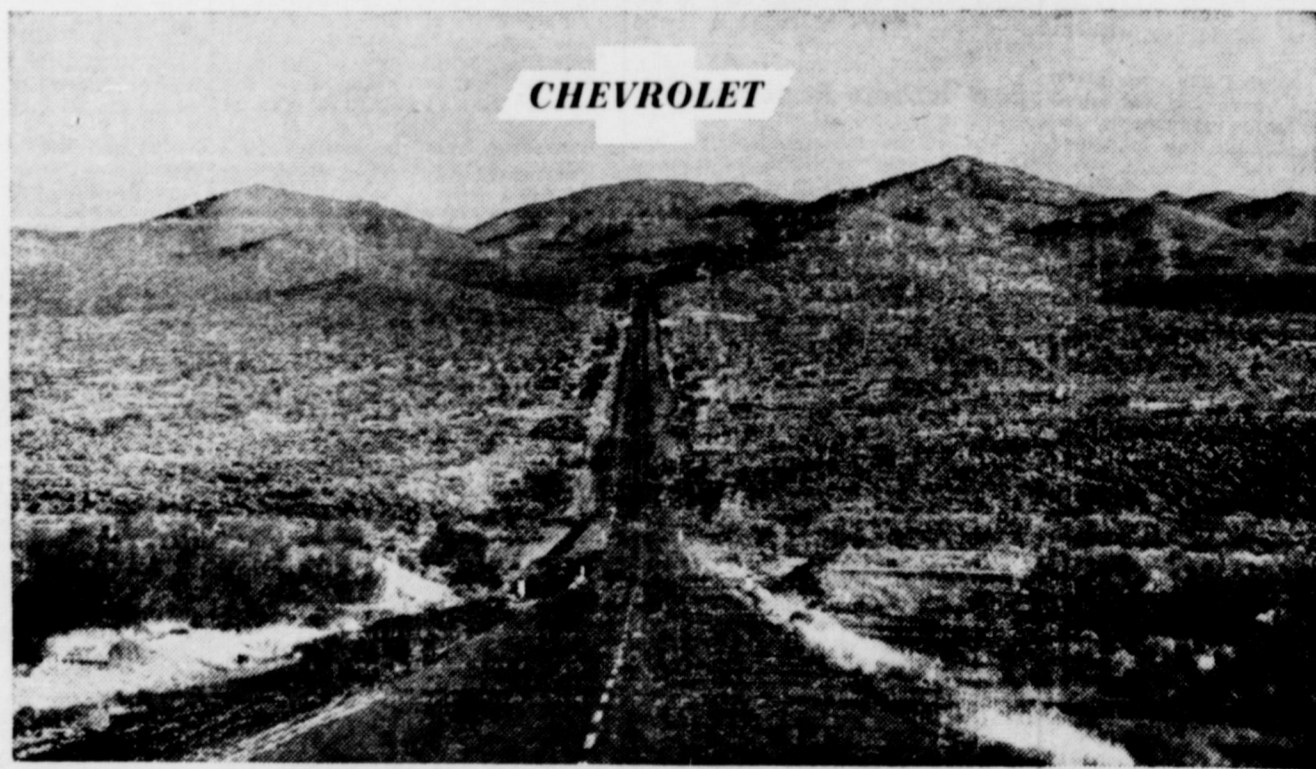

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**KNOW YOUR LAW**

Sometimes you see newspaper stories telling how various courts have issued "injunctions" to protect the owner of a patent from infringement, to stop someone from putting up a building which would be a hazard to the neighbors, or to prevent some other type of activity which might harm one or more persons. Occasionally you read where a "writ of mandamus" has been directed against some public official. This column will briefly explain both of these extraordinary legal remedies.

The injunction got its name because in the old days the English King commanded (enjoined) special action when an ordinary court action could not solve a problem at hand. Today it is an order requiring a person (or corporation) to refrain from doing a particular act.

As a rule, one would first get a "Temporary Restraining Order" which would stop someone from doing something harmful - like polluting a stream or annoying the peace of your home. By granting it the judge preserves the status quo until a hearing has been held to rear both sides of the controversy. Usually, if you want an injunction, your lawyer will take sworn statements into court to show that your grievance is one which could be taken care of only by an injunction.

Often you must put up a bond to make up or any damage you do the other side if the court doesn't see things your way. After you've made your request, the court arranges to hear the other side. They must "show cause" why the injunction should not be issued. Because most injunctions deal with immediate problems, the court hears the merits of such a case in a very short time.

After the temporary injunction is issued, a "permanent" injunction may be obtained or either party may start a lawsuit to settle the problem which the temporary injunction has cleared up for the moment.

If the court grants an injunction, it must be served on the defendant to be effective. Then if he disobeys the order, he is disobeying the court and is subject to a fine or a jail term for "contempt of court".

"Mandamus" is a special remedy used to right wrongs or enforce proper action by a public officer. When we elect public officers to

work for us, we place a great deal of authority in their hands. Sometimes they fail to do their lawful duty. One way to make a government official do his job is to ask the court for a writ of mandamus.

Suppose you have applied for a permit to build a house under a city building code. You submit your plans which meet all the requirements of the code but the proper official won't give you the permit and you can't get one elsewhere. You can then ask the court for a writ of mandamus and if you were right and the building official had no grounds for refusal, the court will order him to issue the permit.

Before the court will issue such a strong command as this, the officer must have refused to do his clear cut legal duty -- not something that he may or may not have to do as part of his job.

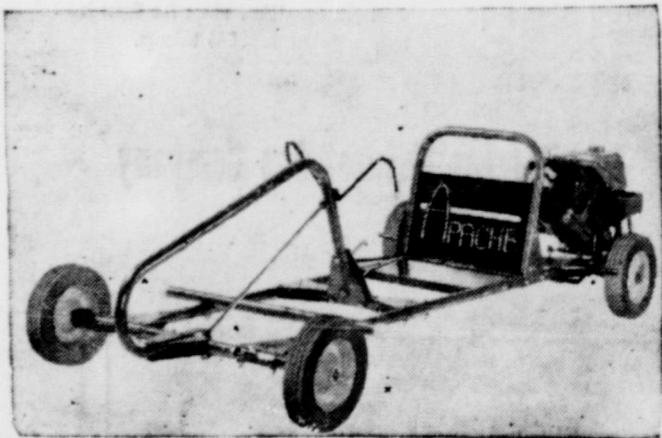
