Coghland Lectures on Cooperative Marketing

Only ten people were present at the meeting to hear the lecture of J. D. Coghland of Ennis, on cooperative cotton marketing last Friday night. On account of being called from the state, Mr. Coghland lectured in the place of C. D. Moser.

Mr. Coghland stated that the average price received by members of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association throughout the state the past year was approximately \$10 a bale above street price. On this basis, had all the cotton of this county been marketed through the association last year, he said the amazing sum of \$382,000 additional purchasing power would have been had in the county.

All the farmers present signed up for the association to handle their cotton this year.

Mr. Coghland is a very forceful speaker and every farmer in the county should have been present to hear him.

Light Rains In O'Donnell Territory

While rain was reported from all the country north of Tahoka to Lubbock, Lynn county's share was meagre Tuesday, following a decided drop in temperature. The heaviest rain was reported in the Pride community where as much as two inches fell in the afternoon, Newmoore getting only a light shower.

A light shower fell in O'Donnell Wednesday morning at about 2 o'clock and served to put new life in vegetation for a time.

Some good old sky-juice was again sprinkled over the O'Donnell country Wednesday night, although light, but cooled the atmosphere and put new life in the crops. Newmoore, Wells and T Bar to the west and northwest had good showers, some falling to the north and east. As we go to press Thursday afternoon, prospects are good for more rain.

The farmers report that cotton is holding up remarkably well and growing right along, but feed is needing rain.

Isaak Walton Club Organized

At a meeting held at the First State Bank Saturday morning with Ben T. Brown presiding, Deputy State Game Commissioner Edgar T. Neal and Mrs. Neal were present to outline the purpose and program of the Isaak Walton League of America. After those present had been made acquainted with purposes of the league, an organization was effected with seventeen members. The following officers were elected:

F. C. Hart, president; A. C. Fairley, vice-president; C. A. Baldwin, secretary, B. J. Boyd, treasurer.

R. H. Ames of Amarrilla, who is one of the four vice-presidents of the Texas division of the Isaak Walton league, and also president of Amarillo Chapter No. 1, is supervisor for the Plains district, which is now being organized solidly for better game protection. A chapter was organized Friday at Tahoka with fifteen members.

The Isaak Walton club is in perfect accord with the purposes of the State Game Commissioner and it is thought that the organization of these clubs will be a big factor in the protection and propagation of game and fish. The league stands for the creation of game refuges and breeding grounds and for the establishment of fish hatcheries and the restoration of and conservation of the outdoors of America.

O'Donnell chapter has applied for a charter and asked the State Game Warden to appoint a game warden to look after this district. Following were enrolled at the meeting, but it is hoped to increase the membership.

Boy Scouts To Camp At Ruidoso Springs, N. M.

O'Donnell has just now the opportunity to do a great amount of good for its boys, and if that action is taken, the good will be returned to the town in much greater measure than was given.

One of the greatest things a boy can have is the privilege of attending a Boy Scout Camp; which, with its well planned and carefully supervised program for all parts of every day during the camp, gives to that boy who attends the very best type of outdoor life—something that city lots, artificial parks, back alleys, and such cannot do.

The South Plains Area Summer Camp for its Scouts will be held at Ruidoso Springs, N. M., August 11-21st. It is to be a real Scout camp in the true sense of the word, and it will satisfy that appeal of the outdoor life in such a way that it will at the same time serve in the all round development of the boy's character and physical welfare.

O'Donnell has at present one troop of Boy Scouts, representing the best in the town. Ben T. Brown is Scoutmaster in charge of this troop, and both he and the troop merit the fullest support of the whole town. The Scout movement is without a doubt one of the greatest things a town can have for furthering the physical, mental, and moral character building of its boys, and the Scout camp is one of the most important features of Scouting.

What, Mr. Citizen, is O'Donnell going to do with that opportunity it has just now? Is it to be passed over, with some neighboring town taking advantage of the same thing, with advancement both in civic spirit and in benefit to its boys? The time for action is here, Mr. Troop Committeeman! What are you, personally, going to do in the case? Mr. Businessman: what

will you do to back to the limit your local Scout men in this undertaking? The question must be answered quickly as to whether or not O'Donnell's boys get to take advantage of this camp.

Paramount is the issue of transportation for the boys who go from here. It too must be settled quickly and efficiently. Trucks, covered over to protect the boys from the heat, must be ready to leave here Monday afternoon, the 10th of August for Lubbock. Gasoline must be furnished to run these trucks out there and back, with their loads of Scouts and equipment. Accessories must be furnished to assure their arriving safely home after eleven days.

The men who are directly connected with the Scout work cannot be expected to do everything that is to be done. It is up to each individual who is a citizen of O'Donnell—one who is interested in the future of O'Donnell as well as the present development—as to whether or not the boys of O'Donnell have the chance to go to this camp—whether or not O'Donnell is to do the big thing for its boys.

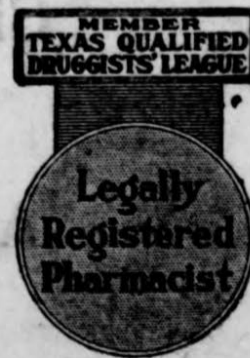

An Ordinance

Prohibiting erection and maintenance of open dry closets or toilets on Block A in the City of O'Donnell.

Be it ordained by the City Council City of O'Donnell, Texas,

That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to construct or erect anywhere upon what is known as Block A, in the City of O'Donnell, as shown on the plat or map of the City now on record, any open or dry toilet,

That any person or persons violating the terms of this Ordinance shall upon conviction thereof, be fined in a sum not more than \$25.00 and for each day any such dry or open toilet shall be maintained, shall be construed and constituted a separate offense, and punishable as such.

Passed and approved this the 23rd day of July, A. D. 1925.

An Ordinance

Compelling the cleansing of premises in City of O'Donnell, and fixing penalty therefor.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of O'Donnell, Texas:

1. That from and after the publication of this Ordinance as

required by law, it shall be the duty of the owner or owners, or occupants, of any grocery store, cafe, confectionery, barber shop, drug store, stable, or any other establishment or any private premises, within the corporate limits of the City of O'Donnell, where unwholesome or nauseous refuse, filth or accumulation may collect, to cleanse, remove or abate same.

2. Be it further ordained that in event such owners or occupants fail and refuse, within three days after notice from the City Authorities, to perform any or all of the requirements herein contained, the said owners or occupants, as the case may be, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof in the Corporation Court, shall be fined in the sum of Five Dollars, (\$5.00) and each day's violation thereafter shall be construed as a separate and distinct offense, and punishable as such.

Notice of Election
"ELECTION ORDER"

WHEREAS: the city Council of the City of O'Donnell, Texas, deems it advisable to issue bonds of the said City for the purpose hereinafter mentioned:

THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF O'DONNELL, TEXAS:

That an election be held on the 5th day of August, 1925, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

"Shall the City Council of the City

of O'Donnell, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds of the City of O'Donnell, Texas, in the sum of \$65,000.00, payable \$7,000 in 11 years, \$5,000 in 16 years, \$7,000 in 21 years; \$8,000 in 26 years, \$12,000 in 31 years; \$17,000 in 36 years; \$9,000 in 40 years from the date thereof, bearing interest at the rate of Six (6 per cent) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and to levy a tax sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of constructing a Waterworks System in the City of O'Donnell, Texas, as authorized by the Constitution and general Laws of the State of Texas with reference to cities and towns.

The said election shall be held at The City Hall in the City of O'Donnell and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election, to-wit:—

- A. B. Fortner, Presiding Officer.
- W. R. Sanderson,
- C. M. Cox, Judges.
- Sam Pfrimmer,
- T. C. Brown, Clerks.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and General Laws of the State of Texas, now in force with reference to such elections and bond issues governing cities and towns, and only qualified voters, who are property taxpayers of said city, shall be allowed to vote.

All voters who favor the proposition to issue bonds shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words: "For the Issuance of Waterworks Bonds and Levy of Tax Therefor."

And those opposed shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Issuance of Waterworks Bonds and Levy of Tax Therefor."

The manner of holding said election

shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating general elections.

A copy of this order, signed by the Mayor of the City of O'Donnell, attested by the City Secretary of the said City, shall serve as a proper notice of said election.

The Mayor is authorized and directed to cause said notice of the election to be posted up at the City Hall, and at one public place in each of the voting places in the City of O'Donnell, for at least thirty full days prior to the date of said election.

The Mayor is further authorized and directed to have said notice of election published in some newspaper of general circulation published in said city, to-wit, The O'Donnell Index, which notice shall be published once each week until the date of said election, the date of the first publication being not less than thirty full days prior to the date of the election.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of O'Donnell, Texas, deems it advisable to issue bonds of the said City for the purpose hereinafter mentioned:

THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF O'DONNELL, TEXAS: That an election be held on the 5th day of August, 1925, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

Shall the City Council of the City of O'Donnell, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds of the city of O'Donnell, Texas, in the sum of \$25,000.00, payable \$3,000 in 11 years, \$3,000 in sixteen years, \$3,000 in 21 years, \$4,000 in 26 years, \$4,000 in 31 years, \$4,000 in 36 years, \$4,000 in 40 years from the date thereof, bearing interest at the rate of Six (6 per cent) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of constructing street improvements in the City of O'Donnell, Texas, as authorized by the Constitution and General Laws of the State of Texas with reference to Cities and Towns.

The said election shall be held at The City Hall in the City of O'Donnell, and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election, to-wit:—

- A. B. Fortner, Presiding officer.
- W. R. Sanderson
- C. M. Cox, Judges.
- Sam Pfrimmer,
- T. C. Brown, Clerks.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and General laws of the State of Texas, now in force with reference to such elections and bond issues governing cities and towns, and only qualified voters, who are property taxpayers of said city, shall be allowed to vote.

All voters who favor the proposition to issue bonds shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words: "For the Issuance of Street Improvement Bonds and the Levy of Tax Therefor."

And those opposed shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against the Issuance of Street Improvement Bonds and Levy of Tax Therefor."

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating general elections.

A copy of this order, signed by the Mayor of the City of O'Donnell, attested by the City Secretary of the said City, shall serve as a proper notice of said election.

The Mayor is authorized and directed to cause said notice of the election to be posted up at the City Hall, and at one public place in each of the voting places in the City of O'Donnell for at least thirty full days prior to the date of said election.

The Mayor is further authorized and directed to have said notice of election published in some newspaper of general circulation published in said City, to-wit, The O'Donnell Index, which notice shall be published once each week until the date of said election, the date of the first publication being not less than thirty full days prior to the date of the election.

1/2 cup evaporated milk	1/2 cup buttered bread crumbs
1/2 cup water	1/2 tsp. salt
2 tbsp. flour	

She makes white sauce of milk, water, butter, flour, and salt, and mixes it with all ingredients except crumbs. She then places it in an oiled baking dish and covers with crumbs, baking in a moderate oven until brown.

Chicken a la King.

3 cups cold chicken, diced	1 cup evaporated milk
1/2 lb. mushrooms	1/2 lb. mushrooms
1/2 green pepper, shredded	1 egg yolk
1/2 pimento, shredded	Salt and pepper

Cook the peppers (also mushrooms, if they are used) in the butter for 15 minutes, keeping them covered while cooking slowly. Add the flour and seasonings, also the milk and broth. Stir to a smooth sauce. Put chicken in sauce to heat, and just before serving, stir in beaten egg yolk. Cook in double boiler to prevent curdling.

Tax Payers to Vote on \$90,000 Bond Issue Wednesday, August 5

On Wednesday, August 5, the citizens of O'Donnell will vote on two bond issues, one for \$85,000 for the purpose of constructing a waterworks system and one for draining the flood waters from the streets, the manner of holding these elections will be governed by the laws of the state regulating general elections, only qualified voters, who are property taxpayers will be allowed to vote.

The proposed waterworks and drainage bonds will mature in forty years and bear interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually.

The notices of the elections have been published in the Index for the past four weeks and every voter should be familiar with the provisions of the order.

Whether you favor the bond issues or not, it is your duty to attend the election and vote.
