There's a big three-dimentional outline map of Texas hanging prominently in an office at the State Department of Health in Austin. Bright orange blotches, neatly conforming to county lines, pock the face of the map from Texarkana to El Paso.

The legend underneath reads Rabies cases by counties, 1959." The map is the Division of Veterinary Public Health's way of vis-ualizing the extent of the State's rabies problem, both in wild and domestic animals. It is consistently one of the most acute in the nation the record shows.

Says Dr. A. B. Rich, the depart-ment's veterinary specialist: "It indicates a dangerous undercurrent of rabies exists thoughout the whole range of Texas wildlife. In an un-guarded moment it could erupt ina full-blown epidemic."

Preventing that grim eventuality falls to Dr. Rich and his staff of two other veterinarians. Working an area the size of Texas, advising and assisting local health departments and county officials in rach ments and county officials in rables control means spreading themselves very, very thin.

County judges play key roles in combatting ever - present rabies. State law gives them authority to declare rabies emergencies and impose compulsory dog vaccination nd stray dog control whenever circumstances warrant,

A major part of the veterinarian's task is convincing pet owners they are literally betting their lives when they forget or refuse to have the animals vaccinated.

The reason for Texas' consistently high incidence of rabies, health department authorities, the wide diversity of terrain and climate and the great abundance and of wildlife species.

Wildlife, notably foxes and skunks, perpetuate the disease among dogs. Dogs thus represent the most important source of human exposure to rabies

Files have accumulated since 1956 when regulations were adopted to cope with the snowballing use of

radiation equipment.

Most names in the file are physicians and dentists who use x-ray and fluoroscope devices. Any Texas doctor can request an equipment survey for radiation hazards. Departmental engineers will check it out from anode to x-ray.


