## New Firm To Build Here

### Poultry Business Grows

Work began Monday morning by L. D. Jackson on a 40 by 100 ft. Aluminum and steel building just east of his cafe at north Y to house a retail farm and ranch store. The firm will house Purina products and lease the building from Jackson. Cost of the building and stock will be upward of \$25,000.

With the O'Donnell broiler industry only 18 months old there are now 30 houses growing broilers and another 8 houses growing pullets or producing commercial eggs. According to Ken Looper of the Purina Co. recent houses are the house of E. S. Kingston and the two of O. J. Stanley at Draw. Although the broiler market has suffered a bear market for past 6 to 8 months the future looks some stronger. Local growers have found this climate ideal for poultry and many growers have raised broilers for from 16 to 17 cents per pound.

Planning on turkeys this year are Lynn Birdwell with 5,000 and A. F. Allen with 2500. Mr. Kingston is also thinking in terms of turkeys. Several farmers are thinking strongly of entering the poultry field in one way or the other.

Two firms, Paymaster and Purina are operating here and more or less financing producers.

### TEACHERS ARE NEEDED

Supt. Weldon Skinner of the O'Donnell School District this week urged college graduates in this area to give serious consideration to opportunities available to them in the teaching profession. Mr. Skinner explained that the need for teachers is especially critical in some areas of the State and that more than 2,000 persons have had to be assigned to teaching positions this year on the basis of emergency permits.

"I especially want to call your attention to the state-wide teacher education courses now being presented over television," Mr. Skinner said. "A person with a college degree can enroll in the 'Let's Teach' television series and begin his preparation for teaching. Even though a teaching vacancy may not be available to you at the present time, credit for the 'Let's Teach' series will enable you to qualify for an emergency teaching permit which will be valid from one to three years in any school district in Texas which has been unable to find enough fully qualified teachers."

**DIVORCE AND REMARRIAGE NO. 3**

That many people have transgressed the scriptural limits of divorce and remarriage is a fact that cannot be disputed. In fact, the marriage relations of some men and women have become so complicated that it is almost impossible, and in some cases it is impossible, to provide them with a scriptural solution by which they might extricate themselves from their marital entanglements. The Bible does not provide a solution for every aspect of divorce and remarriage because the teaching of the Bible on this subject is "preventive" rather than "curative." It tells us how to avoid unholy alliances.

Hasty marriage is one of the basic causes for the alarming divorce rate in our country. Our young people rush headlong into marriage with the idea that if it doesn't work out they can always get a divorce and marry someone else. When the time of separation comes, as it usually does in cases of this kind, the young couple may follow their original intention and remarry and, thus, increase the complexity of their marital status. This practice would be fine if it were not for the fact that in the life of every individual there comes a time of God-consciousness when the realization begins to dawn that they must give an account to God for their way of life. When they study the Bible, they soon learn that their philosophy of marriage has caused them to transgress the scriptural limits of the will of God. They can never be sure that their course of action is right, and their minds will always be filled with doubt, fear, and unhappiness.

Parents! Let's not add to the delinquency of our children by failing to instruct them in the way of the Lord. "Train up a child in the way he should go, and even when he is old he will not depart from it" (Proverbs 22:6) The church can help you to come to an understanding of the Word of God, which is the only authoritative set of rules for living that the world has known.

Higher production costs and large milk supplies will prevent any general uptrend in the 1957 net income for dairymen, says Extension Economist John McHaney. Improved technology and quality of cattle point to a higher rate of milk production per cow.

National egg production in 1957 is expected to exceed the 1956 record output of 169 million cases by about 2 percent. The lower egg prices of late 1956 are expected to continue thru the first quarter of 1957.

Feb. 15th is the income tax report deadline for farm and ranch families who did not file an estimate and payment before Jan. 15th. County agents can supply information on both income and social security taxes. Ask for a copy of the Farmer's 1956 Tax Guide.

Seven grain sorghum hybrids, developed cooperatively by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the U. S. Department of Agriculture will be available to farmers for planting in 1957.
