What will happen if you should die without executing a legal and proper will? Who will inherit your property? Your husband, wife, mother, father, children, your wife's relatives? The best way you can say who will have it is to provide a will which will protect your rightful beneficiaries and dispose of your property in accordance with

When a deceased has no will, or dies "intestate" as the law calls it, property of that person is distributed according to a detailed formula fixed by law, In some cases this may be the way you yourself would divide it-but in many cases it is not.

For eyample, here is a general idea of how the community property which you and your spouse have accumlated will be divided if you do not make a will prior to your death

If your husband or wife survives and there are no children, the surviving spouse receives all of the property.

If, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of deceased children, they would divide one-half of the property, while the surviving spouse would receive the other one-half.

Of course, grandchildren do not share in the estate unless their parent who would inherit is de-And when descendants of previously deceased children do inherit, they receive only the protion that the child would have received, regardless of the number of such descendants. An odd note, perhaps, is that the

surviving spouse already owns onehalf of the community estate prior to your death, and the law adds nothing to this share where there children surviving.

When there are only children and their descendants surviving, they divide the entire community estate

Cotton insect infestations were

reduced where rains were heavy, but increased in many fields where rainfall w a s light. Prevailing cloudy and humid conditions greatly increased damage by leaf - spot diseases, particularly in late planted fields.

Thrips infestations were reported reduced by heavy rains in some counties, but had increased where only showers fell. Damage was heaviest on young cotton in most localities. Medium to heavy infes-tations were reported in Bailey, Gainesa, Lamb, Parker, Swisher, & Terry Counties. Light to medium infestations were reported else-where. Reinfestations has been where. Reinfestations has been fairly rapid following heavy rains

in some sections. Fleahoppers were generally re ported in light infestations on older cotton in most instances. Medium to heavy populations were reported in Dawson, Howard, Mit-chell, Swisher, and Terry Counties.

Scattered eggs and occasional small bollworms were found in most early planted fields. Lygus bugs, square borers and cabbage loopers were found in small numbers i n some plantings.

Grasshoppers were reported in light infestations in Gains, Lamb, Scurry, and Yoaknm Counties. Some damaging infestations were present in Parmer County.



They used to call them "Foodhandlers Schools". Today the title more nearly describes its purpose: "A Short Course in Food Preparation and Services."

The courses are presented b y Public Health Education Division instructors in any city in Texas on request of local authorities.

Managers, supervisors and all other employees of eating estab-lishments are the primary object-ives of the course. However, the same principals apply to all public and private foodhandlers whether housewife or canner.

The course is presented in four sessions of two hours each. Depending on local working conditions, the daily sessions may scheduled for morning, afternoon the daily sessions may be or evening.

Discussions deal with the causative agents of communicable diseases: virus, bacteria, protozoa and worms; the source of these organisms (sick people, people who are carriers, and sick animals); the mode of transmssion from the source to susceptible persons; and the ports of entry.
Discussions bring out that there

are at least 75 different comfunicable diseases existing in the U S today, of which 30 or so can be transmitted through insanitary food production, processing, distribution, preparation and service.

Care Urged Barbecue Fire Making

Be careful when firing charcoal briquettes, says the Texas Farm & Ranch Safety Council. This is a ma-jor problem when cooking over an outdoor grill. Don't let an accident mar your family's enjoyment of an outdoor barbeque.

The Council cites two rules to observe when starting a charcoal fire; never use gasoline, either raw or in a mixture, to kindle any fire, and never add any kind of liquid fuel after the fire has started.

There are several methods you can use to start a fire saftely.. Paper or excelsior under the birquettes takes time and fanning but produces results. Some manufacturers treat the bribuetts with a substance that burns readily when ignited. These cost a little more but are easier to fire.

Kerosene or a commercial char-coal lighter fluid also may be used. Put some of the briquettes in a five quart oil can and pour the kerosene or starter fluid over the briquettes of War Orphans training when they until they are saturated. 
