NAVY OFFERS POSSIBLE FREE COLLEGE EDUCATION

Designed to supplement the officer output of the Naval Academy, the Naval ROTC program makes it possible for a young man to earn a regular commission while studying at the civilian college of his choice which has a ROTC unit. All tuition fees and books are furnished by the Navy and the student re-elves an annual retainer of \$600 for not more than four years. During the summers the student goes on interesting training cruises as a midshipman. After successfully completing the usual four year college course, he is commissioned in the Regular Navy or Marine Corps and goes on active duty as a prospective career officer with the Navy's modern fleets. Immediate challenging assignments to flight training or submarine training will offer varied career potential to those who apply and qualify.

High school seniors and graduates who have reached the 17th anniversary of birth and have not reached the 21st anniversary of birth on June 30, 1963 may apply for the NROTC aptitude test. Those who make a qualifying score will be given a rigid medical exam early in 1963. From the number of qualified young men remaining in competition, more than 2,000 will be selected to begin their naval careers in college next September. Application forms are available at high schools.

STATE COUNTY ALLOW TAX DISCOUNT PAYMENT

Property owners can have three percent off by paying their state and county taxes during the month of October, states George McCracken, tax assessor and collector of Lynn county.

During November the discount rate is two percent and during December it is one percent. Last date for paying these taxes without a penalty is January 31st.

It's The Law -

RIGHT OF WITNESSES
 By far the most vital people in our system of justice are witnesses. Everyone else in a trial exists to hear what they have to say. Or courts need witnesses. A jury to find the facts. The judge to apply the law. The lawyer to tell his clients story. Chances are you worry about stepping up, taking an oath and telling your story in court. On some rare occasions you could be called upon to testify about something affecting your own standing in the community. As a witness you too may have the right, for example, not to testify against yourself in somebody else's lawsuit or crime trial. If you are ever in such a bind consult a lawyer of your own choice on what to do. The lawyer who called you to testify has a sworn duty

to protect his client, not you. But your lawyer is sworn to keep what you tell him secret and to advise you in your own interests within the law. Wise lawyers tell their witnesses to obey twelve rules:
 1. Go to the place (say, the scene of an accident). Check your memory before you go to court. People forget and get caught up on details. But if you check what you saw and heard you are on solid ground.
 2. Visit a court. Hear how other witnesses testify. It will help you see your role on the witness stand.
 3. Wear clean, conservative clothes.
 4. Don't memorize your story word for word. That is the surest way to sound bad. But think of what you saw and heard.
 5. Listen to the questions you are asked with care and answer thoughtfully.
 6. Give a simple, direct answer in your own words. Don't be rushed.
 7. If you err—and people often do—correct yourself at once, if you

can't remember some detail, say so. Don't bluff.
 8. Tell the truth. Don't figure which side you may help. Don't identify yourself with either side.
 9. Stop when the judge breaks in and don't try to sneak an answer in before he can stop you. What you might say could end in a "mistrial."
 10. Keep cool and don't sass back.
 11. If they ask you, "Certainly, you have talked to other people—the lawyer, for example, and yes you may be reimbursed for certain of your expenses incurred in attending the trial."
 12. Remember, without witnesses our law would fall to do justice. If you are called, be a good witness.

Research Pays Off -

How much does research cost? The better question would be: What is research worth? Research is indeed the proverbial "stitch in time."
 Medical research has brought about many outstanding drugs and spectacular operations which save individual lives and relieve suffering, but more outstanding and spectacular are the advances in preventive medicine that have been made which stop suffering before it starts. Economically speaking, preventive medicine has saved the people of the United States countless dollars. A case in point is retrolental fibroplasia, an eye condition marked by the formation of fibrous tissue behind the crystalline lens. Prematurely born babies are often stricken causing partial or total blindness. At first premature births were blamed. However, research financed by federal and private means discovered the cause to be the excessive administration of oxygen—employed regularly in incubators for premature infants. This study cost approximately \$50,000. In the U. S. 5,000 children are blind because of retrolental fibroplasia. Each child will cost an estimated \$100,000 for education, training and support from birth to death — or a grand total of \$500 million. Caring for these 5,000 children in our generation will cost 100,000 times more than the cost of the research which prevents the disorder. Other items developed solely through research include the Salk vaccine and steroid (cortisone) compounds — which prevent blindness, relieve arthritis, and aid skin diseases and allergic conditions. Who can put a price on the suffering and crippling averted because of them. The life expectancy of Americans now born is now past 70 years of age. In just 17 years — 1937 to 1954 — it increased 9.6 years. This means, because of the decline in the death rate, over \$770

million additional federal taxes was received in 1955 plus the accompanying rise in power and productivity from an increase span of life. The wise man who said, "I would not give a trifle to prevent what he would give a thousand worlds to cure?" was right.

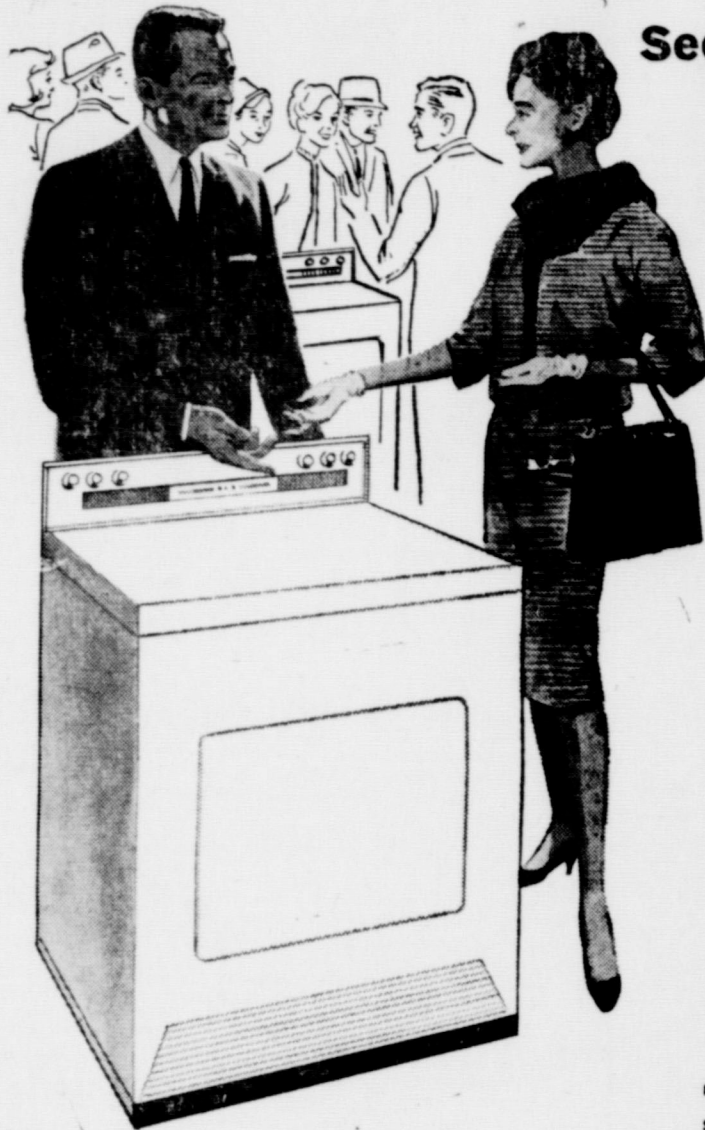

It's The Law -

RIGHT OF WITNESSES
By far the most vital people in our system of justice are witnesses. Everyone else in a trial exists to hear what they have to say. Or courts need witnesses. A jury to find the facts. The judge to apply the law. The lawyer to tell his clients story.
Chances are you worry about stepping up, taking an oath and telling your story in court.
On some rare occasions you could be called upon to testify about something affecting your own standing in the community.
As a witness you too may have the right, for example, not to testify against yourself in somebody else's lawsuit or crime trial.
If you are ever in such a bind consult a lawyer of your own choice on what to do. The lawyer who called you to testify has a sworn duty

to protect his client, not you. But your lawyer is sworn to keep what you tell him secret and to advise you in your own interests within the law.
Wise lawyers tell their witnesses to obey twelve rules:
1. Go to the place (say, the scene of an accident). Check your memory before you go to court. People forget and get caught up on details. But if you check what you saw and heard you are on solid ground.
2. Visit a court. Hear how other witnesses testify. It will help you see your role on the witness stand.
3. Wear clean, conservative clothes.
4. Don't memorize your story word for word. That is the surest way to sound bad. But think of what you saw and heard.
5. Listen to the questions you are asked with care and answer thoughtfully.
6. Give a simple, direct answer in your own words. Don't be rushed.
7. If you err—and people often do—correct yourself at once. If you

can't remember some detail, say so. Don't bluff.
8. Tell the truth. Don't figure which side you may help. Don't identify yourself with either side.
9. Stop when the judge breaks in and don't try to sneak an answer in before he can stop you. What you might say could end in a "mistrial."
10. Keep cool and don't sass back.
11. If they ask you: Certainly, you have talked to other people—the lawyer, for example; and yes you may be reimbursed for certain of your expenses incurred in attending the trial.
12. Remember, without witness: our law would fall to do justice. If you are called, be a good witness.

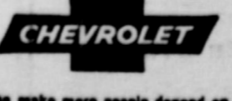

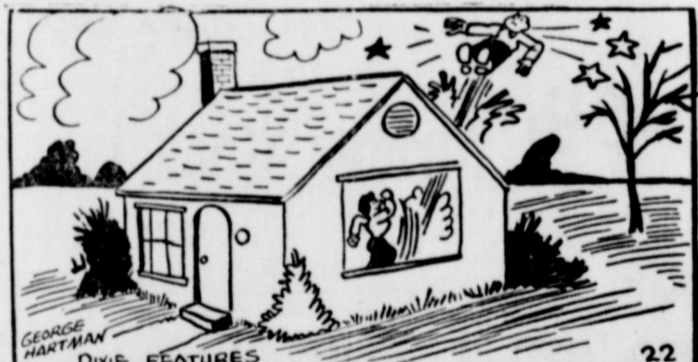

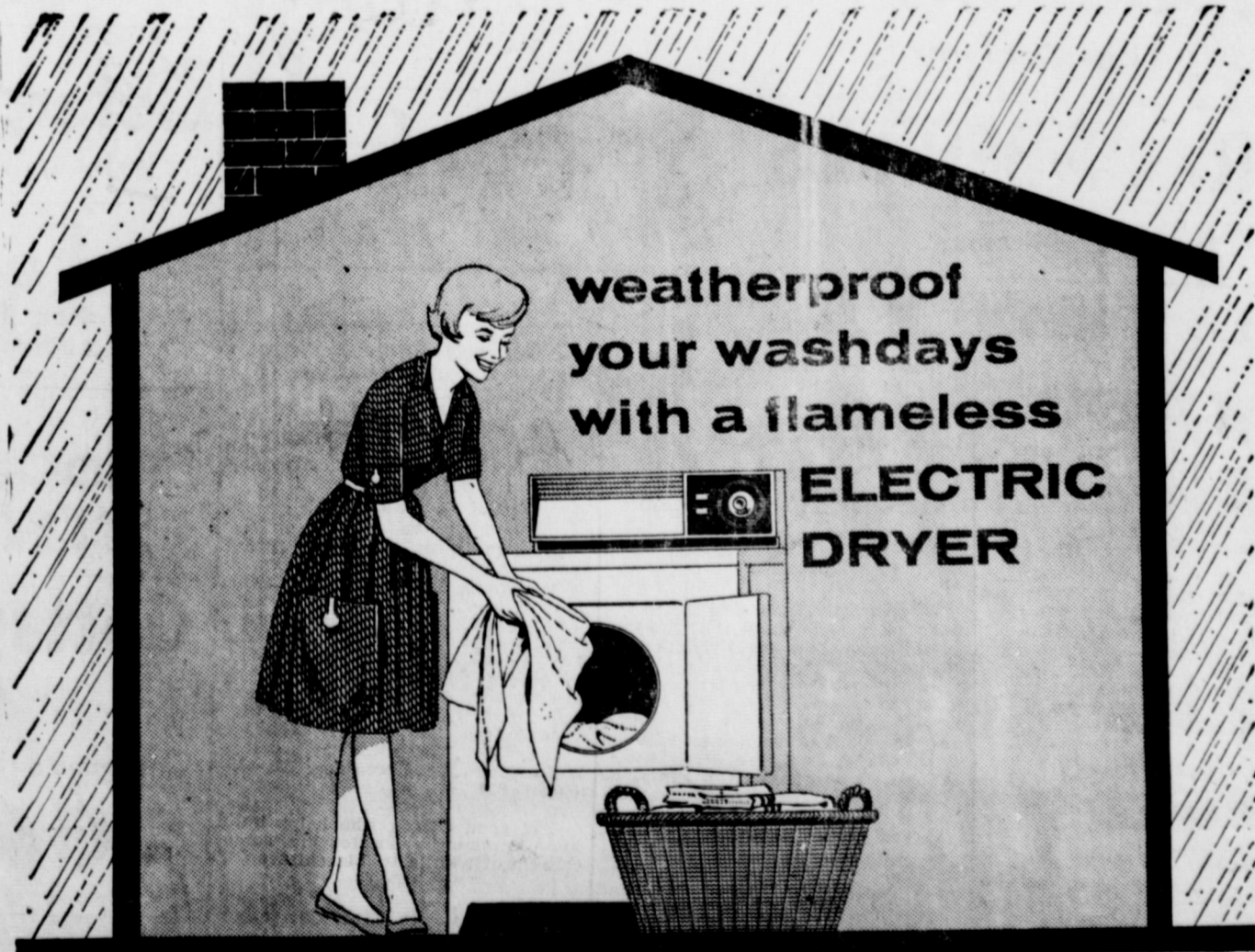

RETIREMENT PLANS SHOULD BE MADE IN ADVANCE

Whether you have decided to retire or not, you should visit the social security office three months before you reach retirement age. The social security representative can help you in many ways. For one thing, he can find out how much your retirement payments will be when you are ready for them. Though he won't give you advice as to when you should retire, he can give you valuable information to help you decide for yourself.

If you have decided to retire, he will help you in claiming retirement benefits for yourself and members of your family who might get benefits on your record. He will help you get whatever proofs are needed to go with your claim. For example you will probably need proof of your age. He can tell you whether any of the documents you now have will do for proof of age.

You should check with your social security office even if you plan to keep working. You do not have to quit work entirely to get social security. Many people think they do, and are losing social dependents on neighbors and friends for advice. Often this kind of advice is wrong, and when it is wrong it is usually expensive. Before going to the social security office, it is a good idea to call or write ahead. There may be something you'll need to bring with you. The social security representative can tell you what to bring and the best time to come in.
