Natural Resistance Needed Against Germs

Bacteria are the most numerous forms of plant life and it is little wonder — under favorable condit-ions a single bacterium can become 536,000 in 15 short hours. Why is it then, constantly surrounded and assaulted by them as we are, that we do not fall victim of their ettacks more often? Because six 35th year, No. 38 attacks more often? Because six conditions must be present in any nfection.

First, there must be a reservoir of germs, second, there must be a mode of transmission, third, there mode of transmission, three, there must be a susceptible host, fourth, there must be a mode of entry into the host, fifth, there must be favorable conditions for growth and sixth there must be a mode of exit. If any of these conditions is lacking, there is no disease.

Consider the human body as a fort surrounded by bacterial enemics. Always there is skirmishing with some of the commoner varieties, and sometimes they overwhelm by their numbers and strength, cut as long as the outer-wall remains intact, battlements manned with defenders, the fort is safe.

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The sum total of human defensive forces is called resistance. "Im-munity" to this o rthat specific dis ease is part of the defensive pattern. It varies in different persons and at different times in the same person. Some people are born with a natural immunity to certain disases. Others get an acquired immunity thru shots or by recovering from an actual infection.

Natural resistance can be lost or weakened by a variety of bad hab-its. Malnutrition will weaken it, but so will overeating which taxes the liver and kidneys and clogs the blood with wastes. Worry is another friend of disease germs, and impure air, dissipation, lack of bodily cleanliness, want of proper exer-cise, continuous work unrelieved by open air recreation all will lessen natural resistance to disease.

The 120 day pay period for members of the 55th Legislature members of the 55th Legislature ended Tuesday. All the extra time necessary to complete some of the important decisions left over will be contributed at the expense of the lawmakers of both houses.

Guesses as to how long it will take to complete the work of the 55th Legislature are running up to May 15th to 20th. This prediction is made by some of the older members of state government, who are quick to point out that very few Legislatures have ever completed their work in the 120 day pay per-

Statistics compiled py the Legislative Budget Board in its study of the necessity for annual sessions of the Legislature reveal the 48th Legislature meeting in 1943 was the last regular session to conclude its work on a 120 day period. At that time the legislators received \$10 for the first 120 days and \$5 thereafter until adjournment. The 51st Legislature, meeting from Jan. 11th to July 6, 1949 holds the re-cord for length of session - 177 days.

The constitutional amendment adopted in 1954 raising the per diem to \$25 for 120 days with no pay after that period applied to the 54th Legislature, the last regular session under Gov. Shivers. This was a 148 day session running from Jan. 11 to June 7th.


