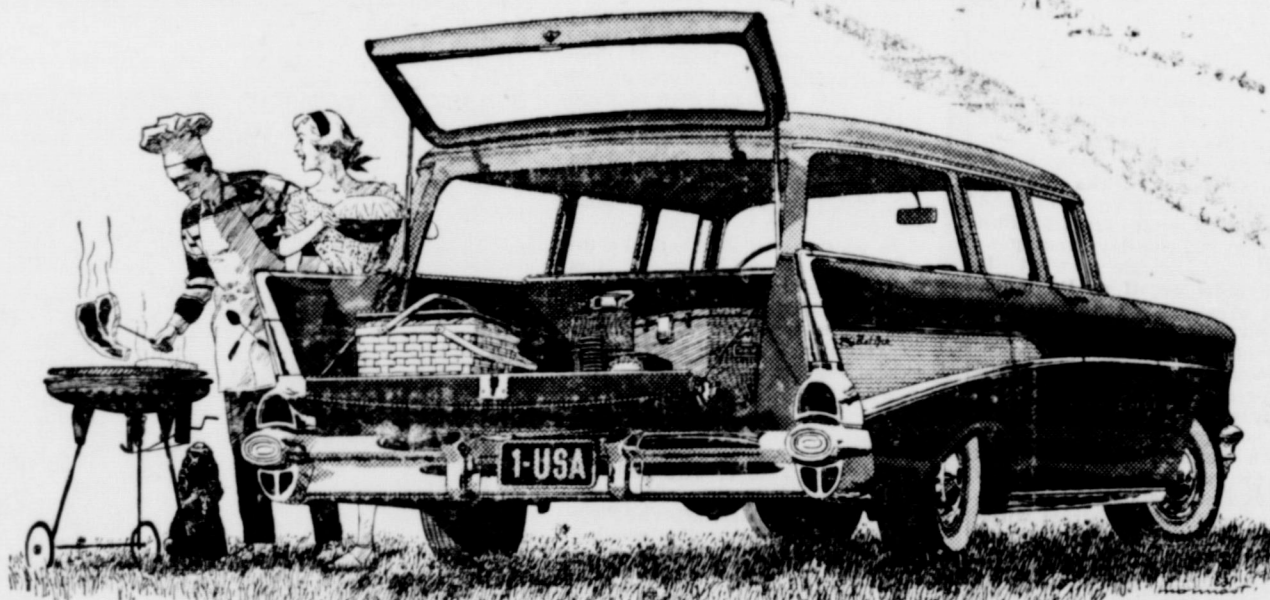

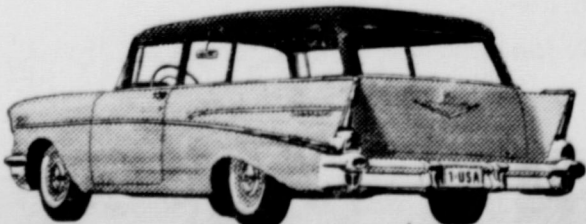

Country Editor

Graduation time here is less than two weeks away. It is a time of great personal and great community pride as we view our children walking thru the doorway into adult life.

However graduation, not just this year, but each year is a time of inventory to see what our sons and our daughters have gleaned in literary education in twelve years.

Education has more facets than has the best cut diamond. But to us it is primarily the gaining of knowledge learned by others long dead and passed to us in the silent pages of books. It is a great inheritance. A classic book is as much to be loved as a good friend.

Then too, education is a very real civic conscience as we all work and lived as a community, a state, a nation. Aside from religious education, academic education is the use of the Golden Rule as we live out our brief, yet often complexing lives. A child may follow "book-learning" to its highest level and practice safe-blowing at nite, and this be a miserable failure as a well educated citizen.

But it is academic education that we feel is slipping. Social education is gaining — which is on the credit side.

Here are some questions we need answers:

Locally we believe a grade of 60 is passing. Many schools have 70 with some courses as high as 75. Is 60 too low? Frankly we feel a child is being sold short at 60.

Locally it would be interesting to have each senior take a Texas college entrance exam. Of course results of the exam would have NO bearing on graduation.

Locally it would be interesting to send form letters to all graduates of this school of known addresses requesting them to list what they "lost" in their primary education. (Personally we miss most a well rounded knowledge of spelling followed by script. What we enjoy most is our knowledge of science followed by memories of great books.)

Locally it would be most interesting for administrators and teachers to prepare a confidential check list and grade the graduates on spoken English, culture, poise, etc. These are essential educational factors that give the person a "look" of education. A doctor of philosophy is not much in our book if he "murders" the King's English.

Before you can count ten, almost, our graduates of this year will be our teachers, our school board, our parents of a newer, better generation to come.

Are we upgrading our education or are we tending toward a lower medium where ALL will graduate with a MINIMUM of knowledge and effort.

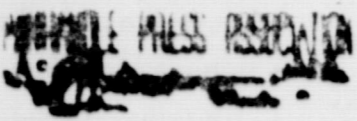

LITTLE ROOM FOR ERROR

Austin — Between now and fall, insecticides in back yard gardens will fog the air like smoke as the annual battle between gardener and garden pests is joined in earnest. Farmers will fight with spray planes and aerosol mists as a summer sun brings maturity to insect-vulnerable field crops.

Inevitably the insect will lose. A single breath of lethal spray, a single drop on his tiny body, a single bite of spray-covered green and his doom is sealed. He has a single consolation — a grim, but satisfying one: his executioner, being human, is liable to the human disease of carelessness. Which means that the man behind the sprays stands a fair chance of being himself a victim of the very weapon he employs against the

insects.

So it is that the executioner becomes the executed. Modern insecticides and miticides — including the deadly "organic phosphates" — allow slight margin for error. Improperly used, they have a high toxicity for warm blooded animals — including humans — as they have for insects.

However any poison, however toxic, can be used safely when proper precautions are taken.

The burden of safe use will always be on the person behind the spray gun. He is the one who must follow the instructions on the manufacturer's label. He is the one who must guard other people and livestock against wind drifts containing spray. He is the one who must make sure he is gloved and masked and properly clothed before using the poisons.

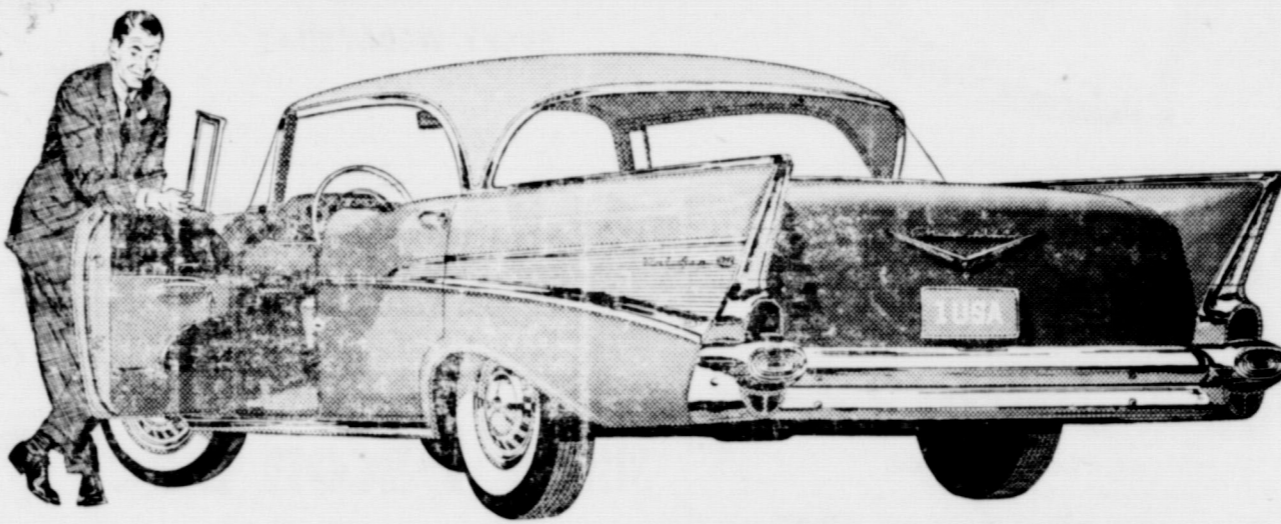

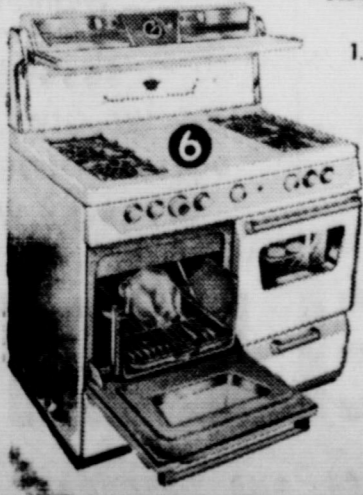
