The upcoming big game hunting season in Texas should be a good one, reports Ed Cooper, extension wildlife specialist. But, he warns, if hunters do not observe the rules of safe hunting this season can be disastrous. Safe hunting depends on the common sense, courtesy, and vigilance of all those who hunt, he says.

Small grain producers lost an estimated \$15,471,000 due to plant diseases in 1958. Harlan Smith, extension plant pathologist, said rusts accounted for most of the losses but that blights and smuts also were of considerable importance. A combination of seed treatment and crop rotation can reduce these losses and small grain varieties with resistance to the diseases should be planted in areas where adaptable.

A national marketing quota of 12,167,000 bales, a national acreage allotment of 16 million acres and a date set, Dec. 15, for a farmer referendum on marketing quotas or upland cotton have been announced by Sect'y Ag. Benson.

Baptists In "Forward Program"

The local Baptist Church is currently in a "Forward Program" of church finance. A proposed budget of \$59,000 will be considered at a later date. The present budget is about \$30,000. Last year the church raised over \$50,000. Alvin Hogg is chairman of budget committee. On Thursday, Nov. 13th at nine there will be an all-church loyalty dinner. Mrs. Wayne Carroll is chairman and plans are being made for 300 to attend, according to Homer Hardberger.

This week the Church is moving in a 39 by 39 ft. building from Lubbock to be placed immediately in the rear of the Church and to be used for Sunday School rooms, Mr. Hardberger said.

Over 22,000 Bales Ginned

22,416 bales of 1958 cotton have been ginned here a survey made Monday night showed. The harvest is estimated at 75 percent complete and the total should near 30,000 bales for the town's gins. Gins and elevators have been running at full capacity for past six weeks.

Rain over the week end into Monday and Tuesday netted 2 inches here. The rain will slow the harvest greatly and will most surely have a bearing on future grades. Up to the present grades have been unusually good. Business in all facets of the community continues very good. Farmers report production is far better than first estimated early in September. Grain production has been excellent. Over 400 rail cars of grain have moved from here not counting grain moving by truck.

There is more "spending money" here than at any time since 1949-50 as crop expenses are relatively light.

City Tries Out Sweeper

For the past week the City has had motorized street sweeper on approval and has been cleaning the pavement thruout the town. The machine may be purchased for \$1200 if the Council decides in favor of this machine.

Last week the City had its new park location in the northeast part of town graded. The site is of two city blocks of which a half block was purchased from Marshall Whitsett for Lamesa for \$1400. The park will be improved during the winter with the planting of trees, shrubs, and grass. No final decision has been made as to where the new club house and new city hall will be built; but the pool will be in the park where probably the club house will be located.

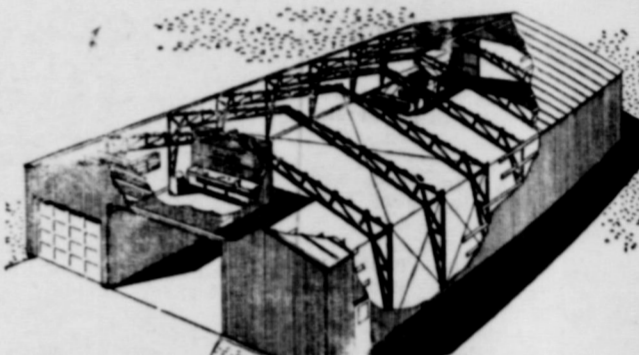

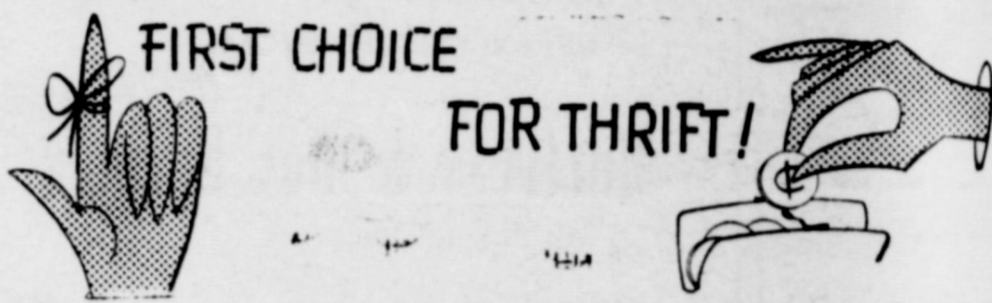

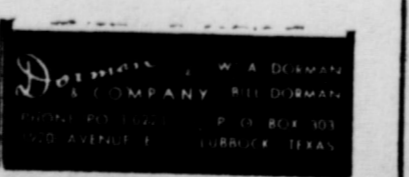
