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Two Parts Of Medicare Told

The Medicare program has two parts: Part A (Hospital Care)

and Part B (Physician's Services). If you are under Part B (for which you signed up and now pay \$3.00 a month to Social Security) you can collect from the federal government part of the payments you make to us for medical services.

This contract to pay is between you and the Social Security Administration. We still are in the private practice of medicine; we have no contractual relationship with the federal government. As your private physician we will continue to provide medical ser-

vice to you in the same manner we have in the past. We will continue to give you the medical treatment and advice we believe is best for you. We expect you to continue to exercise your freedom of choice of physician and to maintain responsibility for payment of fees.

The Medicare law states that no federal officer or employee shall exercise any supervision or control over the practice of medicine or the manner in which medical services are provided.

Under Part B, the Medicare Law provides that reimbursement will be made by the government to you for 80% of the covered medical care expenditures after the first \$50.00 in a calendar year. You must pay the first \$50.00 and 20% of all over \$50.00. You do not obtain reimbursement from the Social Security Administration directly, but from the fiscal agent that represents Social Security in this area. The agent in this area is Blue Cross-Blue Shield of Texas, P.O. Box 6184 Dallas, Texas.

- To obtain reimbursement:
1. You must fill out and sign Part 1 of the "Request for Payment" form.
 2. Answer "Yes" to question No. 3.
 3. Answer "No" to question No. 4.

Cotton Diseases Are Showing Up

Lubbock—Heavy infestations of Verticillium wilt have shown up early in some cotton on the heavier soils of the South Plains, reports Dr. Earl Minton, plant pathologist at the South Plains Research and Extension Center, north of here.

Verticillium normally begins to manifest itself on some cotton in the area about this time each year, but he said the infestation appears unusually widespread in parts of Lubbock, Lamb, Hale, Floyd and Crosby Counties.

The disease is caused by soil borne fungi that tend to thrive under cool, moist soil conditions.

The Agricultural Research Service pathologist said bacterial blight or angular leaf spot also appears to be causing more than normal damage throughout the South Plains this year.

Control methods for the two diseases are limited, although Extension Service Pathologist Dr. Robert Berry says some cultural practices can help to reduce losses from them.

Minton said he has seen one field which was 30 percent infested with Verticillium wilt infestations this year are normally not prevalent until September.

Early symptoms of "Vert" are chlorosis or yellowing of the leaves. Minton said the yellowing tends to occur on lower leaves first and gradually works up to the top of the plant.

He credits the early season development of Verticillium wilt to cool, wet soil and cool nights during June. These environmental conditions allowed the disease to get a headstart, he said.

Cultural practices which Berry and Minton say can help to retard the wilt are as follows:

Avoid deep cultivation. It prunes roots and allows easy entry for the fungi and it can stunt the plants making them more susceptible to the disease.

Balance fertility and water. Excessive nitrogen appears to increase the disease and too much irrigation provides cool, wet soil where the fungi thrive.

Strive to maintain highest possible soil temperatures. Alternate row irrigation can help, Minton says. Skip-row planting and planting on-the-bed will tend to reduce infestations because they help to raise soil temperature.

Crop rotations using small grains and grain sorghum normally reduce the incidence of infestation, Minton said, although one heavily infested field found this year had been in grain sorghum for two years.

Bacterial blight or angular leaf spot first appears as small, water soaked areas on leaves. Minton said this part of the leaf will turn brownish-black and the surrounding tissue will turn yellow.

Hot dry weather tends to retard bacterial blight infestations, he said.

The best known method for control of both "Vert" and bacterial blight would be to plant a variety resistant to the diseases, according to the research pathologist.

Minton, Berry and Dr. Levon Ray, cotton breeder at the South Plains Center, recently issued a report on a test measuring the Verticillium wilt and bacterial blight resistance of 64 cotton varieties.

Most commercially available stormproof varieties were found

to be susceptible to Verticillium wilt, Minton said, but Auburn M and Gregg 25 V were judged slightly tolerant.

Acala 1517 V, a long staple variety, yielded 705 pounds of lint per acre—the highest yield of the commercially available cotton varieties in the test.

The performance of several experimental lines was outstanding both in yield and fiber qualities, Minton said.

The study was conducted on Olton loam soil which, since 1960, has been managed with the intent of establishing and maintaining a

high incidence of Verticillium wilt.

Results of the work indicate cotton varieties are being developed which will produce high yields of good quality fiber under conditions of severe Verticillium and bacterial blight infestation.

Dr. Ray has released several of these lines to cotton breeders. It will probably be at least a year before they will be available in large quantities.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Section 62 of Article XVI a new subsection to be denominated subsection (c), of said Section 62; authorizing the Legislature to enact laws establishing, subject to the limitations stated, a State-wide System of Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation benefits for the officers and employees of the counties and other political subdivisions of the state, and of the political subdivisions of any county.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a subsection (c) which shall read as follows:

"(c) The Texas Legislature is authorized to enact appropriate laws to provide for a System of Retirement, Disability and Death Benefits for all the officers and employees of a county or other political subdivision of the state, or a political subdivision of a county; providing that when the Texas Legislature has passed the necessary enabling legislation pursuant to the Constitutional authorization, then the governing body of the county, or other political subdivision of the state, or political subdivision of the county shall make the determination as to whether a particular county or other political subdivision of the state, or subdivision of the county participates in this System; providing further that such System shall be operated at the expense of the county or other political subdivision of the state or political subdivision of the county electing to participate therein and the officers and employees covered by the System; and providing that the Legislature of the State shall never make an appropriation to pay the costs of this Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System.

"The Legislature may pro-

vide for a voluntary merger into the System herein authorized by this Constitutional Amendment of any System of Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Benefits which may now exist or that may hereafter be established under subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution; providing further that the Texas Legislature in the enabling statute will make the determination as to the amount of money that will be contributed by the county or other political subdivision of the state or political subdivision of the county to the State-wide System of Retirement, Disability and Death Benefits, and the Legislature shall further provide that the amount of money contributed by the county or other political subdivision of the state or subdivision of the county shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each officer and employee covered by this State-wide System.

"It is the further intention of the Legislature, in submitting this Constitutional Amendment, that the officers and employees of the county or other political subdivision of the state or political subdivision of a county may be included in those systems regardless of whether the county or other political subdivision of the state or political subdivision of the county participates in the System under the provisions of subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution as the same is herein amended."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election in November, 1966, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Texas Legislature to establish a State-wide Cooperative System of Retirement, Disability and Death Benefits for the officials and employees of the various counties or other political subdivisions of the state, or

political subdivisions of a county; authorizing the Legislature to provide for a voluntary merger into the system authorized by this Amendment by those officers and employees covered by the provisions of subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution as now existing or may hereafter be established; providing that the costs of this System shall be borne by the counties and other political subdivisions of the state and political subdivisions of the county electing to participate therein and the officers and employees covered by the System; and forbidding the Legislature from making any appropriations for the operation of this System."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Texas Legislature to establish a State-wide Cooperative System of Retirement, Disability and Death Benefits for the officials and employees of the various counties or other political subdivisions of the state, or political subdivisions of a county; authorizing the Legislature to provide for a voluntary merger into the system authorized by this Amendment by those officers and employees covered by the provisions of subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution as now existing or may hereafter be established; providing that costs of this System shall be borne by the counties and other political subdivisions of the state and political subdivisions of the county electing to participate therein and the officers and employees covered by the System; and forbidding the Legislature from making any appropriations for the operation of this System."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes have been cast in favor of such amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have notice of said proposed Amendment and of said election published as required by the Constitution of Texas, and laws of this state.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37 proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section, Section 51-d, so as to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen.

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 51-d to read as follows:

"Section 51-d. The Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or of full-paid firemen who suffer violent death in the course of the performance of their duties as law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November,

1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen who suffer violent death in the course of the performance of their duties as law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38 proposing an amendment to Section 2, Article VI, Constitution of the State of Texas, to omit the requirement that members of the armed services vote only in the county in which they resided at the time of entering the service.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2, Article VI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by deleting the following language:

"Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces."

The text of this Section is shown below, with a broken line through the sentence which is to be deleted:

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she, as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor. In like man-

ner, the wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt therefor. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. And this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation. Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces."

Sec. 2. The only purpose of the amendment proposed in this Resolution is to make the aforesaid deletion. The adoption of this amendment shall not be deemed to have the effect of readopting the remainder of the Section, and if any other amendment to this Section, being for a different purpose, is adopted at the same election, or at the same election, the adoption of this amendment shall not be construed as nullifying the change made by such other amendment.

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to allow members of the Armed Forces who are residents of Texas to vote."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to allow members of the Armed Forces who are residents of Texas to vote."

Sec. 4. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIXTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to establish the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Section 3, of the Constitution of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 3. The Senators shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of four years; but a new Senate shall be chosen after every apportionment, and the Senators elected after each apportionment shall be divided by lot into two classes. The seats of the Senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the first two years, and those of the second class at the expiration of four years, so that one half of the Senators shall be chosen biennially thereafter. Senators shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified."

Section 2. That Article III, Section 4, of the Constitution of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 4. The Members of

the House of Representatives shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of two years. Representatives shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified."

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State, at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment establishing the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such Amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

Sec. 4. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for such election and this Amendment shall be published and the election shall be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Rural Accidents Reported For June

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated six accidents on rural highways in Lynn County during the month of June, according to Sergeant A. E. Roberts, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in three persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$2,860.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first six months of 1966 shows a total of 48 accidents resulting in two persons killed, 18 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$24,175.00.

The number of traffic deaths in Texas continues to rise. For the first six months of 1966 there have been 1470 traffic deaths compared to 1325 traffic deaths for the first months of 1965. This 11% increase is very alarming, and chances are it will become very critical because of vacation months and holiday periods still ahead to intensify the magnitude of the accident picture.

The Sergeant stated, "It is estimated that at the end of 1966 traffic deaths in Texas will increase about 10% over 1965 which means approximately 3300 persons will be killed in traffic accidents." The Sergeant added one other comment, "To control accidents we must first learn to control ourselves."

SS Benefits Not Retirement Only

Remember the Titan II missile site fire near Searcy, Ark., in August of 1965, when 53 men died?

John G. Hutton, Social Security Administration District manager in Lubbock, has just received an actuarial study of the expected total payment from social security to the 53 families. It will amount to \$1,631,000 if the 72 minor children attend school through age 21, and \$1,402,000 if they do not.

All 53 men were insured for survivors benefits. Only one had such scanty coverage to bar his widow from benefits at age 60, but she and her child are currently receiving payments. Her widow's benefits still end when the child reaches 18.

The other 52 widows can be expected to receive \$662,000 in payments after age 60. Four are past 60 now. The 33 widows and the minor children in their care will receive \$956,000 if the children attend school through age 21 and \$727,000 if they do not.

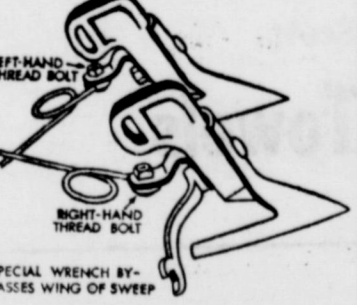
