### No Need For Bad Teeth

Austin — Chances are one in five that your young child is in need of a major teeth straightening job. Studies show that one fifth of the nation's children suffer from "malocclusion" or improper alignment of teeth. A generation ago, parents of young children with teeth that did not come together properly were usually advised to "set them along and nature will correct the situation."

Today we know children will not "grow out" it. We know it is a condition to be carefully watched so corrections can be started at the proper time by a dental specialist known as an orthodontist.

Although the public is just now becoming aware of the health significance of malocclusion, experience has taught dentists that crooked teeth contribute to decay, faulty speech and malnutrition. One of the worst results of malocclusion is the psychological stress borne by the child who is singled out for ridicule because of "buck teeth".

### Harvest Nears High Gear

The five local gins here Monday reported a total of 2399 bales of cotton ginned as of 6 p. m. Monday night or about 8 percent of the expected crop total. For the past few days the gins have been running near capacity.

Week end business was the best to date and this approaching week end is expected to be much better. The pulling payroll here runs about \$150,000 a week during a peak week of work. About 75 percent of the National's money goes to Mexico. The peak week end is expected to be the last week of this month.

Cotton is opening rapidly and early grain is moving very rapidly into the town's four elevators.

Open weather of the South Plains very beautiful. Indian Summer is expected to throw the harvest into a mad rush to beat a probable period of bad weather in November.

An estimated 1500 Mexican Nationals and 500 natives are in the fields with more arriving daily.

The economic pulse beat of the area is increasing rapidly and the busy week ends are a joy to see. All buildings in town and living quarters are filled.

### NEAR 800 IN SCHOOL

There are 740 students in the white school system and about 40 in Negro School to almost set an all time record set in 1949 of 800. There are 96 (at last count) in the first grade. 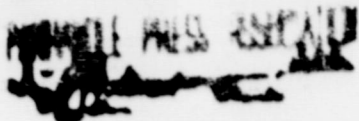

#### LITTLE FLU HERE TO DATE

Austin — Earlier predictions of a wide spread Asian flu epidemic this fall and winter appear to be materializing. Reports of cases coming in from all quarters indicate that Texas has been well seeded with the virus. Only five brief months have passed since late April when the disease was first recognized in Hong Kong. This speed of spread is typical of the illness.

So far, Asian flu, which is really a new strain of virus type well known to lab technicians, has been comparatively mild. This very fact has caused many people to ask why it. There are several good answers. First, even mild flu can be disabling for four or five days followed by a period of lassitude and weakness.

Second, flu is always unpredictable. Cases are frequently complicated by bacterial infections. And, even when uncomplicated, the illness has a particularly dangerous impact on persons suffering from heart ailments or chronic diseases.

Erwin Young notifying them he was chosen to receive the bronze star for gallantry in Korea:

"I did what I thought was my duty and they called it heroic action. I shot a Chinese at point-blank range and one of his hand grenades blew up in my face. I sure thought I had had the course. It didn't even mar my beauty, though. Things are pretty quiet here right now and we're all waiting to go into the army reserve."
