

"PACKAGE" HOSPITALS ARE A FIRST METHODIST CHURCH DEFENSE MEASURE

-0--

Texas has 90 "packaged" hospitals on hand, ready for almost instant use following enemy action or a major natural diseaster. Most of them are located at least 15 miles from assumed strategic target areas.

The hospitals, costing \$21,000 a-piece, were provided by the federal Office of Civil and Defense Mobilizaton as part of a nationwide stock-pile program. They are administered in Texas by the Office of Defense and Diaster Relief, with technical co-op-eration from the Texas State Repart-

ment of Health.
Outgrowths of the mobile hospitals developed and tested dur-ing the Korean War, they can be completely installed by 40 people in four hours. In one test exercise an installation was made in 70 minutes by experienced personnel. Local civil defense organizations in designated locations store and otherwise manage the hospitals and equipment, Emergency conditions such as the Cuban crisis are occasions for making sure the hospitals are in a high state of readiness. Each unit, already crated for instant shipment into stricken areas, is a complete 200 bed affair with facilities for three operating rooms, a pharmacy, x-ray clinical laboratory, sterilizing room central supply room and electrical power supply.


