USDA PLANS NEW RESEARCH ON SCREWORMS

College Station. — While some scientists are trying to send a rocket to the moon, others are trying to rid the Southwest of one of the worst livestock pests... the screwworm.

The USDA has announced that new research on means of eradicating the screwworm will begin soon at Kerrville. This is the same USDA station that was responsible for much of the basic research that led to the sterile-fly technique used successfully against the screwworm in the Southwest.

One of the main projects of the USDA's entomologists will be to develop better methods of rearing screwworms, and also to find ways to produce strains of the insect better suited to sterilization by radiation. Another important aim of the Kerrville research is to learn more about the nutritional requirements of screwworm larvae so that an improved, inexpensive rearing may be developed. Project scientists will also seek new methods by which flies can be eradicated with minimum effect on their life processes.

In announcing the new project, the USDA reported that Dr. Raymond C. Bushland would head the researchers.

TAX-MAN SAM SEZ:

It has been a long, hot summer and there are probably no "blue northerners" in sight for two or three months yet. When you have moved to town you don't lay by the crops at this time of the year like Pa and Ma did a few years ago! However, if you are still turning the sod for a living you are probably glad to get an opportunity to sit on the front porch for a day now and then instead of riding a tractor in the sun. Most farmers break out in a cold sweat at the mention of income taxes, but the "Farmer's Tax Guide", that a lot of farmers picked up at the County Agent's office last winter, has a lot of cold facts for front porch study on a hot summer day. The "Farmer's Tax Guide" will save farmers dollars come next January.

Soil testing is a tool you can use on your farm to help determine the level of fertility of your soil. The recommendations which you will receive from the soil testing laboratory, based on the analysis of the soil samples you submit, will give the amounts of fertilizer needed for the most profitable crop or pasture production. Local county agents can supply information on soil testing.

Farmers and ranchers cannot afford to be dull and lazy during late summer and early fall. Extension range specialists say that winter is not very far away, and now is the time to make preparations for carrying the livestock until next spring.

**COTTON VERTICILLUM
 WILT SERIOUS
 WEST TEXAS DISEASE**
 College Station. — Verticillium
 wilt is becoming more important
 in the cotton producing areas of
 West Texas. It is on the increase in
 the irrigated areas of the High
 Plains, Rolling Plains and the
 southwestern irrigated valleys. In re-
 cent years, the fungus disease has
 spread eastward to a line from
 Wichita Falls, Abilene and San An-
 gelo. It has been found in a few
 fields near Greenville and Waxaha-
 chie.

Lower production by this disease
 may range up to 75 percent in
 some fields. Losses also occur in
 the form of lower and and spot
 grades and the production of im-
 mature fibers.
 The disease is active only when
 the soil temperature is below 85
 degrees. For this reason damage is
 usually higher during the early
 and latter part of the growing sea-
 son.
 Affected plants may become stunted
 and the leaves turn yellow be-
 tween the veins. These yellow leaf
 areas die and turn brown. Leaves
 are shed from the stalk. After cut-
 ting wilted stalks, one will see
 brownish wood underneath the
 bark. The disease may be found
 with root rot or fusarium wilt dis-
 eases.
 Verticillium wilt is spread by the
 movement of old cotton trash with-
 in fields and from field to field.
 Gin trash and the movement of soil
 by cultivation can spread the dis-
 ease.
 The disease is best controlled by
 growing resistant varieties. Certain
 cultural practices also help to pre-

vent serious losses. Local county
 agents can supply additional infor-
 mation. Ask for B-938, "Cotton
 Production in Texas."

In areas where soils are deficien-
 t in calcium, an application of
 limestone will greatly improve yields
 of such fall-seeded crops as vetch,
 crimson clover and small grains.
 W. F. Bennett, extension soil chem-
 ist, points out that the application
 should be made as far ahead of
 planting as possible in order for
 the limestone to react with the
 soil. He suggests a soil test for any
 field or pasture to be treated.

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

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
