

FOOD FADS NOT WISE

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
According to an advertisement for a book extolling the virtues of fruit and vegetable juices, fresh raw fruit juice can be described as Nature's atomic cleanser and fresh raw vegetable juice as its atomic re-generator. Such statements have little basis in fact althou raw veg-etables and fruit are necessary to balanced diet supplementing other kinds of food.

Relying on a single food or food group is a common type of food fad practised in the United States. There are dozens of fad diets — high protein, no starch, no meat, yogurt, -- many of which incorporate the use of supporters or so-called food supplements. Food supplements come in many

forms. They can be taken as a liquid, a powder mixed with liquid --or most common --- as vitamin pills. The advertising of some dietary upplements proclaims the fact that they are derived from natural vege-table foods which are grown only with organic fertilizers xposed to any insect or other spray. The fact is vitamins, no matter

what their original source, constitute only the value of the actual vitamins, minerals or other nutrients from which they are compounded.


SCREWWORM CONTROL PROGRAM SET FOR TEXAS A 100-million dollar problem is

A 100-million dollar problem is the immediate target of an aroused group of Texans who recently band-ed together to form the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundat-ion. Though its long range goal is the study of all animal health pro-blems, the Foundation's first cam-paign will be launched against the screwworm, generally considered Public Enemy No. 1 by livestock producers thruout the southwest. Incorported as a non-profit orproducers thruout the southwest. Incorported as a non-profit or-ganization by the State of Texas, the Foundation will be supported by voluntary contributions and governed by a 15-man board of trustees. Foundation spokesmen said they would employ the sterile fly technique so successfully used in Florida and the Southeast where screwworm control is now almost complete. complete.

-000-Extension entomologists sugg est to cotton producers that they proceed with stalk destruction programs as soon as possible after the harvest is completed. Shredding the stalks and plowing the residue un-der to a depth of five to six inches is one of the best control measures for pink bollworms and for cutting off the food supply for over-winter-ing boll weevils.
