How much does research cost The beter question would be: What is research worth?

Research is indeed the proverbal "stitch in time." Medical research has brought a

bout many outstanding drugs and spectacular operations which save individual lives and relieve suffering, but more outstanding and spec tacular are the advances in pre-ventive medicine that have been made which stop suffering before it starts. preven-Economically speaking, preven-tive medicine has saved the people of the United States countless dol-

lars. A case in point is retrolental fibroplasia, an eye condition marked by the formation of fibrous tissue behind the crystalline lens. Prematurely born babies are often strick-en causing partial or total blind-

At first premature births were blamed. However, research financed by federal and private means dis-

covered the cause to be the exces-sive administration of oxygen--employed regularly in incubators for premature infants. premature infants. This study cost approximately \$50,000. In the U. S. 5,000 children a re blind because of retrolenta' fibroplasia. Each child will cost an estimated \$100,000 for education. training and support from birth tc death - or a grand total of \$500. million.

million. Caring for these 5,000 children in our generation will cost 100,000 times more than the cost of the research which prevents the disorder Other items developed solely through research include the Sulk vaccine and steroid (cortisome) compounds -- which prevent blindcompounds -- which prevent blind-ness, relieve arthritis, and aid skin diseases and allergic conditions. Who can put a price on the suf-fering and crippling averted be-cause of them. The life expectancy of Americans now born is now past 70 years of age. In just 17 years --1937 to 1954 -- it increased 9.6 years.

Uncle Sam's tax collection agency, the Internal Revenue Service, is taking a long critical look at tax abuses in the areas of "entertain-ment expenses," "business travel," and "expense accounts."

Cancled checks alone are no long-er being accepted as adequate sub-stantiation for claimed expenses. Consequently, before Mr. Hard-working Businessman gets too far off on the work for with the IBS off on the wrong foot with the IRS in 1962, Ellis Campbell, Jr., Dal-las IRS district director, comes up with some helpful suggestions.

"Accurate record keeping is the best way to save fedral tax money that I can think of." Campbell said. "Te following pointers can be as useful to our area self-employed folks as to cornoration executives folks as to corporation executives claiming deductions on personal

tax returns for business expenses, wneather reimbursed or not." Campbell revealed that intertain-ment expense records should pro-vide relation of the expenditure to the terremore business and the the taxpayer's business, and the ordinary and necessary business purpose of the expense. Records should show the name of

the person or persons entertained and the companies the represent, as well as the date and place of

entertainment. "Naturally," Campbell cautioned, "the amount of the expenditure must be ordinary and necessary. If the sum is sizeable, be sure to keep a copy of the bill. 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


