The Skillet of "Silversmith" demonstrates exclusive automatic control and will keep all serving hot. It is portable and may be used anywhere. The skillet is used for frying, in making soups, baking, in casserole dishes, will braise or chafe a service easily. It can also be used for steam cooking, popping corn, broiling and will grill steaks perfectly.

Mrs. Jewel Bowen, TESCO home service advisor, will be at the TESCO office from 8:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m. daily during the "Food Freezer Festival." At this time, Mrs. Bowen will demonstrate packaging materials and will discuss the preparation of foods for freezing. She will make available to local housewives interested all the latest information concerning the freezing of foods at home. Her demonstrations of freezing materials and methods will take form of individual discussions.

During the demonstration, a special array of frozen foods will be displayed in an electric food freezer. Included in the display will be meats, vegetables, fruits, juices, soups and creams as they are prepared in the home. In addition, Mrs. Bowen will have on display a variety of commercially packaged and frozen foods and will discuss the latest in plastic containers, wrappers, foil and other packaging materials. Recommended methods of freezing will be explained and demonstrated during this three-day session.

ax Election Called

Lynn County Commissioners' court has ordered a tax re-allocation election for Saturday, August 14, in which all qualified property-owning voters are asked to participate. Approval of the proposal will raise taxes in any manner, but is necessary by law to allocate tax monies to proper funds for operation of the county business, according to County Judge W. M. Mathis.

Such a re-allocation was approved by the voters on Dec. 22, 1947, but Texas laws require that such a re-allocation, when found necessary, must be approved by the voters every six years.

Tax Rate Cited

The statutory tax rate is 80 cents, of which 25 cents is provided for the general fund, 15 cents for the jury fund, 15 cents for roads and bridges, and 25 cents for permanent improvements.

Since this amount is not needed for the permanent improvement and jury fund, but since more is needed in the general and road and bridge funds, the Commissioners' Court is proposing the following division of the 80-cent rate: 35 cents, general fund; 25 cents, road and bridge; five cents, jury; and 15 cents, permanent improvements.

The need for more money in the general and road and bridge funds is to pay principal and interest on the \$120,000 10-year bonds of 1948 in installments of which have been paid.

Has A Fine Record

School Superintendent John T. Morris resigned this week his position with the school system to accept a superintendency at Ralls, a much larger school having an enrollment of some 800 students during the term of 1951-52.

Mr. Morris came here as school chief taking the place of S. F. Johnson who moved to Plainview. Mr. Morris said that a new school head would probably be contracted by the Board in the next few days and that he would leave here by Aug. 15th to 20th.

Mr. Morris, as judged by fellow school administrators, is one of the most effective school executives on South Plains. During his first year here he saw work begin and completed on the beautiful new \$200,000 grade school. His understating of school finances has saved the school considerable money during his tenure of office here.

He has a master's degree from TSTC, Denton, is past president of Rotary Club, an official of Methodist church, a Mason, and a veteran of world war 11.

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION
 NO. 6**

Proposing an amendment to
 the Constitution of Texas by adding
 to Article XVI thereof a new section
 to be numbered 63; providing for
 crediting to members of either the
 Teacher Retirement System or the
 Employees Retirement System of
 Texas all services rendered, as
 either a teacher, or person employ-
 ed in the public schools, colleges,
 and universities of the State, or as
 an appointive officer or employee
 of the State, for retirement benefits
 under either of said Systems.

**AS RESOLVED BY THE
 LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE
 OF TEXAS:**

SECTION 1. That Article XVI of
 the Constitution of the State of
 Texas be amended by adding there-
 to a new section, to be numbered 63
 which shall read as follows:
 "Section 63. Qualified members
 of the Teacher Retirement System,
 in addition to the benefits allowed
 them under the Teacher Retirement
 System for all services including
 prior service and membership ser-
 vice, earned or rendered by them
 as an appointive officer or employee
 of the State. Likewise, qualified
 members of the Employees Retire-
 ment System of Texas, in addition
 to the benefits allowed them under
 the Employees Retirement System
 of Texas shall be entitled to credit
 in the Employees Retirement Sys-
 tem of Texas for all services, in-
 cluding prior service and member-
 ship service, earned or rendered by
 them as a teacher or person employ-
 ed in the public schools, colleges,
 and universities supported wholly
 or partly by the State."

SECTION 2. The foregoing con-
 stitutional amendment shall be sub-
 mitted to a vote of the qualified
 electors of this State at an election
 to be held throughout the State on
 the first Tuesday after the first
 Monday in November, 1954, at
 which election all ballots shall have
 printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amend-
 ment providing for crediting to
 members of either the Teachers Re-
 tirement System or the Employees
 Retirement System of Texas all
 services rendered, as either a teach-
 er, or person employed in the pub-
 lic schools, colleges, and universi-

ties of the State, or as an appointive
 officer or employee of the State,
 for retirement benefits under either
 of said Systems."
 "AGAINST the Constitutional
 Amendment providing for crediting
 to members of either the Teach-
 er Retirement System or the Em-
 ployees Retirement System of
 Texas all services rendered, as ei-
 ther a teacher, or person employed
 in the public schools, colleges, and
 universities of the State, or as an
 appointive officer or employee of
 the State, for retirement benefits
 under either of said Systems."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue
 the necessary proclamation for said
 election and have the same pub-
 lished as required by the Constitu-
 tion and laws of this State. The expenses
 of publication and election for such
 amendment shall be paid out of the
 proper appropriation made by law.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
 NO. 8**

proposing an amendment to
 the Constitution of the State of Tex-
 as by adding Section 16a to Article
 VIII to provide that in counties of
 less than ten thousand (10,000) in-
 habitants, as determined by the
 last preceding census of the United
 States, elections may be held to
 provide for an Assessor-Collector of
 Taxes; providing for submission of
 this Amendment to the voters of
 Texas; and providing the time,
 means and manner thereof.

AS RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That Section 16a shall
 be added to Article VIII of the
 Constitution of Texas so as to read
 as follows:

"Section 16a. In any county hav-
 ing a population of less than ten
 thousand (10,000) inhabitants, as
 determined by the last preceding
 census of the United States, the Com-
 missioners Court may submit to the
 qualified property tax paying voters
 of such county at an election the
 question of adding an Assessor-
 Collector of Taxes to the list of
 authorized county officials. If a
 majority of such voters voting in
 such election shall approve of add-
 ing an Assessor-Collector of Taxes
 to such list, then such official shall
 be elected at the next General Elec-
 tion for such Constitutional term
 of office as is provided for other
 Tax Assessor - Collectors in this
 State."

SECTION 2. The foregoing Consti-
 tutional Amendment shall be sub-
 mitted to a vote of the qualified
 electors of the State at the General
 Election to be held throughout the
 State on the first Tuesday after the
 first Monday in November, 1954, at
 which election all ballots shall have
 written or printed thereon the fol-
 lowing:

"FOR the Constitutional Amend-
 ment permitting elections in coun-
 ties of less than ten thousand (10,
 000) inhabitants to provide for an
 Assessor - Collector of Taxes," and
 "AGAINST the Constitutional
 Amendment permitting elections in
 counties of less than ten thousand
 (10,000) inhabitants to provide for
 an Assessor-Collector of Taxes."

If it appears from the returns of
 said election that a majority of the
 votes cast are in favor of said
 Amendment, the same shall be-
 come a part of the State Constitu-
 tion.

SECTION 3. The Governor shall is-
 sue the necessary proclamation for
 said election and have same pub-
 lished as required by the Consti-
 tution and laws of this State.

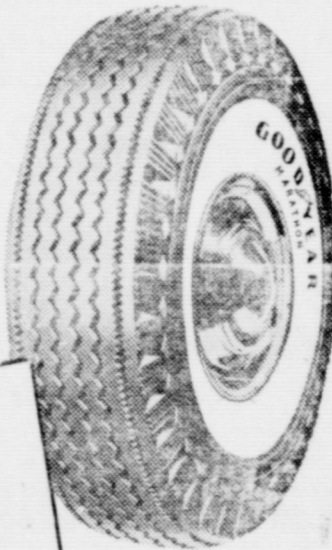

VA Quiz

Q--May I take my dental internship training under the Korean GI Bill? If so, what rate of GI allowance will I be paid-- the rate for on the job trainees or the rate for students at school?

A--You may take a dental internship course under the Korean GI Bill, provided it has been accredited and approved by the Council on Dental Education of the American Dental Association, and provided it leads to a certification by a dental Specialty Board. Your GI allowance will be the rate paid to full-time classroom students.

Q--I am an Army officer, and I am being retired for disability. If I choose to receive retirement pay rather than VA disability compensation, would I still be eligible to take vocational training under Public Law 16?

A--Yes. If you meet all the other eligibility requirements of the law you may be permitted to train under Public Law 16. While in training, you will receive a VA subsistence allowance in addition to your Army retirement.

Q--I have been granted a waiver on my World War II GI term insurance policy because of total disability, while the waiver is in effect, could I convert my term insurance to a permanent plan?

A--Yes. You may convert to Ordinary Life, 20-Payment Life or 30-Payment Life. You may not convert to an endowment plan, however while you are totally disabled.

Q--If the widow of a serviceman killed in Korea remarries, does she have to give up the monthly indemnity payments she has been receiving.

A--No. The legal widow at the time of the serviceman's death has entitlement to the indemnity. Her remarriage does not bar her continued entitlement.
