USDA DEVELOPED INSECT REPELLENT SAFE AND EFFECTIVE

College Station -- You don't have to spend time fighting off insects this summer while you are out of doors. Such pests as mosquitoes, ticks, fleas, chiggers and biting flies can be made to keep their dis-flies can be made to keep their dis-tance by applying a repellent dev-eloped by U. S. Department of Agric ulture scientists on exposed skin areas.

> The repellent is commonly called deet. Diethel-toluamide is the chemical designation. It was synthesized and tested by chemists and entomologists of USDA's Agricultural Research Service It is now available in ready to use containers under several trade names and has been approved as the standard military repellent.

> Deet is effective and safe for general use on the skin or on cert-ain kinds of clothing materials. However, instructions covering the use of the repellent should be follow ed closely because the chemical may affect certain paints, varnishes and some of the plastic materials. The repellent is safe for use on cotton or wool fabrics. Smeared evenly on exposed skin areas, deet is effective for several hours. It has little or no odor and it does not cause a

Big Spring -- Layers of compacted oil just below tillage depth restricts halt vlant root growth by interfer ig with root penetration, not by retricting air or moisture supply to he roots, the U.S. Department of

Agriculture reports. Scientists had thought that poor eration or reduced water transmisision rate in compacted soil might he a cause or restricted growth when roots reached these layers. However the air and water supplies in compacted layers were adequate in experiments conducted! It was n experiments conducted IIt was ound that root growth was hinder-ed only when layers of soil had so much resistance to penetration that roots could not force a passage thru 2 to 8 inch compacted layers. Compacted soil layers are caused

compacted soil layers are caused by passage of machinery accoss cul-tivated fields or by repeated tillage it the same depth. These layers, which occur on the southern Great plains and elsewhere are variously called plowpans, hardpans, tillage pans, pressure pans or claypans.







Free Speech Issue In Court Proceeding

LINCOLN, Ill.-Free speech was the issue here in a contempt of court case in which nearly 600 persons faced possible fines and jail sentences.

The defendants, many of them members of a reform group known as the "Good Government Council of Logan County," were cited for contempt for petitioning Circuit Judge Frank M. Bevan to replace a state's attorney in a case involving the prosecutor's friend.

Judge Bevan said the petition contained "odious, defamatory language concerning an official of this court," State's Attorney Edwin C. Mills.

Members of the Good Government Council contended Judge Bevan could not hold them in contempt and said if the prosecutor felt he was defamed by the petition he could sue them in a civil court

The case arose when, as a result of action taken by the Good Gov-ernment Council, Justice of the Peace Vincent Jones was charged with illegal diversion of funds collected in overweight trucking fines. Mr. Jones was charged with perjury, embezzlement and malfeas-Ance

The council followed up the case with a petition asking that Mr. Jones, be replaced by a special or assistant prosecutor. .

Most Drinking Starts **Before College Days** NEW HAVEN, Conn.-Four out

of every five college men who drink began their drinking before entering college, a researcher at Yale University's laboratory of applied physiology reported recently. Robert Straus, research assodiste, disclosed for the first time preliminary results of a five-year study into the drinking habits of American college youth. This study was made by Mr. Straus and Selden D. Bacon, director of Yale's center of alcohol studies.

Of the American women students who drink, 65 per cent also started drh.king before entering college, Mr. Straus said.

"The probability that a young person will drink at all," he continued, "is closely related to the practices of his or her parents.

"Of the men whose parents both drink, 90 per cent are themselves users. However, only half of the men (51 per cent) whose parents both abstain, drink,

"Where both parents are users, 83 per cent of the women drink on occasion. However, when both parents abstain, only 19 per cent of the women students drink."

He declared that parental advice on abstinence seems to be much stronger than advice from either


