STATE HAS SCHOOLS FOR POOL OPERATORS

They're some great times ahead for Texas' swimming enthusiasts. They've got 13,000 pools to choose from and the season is right at hand. And things stand to break even better for the "wet set" in days to come. According to the National Swimming Pool Institute, Texas will have some 50,000 pools in 1970, almost four times the present number.

But play for plungers means work for someone else, namely State Health Department engineers and local health department sanitarians who sponsor training courses for pool managers and personnel from border to border.

The Department began its voluntary program of training operators in 1956. Day long courses are held at various points thruout the State and cover such diverse subjects as chlorination, filtration and sanitation. So far 1216 pool operators have been certified by the Department thru the medium of short schools.

Bond Sales High

March E and H Savings Bonds sales in Lynn county totaled \$24,521 according to A. C. Verner, chairman of the county Savings Bonds committee.

Sales for the first three months of 1960 were \$24,521 which represents 34.5 percent of the county 1960 goal. First quarter sales in Texas were \$45,480,326 or 27.5 percent of its 1960 goal of \$165,500,000.

Watch Poisons

Poisoning, while not a top killer in Texas, claim over 80 lives each year in Texas.

In addition, the dozen poison control centers scattered around the State answer hundreds of urgent pleas for information each month.

Generally, pre-schoolers are the victims. Records indicate that 65 to 70 percent of all poisoning cases reported to poison control centers involve children who are one or two years of age.

The improper usage (not following directions) of medicines cause the greatest percentage of accidental ingestion of poisons, with aspirin overdose heading the list. Sedatives and tranquilizers are close behind.

Petroleum products also claim a high percentage of victims. A common cause is children drinking kerosene or gasoline from a soda water bottle.

Deathwise the poisoning picture takes on a slightly different look. According to State Health Department statistics, there were 87 deaths from solid and liquid poisons during 1959.

Aspirins and salicylates led the causes, followed by noxious foodstuffs (toadstools and other poisonous plants). Barbituates and petroleum product deaths are not as high as some other causes because prompt medical action is usually successful in saving the victim.

A breakdown of ages in poison deaths shows 17 deaths for children in one-to-four year olds, the age of inquisitive toddlers.

Thirty-one persons between the age of 45 and 64 died from poisoning, most resulting from an overdose of medicines. Least number of deaths was in the five to 14 age group, with only one death during 1959.

It was a most lovely and enjoyable program and was attended by an overflow crowd.

The agricultural outlook for the remainder of 1960 is spotted. Here is how an extension economist, John McHaney, sees the prospects for the future months — hog prices could be higher because of the smaller spring pig crop. Prices of fed cattle are expected to fluctuate a little below current levels. Milk prices should average, to the producer, a little higher than in 1959 while egg prices are expected to be noticeably higher for the last six months of 1960.

Rabies Still Threat

Wildlife rabies is running two to one ahead of rabies among domestic animals, the most recent record shows.

The record shows there were 69 cases of rabies diagnosed in all animals. Only 17 of the 69 total were among dogs and cats.

The rabies picture in Texas has recently been taking on a new look. The present trend indicates a decline in the number of rabies in domestic pet, but a rise in the number of wildlife rabid animals. Infected skunks and foxes were more numerous than the total of rabid dogs confirmed by the State Health Department laboratory during 1959. Livestock rabies has shown an increase also, probably due to exposure to wildlife.

Public health veterinarians point out that, numerically, there isn't a high enough immune pet population in Texas to prevent the spill-over of wildlife rabies into the dog and cat population.

A mealtime treat for the family at Easter or later is today's recipe featuring hard-cooked eggs. In this, cooked yolks are combined with a crab meat mixture, then seasoned with herbs and spices from an envelope of salad dressing mix to make a distinctive filling for egg halves.

Monte Carlo Stuffed Eggs
6 hard-cooked eggs; 1/2 cup flaked crab meat; 1/2 cup finely chopped celery; 1 tablespoon chopped green pepper; 1 1/2 teaspoons classic salad dressing mix; 2 tablespoons mayonnaise or 3 tablespoons sour cream.
With wet knife, slice eggs in halves lengthwise; remove yolks and chop fine. Mix chopped yolks with crab meat, celery, and green pepper. Combine salad dressing mix with mayonnaise or sour cream and add to egg yolk mixture, mixing well. Pile into the egg white halves. Chill. Makes 6 servings.



U. S. 'ALERT' TO FEATURE CONELRAD DRILL, CLOSE GOVERNMENT INTERPLAY

May 3, 4, and 5 are important days this year to all Americans. On these days the seventh annual civil defense preparedness exercise, Operation Alert 1960, will be held from coast to coast.

The objective of the 1960 Alert will be to train personnel in National, State, and local governmental, industry, and in private organizations to respond effectively to an all-out attack on the United States with nuclear weapons.

THE PRINCIPAL participation by the public on a nationwide basis in the exercise will be during the half-hour beginning at 1 p.m. (EST) on Tuesday, May 3, when a Conelrad radio broadcast will be aired on 640 and 1240 kilocycles. During this period, all television, FM radio stations, and those radio stations not in the Conelrad net-

work must leave the air. The special Conelrad broadcast will originate from the Emergency Site of the Federal Government "somewhere outside of Washington." It will include brief addresses by President Eisenhower and Civil and Defense Mobilization Director Leo A. Hoegh.


The Conelrad broadcast will give the American public an opportunity to experience the kind of radio reception it would have to rely on during an enemy attack. The broadcast's importance will be emphasized by the fact that, under attack conditions, the 640 and 1240 channels would be the only source for survival instructions to the general public.

PARTICIPATION by the Federal, State, and local govern-

ments this year will be of special significance to the nation's preparedness program for it will demonstrate the effectiveness of coordinated action among them.

Federal agencies will invoke comprehensive plans for action during an attack on this country. All 50 States will operate under their statewide survival plans. Plans for emergency action in metropolitan areas and smaller communities will be screened for their effectiveness.

Equally important will be the conduct of the exercise in industrial plants throughout the country because emergency procedures in the larger plants are as comprehensive as those for an entire community. Mutual aid agreements within industry are another form of coordinated ac-

TAKE a can of pears, dress them up with the ruby color and the flavor of grenadine syrup, then top them with the fluffiest and richest flavored low-calorie whipped topping. Here's a dessert that is glamorous, delicious, and always welcome on a busy homemaker's menu. The topping, Dream Whip, is as convenient as canned fruit for it stays on the pantry shelf before whipping... then any remaining topping can be stored in the refrigerator three or four days ready for another prepared-in-a-hurry dessert.

Grenadine Pears
8 to 10 pear halves (1 pound 14 oz. can), drained; 1 cup pear juice; 1/2 cup grenadine syrup; 1 envelope dessert topping mix; 1/2 cup milk; 1/2 teaspoon vanilla.

Long Live Strawberries!

By Betty Barclay

THE noble strawberry, queen of the berry crop, retains its supreme when served in a home-made sweet spread. Bring it to the breakfast table in a Strawberry and Rhubarb Jam, easily made the short boll way with today's recipe.

Rhubarb and Strawberry Jam

Yield: about 9 medium glasses (4 1/2 lbs. jam)

8 1/2 cups prepared fruit (about 1 lb. rhubarb and 1 qt. ripe strawberries); 5 1/2 cups (2 1/2 c.) sugar; 1/2 bottle Certo liquid fruit pectin.

First, prepare the fruit. Slice rhubarb or chop (do not peel) about 1 pound red-stalked rhubarb. Add 1/4 cup water and simmer, covered, until rhubarb is soft—about 1 minute. Crush thoroughly about 1 quart fully ripe strawberries. Combine fruits and measure 8 1/2 cups into a very large saucepan.

Then make the jam. Add sugar to fruit in saucepan and mix well. Place over high heat, bring to a full rolling boil and boil 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and once stir in liquid fruit pectin. Skim off foam with metal spoon. Then stir and skim by same for 5 minutes to cool slightly, to prevent floating fruit. Add quickly into glasses. Cover jam at once with 1/4 inch hot paraffin.

The production and marketing of agricultural products is becoming more and more competitive between farmers and areas of production. Agriculture is also becoming more commercialized and specialized, says John McHaney, extension economist, and larger investments are required to meet these changes. He adds that businesses outside of agriculture are also following this trend.

Birds have an appeal to most everyone because of their natural beauty, sprightly actions and pleasing songs. Much can be done to attract song birds to the home surroundings. Providing food, water and protection and favorable nesting facilities will attract to the areas of the yard or garden where they are most desired.

Forage plants in many sections of Texas are deficient in phosphorus. When pasture forage is markedly deficient in this mineral, cattle grazing on such forage should receive from 6 to 9 grams of supplemental phosphorus daily.
