TELLS OF FARM FISH PONDS

Many fishermen will travel hund reds of miles this year to their fav-orite fishing spots, but the farmer or rancher who owns a good pond can solve the travel problem out ever leaving home. Stock tanks all over Texas soon will become

the

mighty popular hangouts for country type fisherman. Now's the time to give fish ponds a little attention so they will be ready when the fish commence to bite within the next month or so. Remove all trash around the pond so the surroundings will be attractive to the family and their friends.

Farm ponds can be fertilized the same as farm crops. And the results are equally as promising. An increase in food supply increases the pounds of fish raised.

A pond treatment of 400 pounds of cottonseed meal plus 200 pounds of 20 percent superphosphate per acre of water per year is recom-mended. Make the first treatment of this mixture early in year. Board cast the materials over the surface of the pond. Three subsequent applications should be made at 3 to 4 week intervals. 600 pounds of high grade commercial fertilizers applied similarly to the above recommendation may be substituted instead of the above treatment.

Properly treated ponds take on a green-brown color. A good test is to plunge the arm into the water up to the elbow. If the finger tips are visible thru the water, make the next application.

NURSES NEEDED BY NATION

Increases in hospital and nursing home beds and a jump in the number of people carrying hospital insurance are the two chief causes of the nursing shortage in Texas and elsewhere, state health officials

The fact that there are more and more hospital beds for insured persons to take avantage of during brief illnesses indicate that nurses have to spread their time thinner an thinner to meet the demand.
Other factors mentioned in the

shortage are increasing numbers of dependent children and oldsters, and a shortage of high school grad uates who are psychologically adapt ed for nursing duties. Nursing re-registration in Texas last year totaled 21,889, according to figures kept by the State Board

of Nursing Examiners. A board spokesman pointed out that figure

did not include new registrations, but did include some out of state nurses who wanted to maintain their Texas licenses. Today, in state, national and world medical and public health cir cles, nurses are recognized as friends and counsellors of all and welcome health teachers. and community leaders insist nurs ing importance in local health work

#### What To Do With A Twister

What to do in the unlikely case of a tornado? Well, here are several suggestions:

1. When time permits, go to a tornado cellar, cave or underground excavation with an air outlet. Any of these should be kept fit for use, meaning free from water, gas or debris and preferably equipped with

If in open country, move at right angles to the tornado's path. Tornadoes usually move ahead at about 25 to 40 miles per hour.

3. If in a city or town, seek inside shelter. Stay away from windows. In homes, the southwest corner of the lowest floor or basement offers the greatest safety. People living in brick or stone should seek other shelter, preferably in a storm cellar or the basement of a frame house.

Windows on the north and east sides of the house may also be open ed to help reduce building damage. Standing against the inside wall on a lower floor of an office building offers some protection.

4. If in schools in city areas, stay inside, away from windows, and near an inside wall on the lower floor. Auditoriums and gyms should be avoided under all circum-stances. If in rural areas schools, children and teachers should be removed to a revine or ditch if a storm shelter is not available.

6. It does not help to get excited. Even thou a warning is issued, chances of a tornado striking one's home or location are very slight. (Ed. note: it is suggested that in event a twister is seen directed to-ward O'Donnell, the fire alarm be sounded in a long eeries of SHORT blasts and when danger is past the all clear be given with a blast. This signal could be used for all emergencies except for fire.



A. No. Direct GI loans may be made by VA only for the purpose of buying or building a home or farmhouse and then only in certain areas where private capital is not

Q. I'm a disabled Korean veteran, and I am running a farm in yartnershiy with another veteran: fellow who took on the farm train ing under the World War II G I bill. representatives you may designate.

Q. I am a World War 2 veteran taking a correspondence course under the GI bill. My entitlement is due to run out, but I have com-Would I be allowed to enroll in farm training under Public Law 16 even thou the farm is not under my romplete control?

A. Yes, it might be possible for you to take institutional on farm training under Public Law 16 provided that you meet the basic eligibility requirements of the law; and your partnership agreement calls for equal managerial authority and that your farm is productive enough to provide a livelihood for both you and your partner.

Q. Several years ago I went into business with the help of a business loan. Now I have the opportunity to sell my business at a nice profit. May I do so? And will I need VA's approval?

You have the right to sell your business to anyone at all, and you do not need VA's approval to sell. Of course, thou, you must pay off your GI business loan to end your liability under the VA guaran-

O. I notice that you keep advising veterans to check all contracts before purchasing a home under

the GI loan program. Does include a deposit agreement, or do you mean just the GI loan

A. That means every contract or agreement you are requested to sign as a part of the deal. If you are in doubt about any agreement or contract, see your lawyer first before you sign.


