THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN

Sen. Preston Smith

Earlier in this session there were many delegations in Austin supporting a number of "women's rights" measures. There were active campaigns for many of these bills by influential groups like the Business and Professional Women's clubs and others.

In all cases there seemed to be a recognized need for many of these "women's rights" measures — especially in view of the confusion some of the older legislation inflicts on all business dealings with women.

The new bills had support in both houses here. But it now appears that the "women's rights" legislation has become lost in hundreds of other bills concerning loan sharks, taxes and appropriations. These big discussions shoved the "women's rights" legislation into an obscure back seat position.

Early in the session, the "woman's rights" legislation received much discussion. Only occasionally is the subject brought up and then the talk follows a line of thought that there will be time to complete the "women's rights" bills.

The session is moving along at a rapid clip now with all the attendant confusion of lawmakers in a hurry. Still not much seems certain in the tax and appropriations departments. Anything can happen

Lynn Co. Bond Issue Election Is June 6th

Next Tuesday qualified voters of Lynn County who have property on the county's tax roll may vote on two proposals.

One is to establish a 15c special road tax. The County is in need of more spending money due to ever higher inflation.

The other is to float \$35,000 in bonds to build a Livestock and Exhibition Barn for the use of Lynn County at Tahoka. The Lynn County Fair Ass'n has \$9,000 to equip the barn and funds received from sale of right of way of Highway 87 from site of old stock barn property will go to retire a part of the \$35,000 debt.

EXPLANATION OF LYNN CO.'S TAX SITUATION

Due to rising costs and the increasing demands placed on the County for indigent care, etc. the Commissioner's Court of Lynn Co. finds it is necessary to ask for more tax money.

County Valuations have remained virtually the same since 1951 at which time land valuations were raised. The only increase in valuations since 1951 has been the natural increase such as new buildings, etc.

We have given the County Tax matter considerable study and have decided that the 15c Special Road Tax is the cheapest way to raise taxes. It would take about \$2,000,000.00 raise in County Valuations to bring in the amount of money that is now going into the Road and Bridge Fund for other Funds because the 15c Special Road Tax can be used only for Road purposes.

We have also called a \$35,000.00 Bond Election for June 6, 1961 in order to give the qualified property tax paying voters of the County an opportunity to say whether or not this is the way they want the tax raised, hoping that the tax will be voted and that we will not have to raise County Valuations. If this tax is voted, we can use the money that is now going into the Road and Bridge Fund for other Funds because the 15c Special Road Tax can be used only for Road purposes.

We have also called a \$35,000.00 Bond Election for June 6, 1961 for the erection of an Exhibition Building which we think most everyone will agree is much needed for a place to hold the Lynn County Livestock Show and which building could be used for other large gatherings. If these bonds are voted, they can be retired at a tax rate of about .03c on the \$100 valuation.

City Gives Notice On Water Payments

In order to meet the requirements of the recent Water and Sewer System Bond Issue and to be able to retire the bonds on schedule, excerpts of the ordinance prescribing rates for the City's Water Works System, which was adopted by the City Council, May 25, 1961 and ordered to be carried out by the Bonding Agency —

"WHEREAS, it now appearing to this City Council that it is necessary and proper to prescribe a schedule of rates or charges to be paid by the inhabitants of said City for services rendered by the City's Waterworks and Sanitary Sewer System; therefore —

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF O'DONNELL, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: That the monthly rates or charges for services furnished by the Waterworks System shall be as follows:

First 2,000 gallons (Minimum) \$3.50 per month

Next 3,000 gallons 75c per 1,000 gal. per month.

Over 5,000 gallons 60c per 1,000 gal. per month.

SECTION 2: That the monthly rates or charges for services furnished by the Sanitary Sewer System shall be as follows:

Residential taps \$2 per month

Commercial taps \$2.50 per month

Heavy Commercial taps \$3.20 per month

SECTION 3: That such rates and charges hereby fixed and prescribed shall be paid by the users of the Waterworks and the Sanitary Sewer System to the City Secretary in advance of the 10th day of each month, and which shall be the date such rates or charges shall become due and payable and in case any user or customer of such system does not pay the amount due by such user or customer within fifteen (15) days from the date the same became due and payable, then it is hereby made the duty of the City Secretary to add a ten percent (10 percent) penalty to the amount past due and unpaid.

SECTION 4: In the event any user or customer does not pay matured rates and charges within thirty (30) days from the date same becomes due and payable, it is hereby made the further duty of the City Secretary to disconnect the water service; and whenever the amount past due and delinquent is paid by such user or customer, such service may be resumed, but there shall be charged and collected a reconnection charge of \$1.00

Speaks At Rotary

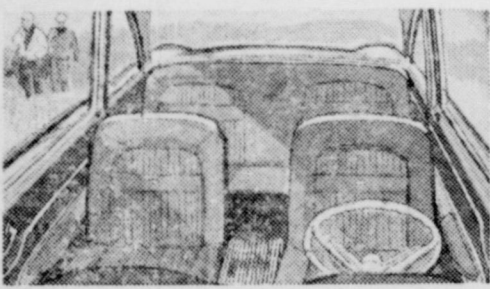

Governor Daniel's answer to House Bill 727, the retail sales tax measure, is a new tax proposal to raise \$166,500,000 a year.

The Governor's measure offered the Legislature an opportunity to close the books and go home and provided a cushion of \$20 million more than what the governor said is needed to erase the general fund deficit. The plan would pay for a two year appropriation bill and give the school teachers a maximum \$800 a year pay raise.

His conclusion about the sales tax bill was "If I let this bill pass without my signature you would be begging me by Christmas to call a special session to straighten it out."

He said flatly that he would veto HB 727 even if it were presented to him with substantial changes.

The Governor's bill proposes to raise the money thru eight ways:

1. A natural gas pipeline tax, 2 percent gross receipts in intrastate and percentage allocation of interstate receipts, an increase from 1-4 of 1 percent; \$12,200,000 a year
2. A 2 percent excise tax on motor or power driven objects and parts, includes all types of vehicles, boats, appliances, etc. \$32,100,000
3. A 3 percent excise tax on jewelry and watches, revising the present law to coincide with federal definition, \$3,400,000.
4. A 2 percent excise tax on construction materials with exemptions on component ingredients used in manufacturing, \$31,500,000.
5. A 2 percent consumer tax on utility bills, \$31,500,000.
6. A stock transfer tax of 1 percent of value with division of definition, \$5,000,000.
7. A tax of 1 cent per bottle of soft drinks, 1 cent per bottle on beer, graduated tax rates on liquor and wine, a total source of new revenue of \$38,800,000.

8. A 3 percent tax on restaurant meals above \$1 for a new tax income of \$9,000,000 a year.

Are you among the many persons past retirement age who have not applied for social security benefits because you are still working?

Because of a change in the law you may now be eligible for some payments during the year even though you are still employed or self employed and earn well over \$1,200 a year.

Beginning this year, most people can earn more money and still get social security checks for some months in the year. In fact under the new law, a person always has a larger gross income from earnings and benefits when he does not limit earnings to \$1200 a year.

As in the old law, you can earn up to \$1200 and get benefits for all months of the year. No matter how much you earn in a year, you are still considered "retired" in any month you do not earn over \$100 as an employee or aren't active in your own business. Also for all months in which you are at least 72 years of age, you will be considered retired, regardless of how much you earn.

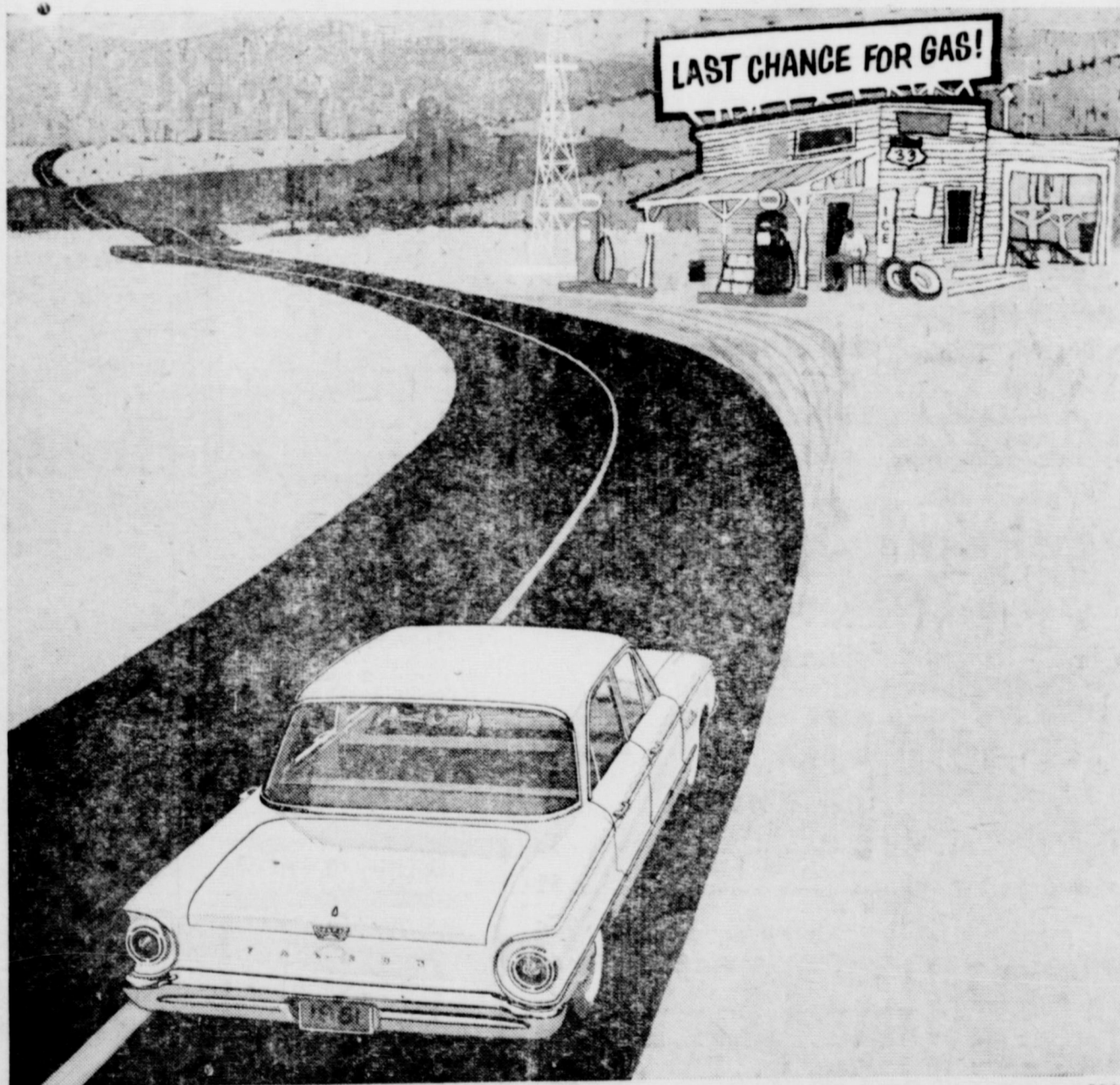
