O'Donnell Schools To Open Monday

Five hundred students, nineteen instructors, and an entire school district will be on their toes, literally and figuratively speaking, next Monday morning at nine o'clock when the 1939-40 school term will begin with a public program at the high school auditorium.

With the largest enrollment and plans in many years, O'Donnell Public Schools are expected to have the most successful session in their whole history. Many of the teachers have spent the summer attending school themselves, and have come home brimful of new plans and methods. It is the unqualified opinion of local people that O'Donnell has the most efficient and the most agreeable group of instructors to be found anywhere, and it goes without saying that we have the best and most energetic student body.

Plant In Excellent Condition

NVA and WPA projects completed during the vacation period have brought buildings, grounds, and equipment to topnotch condition. Both the buildings have been remodelled, renovated, and improved, and the grounds have been extensively improved and beautified.

Several hundred new volumes of reference books, classics, and standard modern works of literature have been added to the library, and dozens of smaller improvements made in other departments.

Reopening of the Home Economics department after five years has also attracted much favorable comment throughout the district.

Enrollment Monday

Students and patrons are asked to be at the high school auditorium Monday morning, Sept. 4, at nine o'clock. After introduction of the faculty by Supt. S. F. Johnson, announcement concerning plans for the year's work will be made and immediately after the program, students will pass to their home rooms for enrollment and classification.

Students are reminded to bring their report cards and book cards from last term so that there may be no delay in enrollment. Students who have transferred into this district for the first time are especially reminded not to overlook this important requirement.

Books will be issued during Monday and perhaps first assignments made so that real school work may begin Tuesday morning. Organization of classes, election of student officials, etc., will also be completed next week.

As has been our privilege and pleasure each school term since 1924, the INDEX is anticipating each student activity with eagerness, but especially the renewal of the Eagle's Scream, school news department. For thirteen consecutive terms we have enjoyed working with our students and teachers in this department, and have always found them eager to cooperate to the fullest extent. Editors and reporters have been loyal and efficient in collecting and compiling school news, and of assistance to us in scores of ways.

The INDEX joins with the school district in cordially welcoming teachers and students back again, with best wishes for an even more successful school year than we have known in the past.

Extend Lyntegar Lines In Dawson

The construction of an electric light and power line in Dawson county as an extension of the Lyntegar lines, Perry, Hockley and Garza counties seems to be an assured fact, according to Garland Pennington, superintendent of the Lyntegar project.

A conference with the farmers of Dawson county was held at Lamesa last Saturday. Mr. Pennington says at which time 332 signatures had been attached to the agreement for electric service. It is expected that there will be at least 50 other signers.

This project, strictly speaking, will not be an extension of the Lyntegar lines. A sub-station for this project will be established in Lamesa but the office here will be the main office for the Dawson county line as well as for the Lyntegar lines.

The Dawson county lines will extend as far north as west in Dawson county as Welch, as far east as Key, and to Sparenberg, Patricia, and on down into Martin county on the south. The lines will be about 125 miles in length.

Mr. Pennington stated Tuesday that a surveyor had already gone down into Dawson county to begin surveying out the route.—Lynn County News.

Tech Archeologists Excavate Near Here

Students of archeology and geology have long been aware of the fact that this particular section of the Southwest is rich in data which reveal many prehistoric facts, but a recent exploratory excavation made by a group from Texas Technological College was of more local interest than any which have been made in years. The party was headed by Mr. Porter Montgomery, assisted by Joe Ben Wheat, and was accompanied by Mr. Ben Moore, local amateur naturalist.

Choosing a site some six miles north of O'Donnell and removed from the highway by natural formations, the party made exploratory excavations to find an Indian grave which Mr. Moore had located some months ago. Work was successful even beyond their hopes, as they found the skeleton of an Indian in reasonably good condition. Buried some twelve or eighteen inches deep in the rocky point the bones indicated that burial took place at least one hundred years ago. In addition to the bones, a number of interesting artifacts and relics were unearthed. Mr. Montgomery removed the greater part of the skeleton to the Tech museum, of which he is custodian, but Mr. Moore retained some fragments of the skull, a tooth, and other bits, and they are now added to his collection in the store here.

Because of the unusual formations which occur in the caprock, this territory is an ideal field for archeological and geological exploration. The Gail and Snyder sections are especially favorable for this study.

Other Work Planned

Mr. Montgomery said last week following the excavations near O'Donnell that some \$16,000 had recently been set aside from WPA funds to further such work on the South Plains, and that other parties would likely begin work on similar projects in the near future.

Several local amateurs have been

much interested in these plans, and in view of the fact that they have studied contours and formations through the breaks and sandhills hereabouts, it is probable that they will be called upon for suggestions and information concerning likely fields for excavations. Along with Mr. Moore, such local men are Mr. Charley Hart, who may or may not have been one of the last of the Indian fighters, but who is without question one of the keenest observers and most widely read student in our section. G. C. Allen is another local man who is deeply interested in such things, and has done quite a bit of collecting and exploring on his own initiative, as has Naymon Everett.

'We await with much interest further developments along this line.

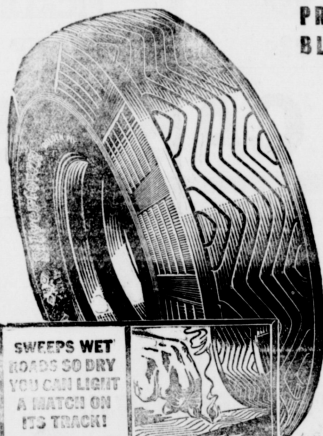

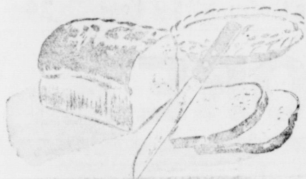
