### X-Ray Unit Will Visit O'Donnell

Mrs. Lillian McCord, nurse of O'Donnell school, has encouraged citizens of O'Donnell in an all out campaign against tuberculosis. TB went down hill for a while but is definitely on the upswing again, according to Mrs. McCord.

Civic organizations in O'Donnell are joining hands to bring the mobile unit for X-rays to the city November 3. O'Donnell Young Homemakers have volunteered to help at the mobile unit all that day as a community service.

The Lions Club is the sponsoring organization and is assisted by the Rotary Club, O'Donnell Young Farmers, O'Donnell Young Homemakers, Entre Nous Study Club, 1939 Study Club, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, and ministers of the different churches in the advertising campaign.

Mrs. McCord urges all farmers to encourage their Latin laborers to come and be X-rayed November 3. Tuberculosis can be cured and it can be treated at home with pills. People no longer have to be taken away from their homes and families to be cured of TB.

O'Donnell Young Homemakers asks all to remember November 3 and everyone over 12 come have their X-ray. Donations of at least \$1 will be greatly appreciated from those who can afford it since civic organizations have had to guarantee \$200 to the Tuberculosis Association to get the mobile unit to come here.
