The following monthly social security benefits on the basis of their husbands' work if they would come in and file application, John G. Hutton, district social security manager, said today.

A 1957 charge in the law did a way with the requirement that a wife must be living with or, supported by her husband when she files application, and that a widow must have been living with or supported by her husband, at the time ported by her husband at the time of his death. Now, a 62 year old wife or widow may be eligible for a monthly benifit merely on the basis of a legal marriage that is still in existence-even through they may have been separated for many years and are at opposite ends of the country. There has been no change in the law with respect to the pro-vision that a wife can receive monthly benefits only if her husband is also receiving his benefit.

Aged wives and widows who be-Aged wives and widows who be-lieve they can qualify for benefits as a result of this change in the law should contact us promptly to determine what their rights are, Hutton concluded.
