

Weapon to Fight Fires

sudsing variety for use in pumpers and extinguishers. Dale K. Auck, fire prevention engineer for the Federation of Mutual Fire Insurance Companies, said the detergent breaks through greasy surface oils and gets water to the heart of a fire immediately where ordinary water merely runs off many burning substances.

"Many stored hay or baled cotton fires have smouldered internally until entirely consumed, despite tons of water poured on the surface," Auck said. Experiments have shown, however, that only 40 gal-lons of the new "wet water" will to the work of 300 gallons of or-dinary water in fire fighting.
